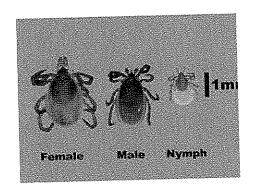
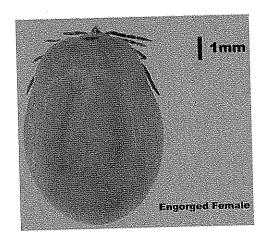
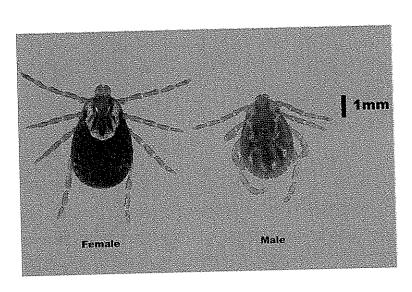
PICTORIAL GUIDE TO TELL DEER TICKS FROM DOG TICKS

is commonly found in spring and
early summer. The characteristic
white markings can usually be
seen even on the engorged
female.
