TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Plaistow in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Plaistow on Tuesday, the thirteenth of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles:

- Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- Article 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$150.00 to acquire Broad Form Money and Securities Insurance for one year, indemnifying the Town and its Officers against the loss of Town funds due to Hold-up, Burglary, Damage or Destruction caused by Fire, Flood and/or other manner of loss not now covered under present Town Officers' performance Bonds.
- Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to continue the sidewalk construction program and to raise and appropriate funds for same.
- Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow and have made copies of the old Merrill family maps and to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed the sum of \$300.00 to cover costs of copying and insuring said maps while in the possession of Agents of the Town.

- Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to accept the zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Zoning Commission appointed by the Moderator as directed by vote of the Town.
- Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$300.00 for the printing in pamphlet form (a) the Building Zone Ordinance and (b) the Zoning Ordinance proposed by the Zoning Commission and as voted by the Town.
- Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Planning Board of five members with duties as set forth in Sections 1-15, Chapter 36, N. H. Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955, to make a study for the promotion and maintenance of the Town's best development. The Board members shall consist of one Selectman and four other citizens appointed by the Selectmen, as provided in Sections 1-15, Chapter 36, N. H. Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955.
- Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize and empower the Planning Board to approve or disapprove, in its discretion, plats showing new streets or the widening thereof, or parks, and upon adoption of this article it shall be the duty of the Town Clerk to file with the Registry of Deeds of the County of Rockingham, a certificate or note showing that the said planning Board has been so authorized, giving the date of authorization, as provided in Sections 19-29 inclusive, Chapter 36, N. H. Revised Laws Annotated, 1955.
- Article 10. To see if the Town will vote (a) to transfer the sum of \$4,000.00 from the unencumbered Surplus of the Town as of December 31, 1955 to the "Fire Truck Purchase Account" and (b) to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 to be deposited to the same account.
- Article 11. To see if the Town will vote (a) to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to be deposited to the War Memorial Fund; to rescind that portion or those portions of Article 15 of the 1954 Warrant which pertain(s) to the location and purchase of a site and (c)

to authorize the Committee appointed by the Moderator to call upon the Selectmen to disburse from said War Memorial Fund for the acquisition and/or development of a suitable War Memorial.

- Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 for the control of Dutch Elm Disease.
- Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for Civil Defense.
- Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to accept Kingshaw Avenue, running in an Easterly direction between South Main Street and Forrest Street. (By Petition.)
- Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$1,000.00 for the repair or removal of damaged or diseased townowned trees and the replacement of same wherever possible. (By Petition.)
- Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to amend Section (a), Article 7 of the 1953 Warrant to read as follows: To allow a 3 percent discount for payment of taxes within thirty (30) days of issue of tax bills but not later than October 1st in any year EXCEPTING in those years when tax bills are issued after September 15th whereupon the 3 percent discount shall be allowed for a period of fifteen (15) days from date of issue but in no case later than November 1st in any year. (By Petition.)
- Article 17. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- Article 18. Shall the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to playing games of Beano be adopted in this Town.
- Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to accept as submitted the reports of Agents, Auditors and other Officers and Committees heretofore appointed.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN

Statement of Condition

The Town of Plaistow closed the year with an unexpended balance of the 1955 Appropriations amounting to \$11,124.09.

The Town Surplus at December 31, 1954 was \$7,777.12. From this figure, \$1,500.00 was transferred by vote of the Town into the Fire Truck Purchase Account and an additional \$3,378.48 was offset against the 1955 Appropriation to reduce the Tax Rate for 1955, leaving a balance in the Surplus Account amounting to \$2,898.64

The Town Surplus at December 31, 1955 was \$15,232.07, representing an increase at the year-end of \$12,333.43. Apart from the unexpended balance of the 1955 Appropriation (\$11,124.09), we received \$900.00

in reimbursements to the Town Poor Account and \$1,345.33 in reimbursements to the Old Age Assistance Account, these receipts being over and above those previously estimated.

The Surplus at December 31, 1955 amounting to \$15,232.07 is composed as follows: Cash \$10,712.62 Unredeemed Taxes, \$3,696.88 and Uncollected Taxes, \$822.57.

REPORT OF LIBRARIAN

Much of the reputation of the library in its community depends upon the success with which it handles its questions. Today every question is an individual problem. The requests are divided into three parts. The younger children learning to read, ask for books with words and pictures which they understand. The older students ask for biographies and encyclopedia study. This is a very important group, because these students will soon become our leaders in the community. To them, space ships, atomic energy, and speed is uppermost in

their minds. Then there is the group of mature readers who ask for historical novels, big business reports, and world affair items. Our current magazines and new books answer these questions.

In 1955 we tried to answer as well as possible the needs of the community.

The library held twelve story hour periods for the children during the summer vacation. These periods were well attended.

A new principal and five new teachers at the Pollard School created a need to get acquainted. For this need a tea was held at the library in September. The librarian explained the work of the library in cooperation with the school. The librarian wishes to thank Mr. Walter Leathe, principal, and the teachers for their fine cooperation.

