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## TOWN WARRANT

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### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

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To the inhabitants of the Town of Plaistow in the County of Rockingham in said state, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Plaistow on Tuesday, the tenth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles:

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

Article 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Collector of Taxes additional compensation for his (her) services in collecting the State Head Tax and to fix the amount thereof at the rate of 2 percent of the State Head Taxes so collected.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell and dispose of the following listed Real Estate at Public Auction, said Real Estate having been acquired through Tax Deeds. This authorization to remain in effect until the Real Estate so listed has been disposed of:

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to conduct, or cause to be conducted, a study of Street Lighting within the Town in order to secure the maximum lighting coverage at the least expense to the Town: to set up standards for the installation of future street lights and to arrange for the relocation of street lights if necessary in order to conform to any plan arising from said study.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the construction of sidewalks.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Tax Collector to allow Tax Discounts as follows:

(a) To allow a 3 percent discount for payment of Taxes within thirty (30) days of issue of Tax Bills but in no case later than October 1st in any year.

(b) To allow a 2 percent discount for payment of Taxes within (60) days of issue of Tax Bills but in no case later than November 1st in any year.

This authorization to remain in effect until revoked by vote of the Town.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to amend Section 1, Article 1 of the Building Zone Ordinance to remove the specified exemption of Cifre Lane to the regulations, restrictions and conditions of Zone A, and that Cifre Lane shall be included in Zone A. (By petition).

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to accept Rolling Hill Avenue, (By petition).

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$450.00 for the control of Dutch Elm Disease. (By petition).

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the installation and Maintenance of two Street Lights on Forest Street near the residence of Chester Robbins. (By petition).

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for the installation and Maintenance of one Street Light on Sweet Hill Road near the residence of Carlos Palmer. (By petition).

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for the installation and maintenance of one Street Light on North Main Street near the residence of Patrick McCusker.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the installation and maintenance of two Street Lights on the Crane Crossing Road; one at the juncture of the Crane Crossing Road and the Kingston Road and the other at the Bridge beyond the residence of Adam Maslowski.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for the installation and maintenance of one Street Light on the Kingston Road between the Crane Crossing Road and the Plaistow-Kingston Town Line. (By petition).

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for the installation and maintenance of one Street Light on Evans Avenue between the residences of Malcolm Wyatt and George Peabody (By petition).

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for the installation and maintenance of one Street Light at the juncture of Evans Avenue and South Main Street. (By petition).

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for the installation and maintenance of one Street Light on Forest Street between the residences of Edward Rochussen and Nicholas Masino. (By Petition).

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to permit Everett Marston, d/b/a as the Plaistow Bowling Alleys to open and operate said Bowling Alleys on the Sabbath after 1:00 P. M. in the afternoon.

Article 20. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of Taxes.

Article 21. "Shall the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to playing games of Beano be adopted in this city or town."

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to accept as submitted the reports of Agents, Auditors, and other officers and committees heretofore appointed.



One of the ever increasing demands, is in the field of acquiring the information requested by the students of the town attending secondary schools. We find much help in the Readers Guide, Time Magazine, The Book of Knowledge, The World Almanac, and always from our sets of Encyclopedias.

Another service, outstanding, is to the teachers and students of the Pollard School, who use the library through the year. Books are sent to each grade bi-monthly, and special books sent at any time when needed.

Book-week was emphasized by poster, made by the Pollard School Children, and also by the showing of the movie, "Heidi" to the entire school.

A new departure, this year, has been the visits of the State Bookmobile every three months. This brings to the town any requested books, also books not available in the Plaistow Library. Adult Readers have appreciated this service very much.

During the summer vacation period the Librarian held "Story Telling Time", for the younger children each Wednesday, afternoon—this proved popular for as many as forty children attended. Certificates for good summer reading were presented to the children.

Many new books have been purchased this year, both Adult and Juvenile. We have enjoyed as in other years the loan of Non-fiction books, which we could not afford to buy, from the State Library at Concord. This service is greatly appreciated by the Librarian.

Improvements this year include new shelves for Reference Magazines; also the installing of a combination desk and closet space.

Circulation has increased some what in Juvenile Reading. More books are needed for we are part of a growing community.

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## REPORT OF THE PLAISTOW FIRE DEPARTMENT

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The department answered a total of 59 alarms. Eight of these were building fires; six fires in woods; five chimney fires; thirteen calls to dump; twenty-five grass and brush fires.

A new piece of equipment was added to the department this year. It is a thousand gallon tank truck mounted on a Chevrolet chassis with compartments on each side of body for carrying equipment.

## SCHOOL WARRANT

### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

---

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the town of Plaistow qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the seventh day of March 1953, at six o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.

Article 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

Article 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.

Article 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

Article 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.

Article 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

Article 8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen, the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

Article 9. To see if the district will elect to approve the inclusion of its officers and employees (other than those eligible under the Teachers' Retirement System) in the Employees' Retirement System of the State of New Hampshire, which system is provided for by Chapter 27-A of the Revised Laws, as inserted by Chapter 183 of the Laws of 1945, and as provided by Chapter 201 of the Laws of 1945 and any subsequent amendments thereto.

Article 10. If the district votes in the affirmative on the preceding article, to see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200 for the purpose of providing funds for the district's contribution to said retirement system for the coming year.

Article 11. To see what sum, not to exceed \$2,000.00, the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of providing facilities for a school lunch program.

Article 12. To see if the district will authorize the School Board to make application for and to receive, in the name of the district, such advances, grants-in-aid or other funds for educational purposes, as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from Federal, State, local or private Agencies.

Article 13. To transact any further business that may legally come before the meeting.

## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Plaistow:

The educational efforts of the Public Schools in Plaistow are directed toward the development in each pupil, according to his abilities and capacities, such habits, attitudes, knowledge and skills as will enable him to live usefully, successfully and happily in a democratic society. Our schools accept the individual where he is, as he is, and provide opportunities for him to develop to his maximum growth.

In this my third annual report as Superintendent of your schools you will find details under the following headings: Supervisory Union, Enrollment and School Census, Personnel, Curriculum and Extended School Services, The New Addition and The School Building, Trans-

portation, Finances, Community Organizations, Conclusion.

### SUPERVISORY UNION NO. 55

Because of the relatively large number of changes and increases in population in Supervisory Union No. 55 during the past few years, I am taking this opportunity for the first time, to describe briefly the organization of this Supervisory Union (No. 55), which includes the School Districts of Plaistow, Hampstead, Atkinson, Newton, and Salem.

In 1952, the total valuation of these districts was \$10,079,058.00, and the total school budgets for the 1952-53 school year amounts to \$411,408.01. There are 18 different buildings in use for school purposes — including two high schools, the Woodbury High School in Salem and the Hampstead High School. These buildings accommodate a total of 1,767 pupils. A total of 167 high school pupils are educated by the three districts not maintaining high schools, by sending them to neighboring high schools.

The districts within this Union employ 70 people, including the Superintendent of Schools, teachers, principals, school nurses, supervisors, and office personnel. Other school personnel, consisting of custodians and school lunch workers make a total of 91 employees within the Supervisory Union.

The School Boards of these 5 districts meet — as a Supervisory Union Board — once during the month of December as prescribed by law, to prepare a budget for the following school year (July 1 to June 30) of all expenses which are shared by these five districts, and again in the spring to nominate and set the salary of a superintendent and to employ other personnel which work for the Union. Each year these boards meet at other times to consider problems common to the group and to promote better educational opportunities for the children in their areas.

Expenses of the Supervisory Union include the salary of the superintendent of schools (a base amount of \$2,275.00 of which is paid by the State), the expenses of secretarial help and of the Supervisory Union office equipment and supplies, and other salaries and expenses as approved by the School Boards and by the districts. The Supervisory Union Board apportions the total amount of

the Union Budget among the five districts as prescribed by law, on the following basis: "The basis for the apportionment shall be one-half on the average membership for the previous year and one-half on the last assessed valuation of the district."\* Another expense of the Supervisory Union is the salary of the Elementary Consultant, a position which has been added since the last school year.

To fill the position of Elementary Consultant, the Boards selected Miss Natalie Hopkins of Manchester, New Hampshire. Miss Hopkins has had experience in teaching various grade combinations in public schools in New Hampshire before she returned to the Plymouth Teachers College in 1948 to complete requirements for the Bachelor's Degree. While at Plymouth, she served in the teacher training school of that college. During 1950-52, she attended Columbia Teachers College and received her Master's Degree in Education.

Mrs. Blanche Turner and Miss Lillian Chmielecki continue their outstanding work as secretary and assistant secretary respectively in the Supervisory Union office, which is located in the new Central School in Salem.

In addition to the items mentioned above which are common to the whole Supervisory Union, all districts except Salem, share in the expenses of a school nurse and of a supervisor of vocal music.

To replace Mrs. Jessie Soule, who had served as school nurse in Supervisory Union No. 55 for 13 years, and who accepted a full-time position in Salem as of September 1952, the School Boards of Atkinson, Hampstead, Newton and Plaistow employed Gwendolyn Curtis of Plaistow. Miss Curtis received her training at Worcester State Hospital and Boston City Hospital, both in Massachusetts, and has done private and special duty nursing during the past 21 years. She attended a two-week workshop for school nurse-teachers at Plymouth Teachers College during the past summer, and received 6 credits in public health and school nursing at the Plattsburg, New York, Teachers College.

To replace Mrs. Prudence Douglas, who had served for the past two years as supervisor of vocal music, the

School Boards of Atkinson, Plaistow, Hampstead and Newton secured the services of Carlton Thorne of Medford, Massachusetts, on a basis of  $3\frac{1}{2}$  days per week. Mr. Thorne graduated from Lowell Teachers' College in 1952, and had done cadet teaching in the public schools of Lowell and Somerville, Massachusetts.

The Boards of Education Supervisory Union No. 55 use their educational resources to the imperative of building a peaceful world by teaching and practicing democratic human relations in the schools.

### ENROLLMENT AND SCHOOL CENSUS

As had been predicted in the last annual report, 60 children entered Grade 1 in September 1952 and necessitated an additional teacher. Results of the 1952 school census, as printed below, indicate the need for another primary teacher for September 1953.

With the new four-room addition, which is presently under construction and described more in detail in this report under the heading SCHOOL BUILDINGS, we will have one "Spare" classroom in September, 1953, but will probably need that room in September, 1954. The present census figures and the possible continued birth rate in Plaistow — in addition to the possible numbers who may move into town in the near future, may require still more building facilities in the relatively near future.

The following tabulation shows the number of pupils per grade in the Pollard School as of September, 1952, and the numbers of high school pupils per grade who attend Haverhill High School, Haverhill Trade School and Sanborn Seminary in Kingston:

### PERSONNEL

Except for two additional teachers, as provided for at the 1952 annual School District Meeting, teachers of the Pollard School are in the same positions as they were during the past year.

As an additional teacher in the present large first grade, your School Board employed Mrs. Edna French (of Sandown, New Hampshire) who had been teaching primary grades in the Epping Central School for several years.

George Hamilton of Northbridge, Massachusetts, was selected as the additional teacher in the 7th and 8th grades. He was graduated from Bates College in 1951 and received a Master's Degree in Education at Boston University in 1952. Previous to graduating from Bates, Mr. Hamilton had done practice teaching in the public schools of Auburn, Maine.

According to School Census figures, one additional primary teacher will be needed for September, 1953.

Mr. Emmet Cronin of Plaistow has replaced Louis Heil as school custodian since the last school year.

All Plaistow teachers have continued to belong to the local, state and national professional teacher organizations. Several of the Plaistow teachers took advantage of an extension course in Guidance which was taught by Mr. John Radasch, the Director of Guidance with the State Department of Education, during the latter part of the 1951-52 school year. Two of our teachers in Plaistow have just completed a course in Art Education which was taught in Salem by Dr. Alice Baumgartner, the Director of Art Education with our State Department of Education, assisted by Mr. John Sawyer, the Director of Art Education in the public schools of Needham, Massachusetts.

The present budget provides for a total increase of \$4,115.30 for teachers' salaries for next year (this amount includes for one additional teacher). The following survey of salaries which are being paid by other districts throughout the State, indicates that the Plaistow teachers are still paid at a rate considerably below those in other districts. We have been fortunate to keep the number of pupils per teacher reasonably low in comparison to other districts.

## CURRICULUM AND EXTENDED SCHOOL SERVICES

In the elementary grades we continue to stress **training for citizenship** with emphasis on the fundamentals, physical welfare of the children, social studies and elementary science. Since the discontinuance of an Art Supervisor for the schools, the teachers have continued with art as a part of the total offerings, but it would be of value to the esthetic lives of the children to employ an art supervisor when the finances permit. Art Education provides an excellent opportunity for self-expression which is so important in the modern educational picture.

Although reports of Principal Dolph and Miss Hopkins (Elementary Consultant) discuss in some detail some phases of teaching, audio-visual aids and testing, it is well to emphasize that teachers in Plaistow have had the advantage of professional help in reading and in testing, from professional specialists provided by various publishers. Our testing program has included mental maturity, standardized achievement, interest inventories, and various subject matter tests. It is through these aids that all school personnel is able to better understand and therefore offer greater assistance to the individual child.

## THE "NEW ADDITION" AND THE SCHOOL BUILDING

Since the Annual Meeting of March, 1952, when the District voted to raise \$85,000 for an addition to the Pollard School, the school board and the Consultative Committee (which was invited by the School Board to work with the Board on the new construction plans), learned that \$85,000 would not pay all costs of constructing the four rooms and providing a new driven well, a new pump, new toilets and toilet area and a heating plant, and therefore, on July 15, 1952, a special School District Meeting was held at which time the District voted to raise an additional \$7,500, making a total of \$92,500 available for the project.

Meetings were held by the School Board and Superintendent with the Architect (Irving Hersey of Durham, New Hampshire) and with the Consultative Committee which was comprised of the following — Arthur Colcord,

John Marshall, Mrs. Frances Bramley, Norman Roberts, John Palmer, Ellsworth Reed, Mrs. Maude Duston, and Wallace Card. The general contract was given to Blanchard Stebbins Construction Company of Manchester.

As a matter of interest and of record, the following parts of the total project were awarded as follows: Drilling a well to McCue and Greenwood, Artesian Well Drill Company of Nashua, New Hampshire at a contract cost of \$5.94 per foot; the well is 233 feet deep.

The School Board has continued with its planned program of repainting two classrooms each year in the existing building and of covering the old floors with asphalt tile as finances permit. One floor was covered during the past year. Many minor repairs have been necessary to keep the building in good general condition and to improve its usefulness.

With the continued increase in enrollment, it is necessary for best results, to increase the size of the outdoor play area. Plans are being made to clear the present school grounds of bushes and to level the outlying areas. It is hoped that the District may be able to acquire additional land in the area of the present school grounds, in the near future.

## TRANSPORTATION

In spite of larger numbers of children, the School Board, in co-operation with the late Mr. Gordon Merrick, who has transported school children in Plaistow for several years, has been able, after rearranging routes and schedules, to carry on a reasonable program with only minor increases in expenditure during the current year. During the early weeks of the current school year, it was necessary to set up some new requirements as to what children might be allowed to ride. The following regulations as adopted by the School Board on September 18, 1952, are being followed at the present time:

1. All children in grades 1-6 will be transported to school if they live one mile or over from school. By special action of the Board on individual cases, some children in grades 1-3 may be allowed to ride within the one mile limit.
  - (a) Pupils whose physical condition, as certified by a physician, makes it unwise for them to

walk, will be allowed to ride until such condition is corrected.

2. Pupils in the 7th and 8th grades will be allowed to ride beyond the one-mile limit, up to the legal capacity of the bus. In cases where the limit would be exceeded, each pupil will be required to relinquish his place on the bus in the order of his nearness to the school.

In order to care for anticipated increases in enrollment next year, the proposed budget for 1953-54 provides for an increase of \$1,000 for this phase of the school program.

## FINANCES

School costs, as do most others, continue to increase. It is believed that all people who are familiar with our present educational program will agree that all district monies are wisely spent. Plaistow continues to spend less per pupil than most districts in New Hampshire.

"Higher prices in the past decade have reduced the value of the teacher's dollar, just as they have reduced the value of everybody's dollar. Two other problems, however, are even more acute for teachers. First, even before prices began to rise, teachers' incomes were far below professional levels. And second, the salaries of teachers have lagged behind or barely kept pace with the advancing level of wages and salaries of other workers."\*

Plaistow received \$12,803.29 in the form of State Aid to Education for the current school year. The amount of State Aid which Plaistow would receive for the next two years is dependent upon the formula adopted by the 1951 State Legislature. A proposed bill requests \$1,200,000 as compared to the \$600,000 raised during each of the past two years.

The following statements are taken from a recent Educational Survey Bulletin — "It costs a lot of money to run the country's school system — about \$6 billion a year for operating expenses and buildings. For the nation as a whole, the estimated expenditures for a pupil in average daily attendance is \$216. However, our nation spent 3 times as much last year for alcoholic beverages, tobacco and cosmetics as for the education of 25 million boys and

girls of school age.”†

The following quote from Dwight D. Eisenhower, further emphasizes the need for continued support of the educational program — “To neglect our school system would be a crime against the future. Such neglect would well be more disastrous to all our freedoms than the most formidable assault on our physical defense — Where our schools are concerned, no external threat can excuse negligence, no menace justify a halt to progress.”

### COMMUNITY ORGANIZATIONS

The Plaistow Parent-Teacher Association continues to maintain a wholesome and positive interest in school affairs. It is through this organization that parents and teachers have an opportunity to become better acquainted and therefore, through a better understanding of mutual problems, to more effectively work with the children. The continued efforts of the Association in furthering the Lunch Program have been most appreciated by the community.

### CONCLUSION

Looking at Education “Nationwide,” we find that the following recommendations may be put into practice in the future:

- (1) More television channels assigned to education
- (2) More new classrooms to meet a national shortage of a half a million instructional units.
- (3) More vocational programs
- (4) Set up foreign language instruction in lower grades
- (5) More time for world affairs and foreign policy in high schools

Again I wish to thank the members of the School Board and all others with whom I have worked to make the schools effective.

**REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL**

To Mr. Jonathan A. Osgood, Superintendent of Schools:

I hereby submit my second annual report as Principal of the Pollard School. The report is divided into the following topics as listed below.

1. Viewpoints of Education
2. Enrollment
3. Activities
4. Pollard School Staff
5. Hot Lunch Program
6. Shop and Home Economics
7. Recommendations

**1. Viewpoints of Education**

Communities with good programs of education for all children and youth are marked by certain attitudes and activities. Adults in such communities show sincere interest in all children. They seem to say, "Our children are important to us. We want to give them a better chance than we had. We consider the children of fundamental importance to our community, dependent upon us, and fully entitled to our consideration. They are our present investment in the world of tomorrow."

The interest and co-operation of the citizens of Plais-tow is to be commended. Their efforts have secured a much-needed addition to the old building and many needed improvements to the present building.

## **2. Pollard School Enrollment**

The enrollment is now at the 318 mark and the school census indicates that we may expect at least 48 new first graders next September.

The estimated enrollment by grades for next September is as follows:

## **3. Activities**

A. Mr. Hamilton, junior high instructor, coached a touch football team composed of 6, 7 and 8th grade boys. The boys enjoyed several inter-school games with Hampstead, Atkinson, Newton and Kingston.

B. Mrs. Louise Jackson and Mr. Carlton Thorne provide leadership for the Treble Cleff Choristers, a singing group composed of 5, 6, 7 and 8th grade students.

C. Mr. Carlton Thorne, the music supervisor, has been successful in beginning an instrumental music program. The students either rent or buy an instrument and Mr. Thorne provides group lessons at a reasonable fee. It is hoped that this will be the beginning of a future Pollard School Band.

D. The 7th and 8th grades have elected class officers who take charge at the regular meetings. They have enjoyed several social events including many roller skating

parties and dances. The grades are supervised by Mrs. Helen Dilendik and Mr. George Hamilton.

E. The playground safety patrol under the leadership of Mrs. Ruth Cook has assumed duties of traffic control during the time students are walking to and from the Town Hall for hot lunch, another group help the teachers on playground duty to supervise the children at play. The boys and girls in this important organization are to be commended for doing a difficult task well.

#### **4. Pollard School Staff**

This is my annual opportunity to publicly thank the teachers. They continue to do an excellent job. I have found them to be sincere, conscientious and understanding. I also would like to take this opportunity to invite parents having questions or problems to visit the school and talk with the teachers concerned.

#### **5. Hot Lunch**

The Parent-Teacher Association again is providing sponsorship for the hot lunch program. We are fortunate to have an excellent hot lunch program and can only attribute it to the efforts of many townspeople who in realizing the need for the program helped to move it into the Town Hall when space was not available at the school any longer. Men and women volunteers scrubbed the kitchen, set up tables, moved supplies and did countless other jobs to enable the lunch program to begin.

Mrs. Marion Roberts is again serving as chairman of the hot lunch committee, this position entails bookkeeping, ordering of supplies, trips to the Exeter Frozen Food Locker, reports to the State Supervisor of hot lunches, and many other time consuming jobs.

Mrs. Ruth Pineo, Mrs. Marie Cheney and Mrs. Mildred Libby help to plan the menus and do the preparing of the food for the lunch. The meals are excellent and cost \$1 per week, this price includes 30¢ which goes for the payment of milk. This cost of 14¢ per meal which includes a balanced diet is thought to be reasonable in view of the high cost of food.

#### **6. Shop and Home Economics**

This year we were able to increase the shop time for the boys in grades 7 and 8 because of the additional teacher

hired last September in the Junior High section. It is planned to extend the shop training to boys in the 6th grade as soon as the new building is complete and the shop is relocated in the room in the basement that the 8th grade is now using for a classroom.

Home Economics forms a vital part of our school program which has for its objective the general education of children for personal and family living.

Students worked in groups of four, planning together, dividing responsibilities, and later sharing products, general information and personal observation with the whole class.

Along with the teaching of sewing we try to develop in the students a knowledge of what constitutes good taste in dress and an awareness of what types of clothes are best suited to their own figures and personalities.

The girls in our food class took a trip to Thompson's Restaurant in North Andover. Here they put into practice what they are learning about good table manners.

As a culminating activity in cooking, the girls held a tea for the mothers that participated in the Hot Lunch Program.

## **7. Recommendations**

A. The playground will be too small for our school population and needs to be leveled in the back and widened if possible.

B. That consideration be given to the possibility of Pollard school boys basketball, either by the making of a hot top court on the playground or by allowing supervised play in the Town Hall. We have a Physical education program at school that has to come to an abrupt end at the beginning of bad winter weather.

C. The present Playground equipment consists of one small slide, six swings, four seesaws and a jungle gym which are inadequate for a school with over 300 boys and girls.

## REPORT OF ELEMENTARY CONSULTANT

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To Mr. Jonathan A. Osgood, Superintendent of Schools:

I hereby submit my first annual report as Elementary Consultant of the Pollard School in Plaistow.

It is most difficult for me to put into words the deep feeling of gratitude I have for all the members of our staff, the children in our school and the people of the community for so graciously making me one of them.

The first few months of the year, I spent becoming acquainted with our schools, our teachers, our children, and our parents.

It was amazing to find so many new and excellent text books in the hands of our children. This, however, does not mean that there are a sufficient number. For example: the basic reader in use is one of the best but we need to supplement this with others. It is important to have a variety of reading books in order to meet the interest and reading level of all the children. The interest variance is understandable but it must also be realized that the reading levels, in one classroom, may range from one to five years either above or below the actual grade placement. To help the children, there should be in each classroom a library of easy to read books for fun and reference books, gradated in difficulty, for use in the content subjects such as, history, geography and science.

It is a pleasure to see the fine work being carried on in our classrooms by the teachers of Plaistow. Our children are working in classrooms where a healthy, happy environment exists. In order to help the teachers individualize their instruction, achievement tests were given to all the children, except first graders, in the Pollard School in November. This type test shows the strengths and weaknesses of the pupil's academic skills in reading, language, arithmetic, spelling, science, geography and history. The results of these tests indicate that not all of our children have achieved as much as their ability permits.

The parents might help by visiting schools often so that there might be better understanding between parent and teacher and closer cooperation between home and school.

A test of mental maturity was given to all the fourth graders this fall. The results of this test helps us to determine whether or not a child is working to capacity. Sometimes, we as educators without such helps, are likely to expect more of a child than he is capable of doing, or quite the opposite, we might be satisfied with the results another child shows us when it is far below his potential.

There has been in use in our schools a Permanent Record sheet for each child where pertinent data is kept. In addition to this, there has been started a cumulative record folder for each child where more and varied results of his school career can be kept. This should prove beneficial to the present teacher, the teacher next in line, the administrator and to the child himself.

Much of my work has been chatting with children who have problems—helping them to understand these problems and trying to find solutions for them. This is carried further by talking with the teachers and parents of these children so that they, too, may better understand this child and his problem.

Now that the teachers and I are better acquainted, meetings are being held throughout the Union to discuss such topics as primary reading, intermediate arithmetic, spelling and handwriting. The discussion topic comes as a request from teachers.

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## REPORT OF SUPERVISOR OF MUSIC

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To Mr. Jonathan A. Osgood, Superintendent of Schools:

I herewith submit my annual report as Supervisor of Music at the Pollard School in Plaistow, N. H.

The program of music in the primary grades has consisted of an abundance of good rate songs, good singing habits action songs, rhythm training, rhythm band, pleasing tone quality, dynamics, and interpretation. Whenever possible help should be given the individual uncertain singer. Grades two and three along with their rate sing-

ing, have worked on rate-note songs from the book in preparation for music reading.

Because I believe that children should be given the opportunity to experience as many phases of music as possible, I have tried to encourage their interest in instrumental music as well as vocal. The children have not only heard the instruments being played but have also seen them and actually handled them. This experience has contributed a great deal to the children's understanding and appreciation of music.

Boys and girls of intermediate grades and junior high school age have been given the opportunity to study a musical instrument through the school. At the present time there are eleven children studying a musical instrument by means of this class instruction: Three clarinets, five trumpet players, one saxophone player, one violinist, and one drummer. Increased participation in this instrumental work could very well lead to an elementary school band or orchestra in the future.

In the intermediate grades the vocal program has included rate singing, rate-note singing, music reading, work on expression and dynamics, unison singing, two-part music, and folk songs.

Children in grades seven and eight have worked on rate songs, unison singing, some part singing, and have been introduced to elementary music theory, and harmony.

The Pollard School is quite proud of its glee club, the Treble Clef Choristers. This is part of a select group and its members are chosen from try-outs which are given in the early part of the year. These children elect their own officers and pay monthly dues which are toward music and trip expenses. Much of the glee club's success is due to the expert guidance of Mrs. Louise Jackson who takes an active part in the group. The glee club works mostly on three part music for mixed voices. This year they have sung in the school as part of the school's Christmas program. Presently the group is working in preparation for two performances; one being held as a program at a P T A meeting and the other being a trip to Ossippee, N. H. where the group has been invited to give a program for the elementary school children there.

This glee club experience certainly gives the children a foundation for future progress and enjoyment in music and provides an excellent opportunity for teamwork and social relationship.

The Principal, teachers, and myself have selected an operetta to be given by the pupils of the Pollard School in April. Its name is "Behind Castle Walls". I firmly believe that this undertaking will be a most valuable experience for those who participate in it since it offers a challenge for the pupils. It will be an all-school project and will give an opportunity for teamwork, interpreting music with art, dramatics, manual training, and community relationship.

I'm sure that the children's experience with music this year has been most valuable.

It has not been my purpose to make music an end in itself, but to have it take an active part in the general education and up-bringing of the children.

In closing I should like to thank, Superintendent Osgood, Principal Dolph, and all the teachers for their cooperation and kindness. All this has made my initial teaching experience most pleasant and valuable.

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## REPORT OF THE SCHOOL NURSE

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To Mr. Jonathan A. Osgood, Superintendent of Schools:

Complete medical examination are being given to pupils in grades one, four and eight by Dr. Robert Tower, M. D. I feel this program is of benefit to the pupils.

Notification of all defects found was sent home and referral work followed up where necessary.

Pre-school round-up for children entering school in September was held in June at which time I assisted Mrs.

Soule. The home room teacher, Principal and nurse-teacher were present to meet the parents and children. Health histories and registration were taken at this time.

Routine visits were made to all class rooms to check on conditions, give health talks and to instruct pupils in Posture Classes, which have been started this year, and to check on absenteeism.

Many home visits have been made this year to discuss physical defects and other problems, to obtain a better understanding of what may be accomplished by the health program in the school. Home visitations help the parents and nurse-tacher to become better acquainted and build up a feeling of mutual understanding, sympathy and friendliness by working together for the Welfare of the child.

The Supervisory Union Districts in which I work are purchasing a Massachusetts Vision Test also a Color Vision Tester which is being introduced into our schools for the first time this year. This test is for color blindness and will be done in the fifth grade only, after upper grades have been tested this year.

The Health Education Program is greatly augmented by the use of audio-visual material obtained through the courtesy of the New Hampshire Board of Health. Films such as How to Catch a Cold — Dental Health — Priceless Cargo — Student Flyer — The Safest Way and many others have been shown to give a background of clearly applied health information based on scientific knowledge so that the pupils might learn to take responsibilities in regards to their own health behavior.

At the November P.T.A. Meeting films were shown to the parents by the nurse-teacher. They were "Why Tommy Won't Eat" and "Angry Boy."

The nurse-teacher is no longer merely employed to administer First-Aid, check Heights and Weights, do routine cursory examinations, Visual and Hearing Tests, Color vision test, assist the physician in medical examinations, transport sick children to their homes but works with the Principal and teachers in a close link between the class room and the home and is often called upon to

act as an interpreter of the school program and individual homes and to acquaint the school personnel with conditions in the home. She is often consulted by pupil, teacher and parent in conjunction with the school health program, home and personal problems.

It is impossible to evaluate the many benefits derived from the school health program. The benefits of the program are often felt by the pupil throughout his life.

In conclusion I wish to express my appreciation for the fine co-operation of the School Committee, Mr. Osgood, Mr. Dolph, Parents and teachers and local organizations. My work would have been quite futile without their interest and support.