A special hour is held each week for the bus children to visit the library. As many as a hundred children have enjoyed this period at one hour. Children coming to the library during school time are supervised by patrol leaders.

The Bookmobile made four visits during the year. Over four hundred books were also borrowed from the State Library for reference.

An interesting fact this year was the gain in circulation of books following some television programs. This shows the strong link between television and good reading.

Because of higher prices of books, some less in number were purchased. Books too high in price and low in demand were borrowed from the State Library.

A new book corner and new shelves were added this year. Our library and its needs are increasing. A small table and four chairs for little folk to enjoy while reading were purchased.

Patricia Judson, our able assistant, left to continue her schooling. Mrs. Virginia Robinson came in September. Her work with the Girl Scouts and with young children has been an asset to the librarian who has had more time to spend with the students.

The librarian wishes to thank the Custodian of Town

Hall, the Selectmen, and the Gazette reporter for their courtesy to her.

REPORT OF THE PLAISTOW BOARD OF HEALTH

During the year 1955, it has been my duty to report to the State Board of Health the following cases of contagious diseases; Chicken Pox, 9; Measles, 69; Mumps, 15; Whooping Cough, 12; German Measles, 1; Pneumonia, 1; Scarlet Fever, 3; Dog Bite, 5; Septic Sore Throat. 1; Tuberculosis, 2; Anterior Polio, 4; Total for the year 122 such cases. We experienced rather a severe epidemic of Measles, Whooping Cough and Mumps and it must be brought to the attention of all parents of children attending school that any evidence of any contagious disease in their children should be reported to the Board of Health and that the child or children should be kept out of school to prevent such an epidemic for it is by contact that cases do increase. All such cases should have medical attention.

There were six complaints relative to sanitary nuisances; these were seen and rectified to the best of our ability. 3 cases of infractions of the State Sanitary code were examined and rectified.

The Health Officer attended two Salk Vaccine clinics at the Pollard School, assisted by the School Nurse and State Nurses for the School District.

Two barbers and one hairdresser were examined and their premises inspected. Again the appeal to all Householders to report any contagious disease directly to the Board of Health giving residence, age, name of person and sex and be sure to have medical attention for same, since there were many cases thruout the town during the past year that had neither medical attention or were not reported.

If there are any complaints relative to sanitary nuisances or requests for information, they must be written and signed before they can be investigated according to the revised Laws.

CIVIL DEFENSE REPORT

At the present time, the Plaistow Civil Defense Agency consists of these separate units or departments, numbering some 90 men and women. These departments are as follows:

Auxiliary Police Nurse Corps Women's Emergency Feeding Unit

These units are either fully trained or are in training in order to be able to serve the people of Plaistow should disaster, either from war or natural causes, occur.

During 1955 we held one alert for our own test purposes and conducted one alert that was staged on a national scale. The response of the citizenry in both events was very satisfactory, and gratifying.

Should it become necessary to evacuate the town in

the advent of disaster, the necessary facilities are alerted and in readiness for such an eventuality.

We also have in readiness 2 emergency power generators that can supply power for a temporary hospital or any other critical need, in case regular sources of power fail. A communications system is being set up with the co-operation of Mr. M. J. Backard who is the head of our communications department.

We had a very bad season for playground activities, the heat and Polio combined. In spite of this we had very good attendance, both boys and girls. Mr. Bannon had the boys group and I had the girls. We both curtailed our work as did other playgrounds because of the heat.

The girls had various kinds of ball games, folk dancing, group singing, action songs, archery and hand work. The boys had ball games, relay racing, ball tossing and archery. There were competitive games between the boys and girls.

The program was planned so that the more active games were carried on in the early hours, and no one was forced into these games, if they preferred to do quiet work.

The smaller children played in the sand box or on the slides or swings with Miss Janet Cook supervising.

I would like to suggest that another year children be five years old to attend playground.

The most popular activities for girls is craft work, for boys, ball games.

I think Mr. Carl Bannon did very good work as the attendance showed the boys gave him their support. Both Mr. Bannon and myself want very much to tell the people of Plaistow what a pleasure it was to work with the children, out of such a large group we did not have one child to discipline, their behavior was perfect with us.

The daily average of attendance was 68 children, the third week having the largest enrollment. The total number of children for four weeks was 1,435.

PROPOSED ZONING ORDINANCE for the TOWN OF PLAISTOW, NEW HAMPSHIRE

ARTICLE I

Preamble

In pursuance of authority conferred by Chapter 31, Sections 60-89, N. H. Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955, and for the purpose of promoting the health, safety, morals, prosperity, convenience or general welfare, as well as efficiency and economy in the process of development of the incorporated Town of Plaistow, New Hampshire, by securing safety from fire, panic and other dangers, providing adequate areas between buildings and various rights of way, by preserving the rural charm now attached to our town, the promotion of good civic design and arrangements, wise and efficient expenditure of public funds, and the adequate provision of public utilities and other public requirements, and by other means, now therefore the following ordinance is hereby enacted by the voters of the Town of Plaistow, New Hampshire in official meeting convened.

ARTICLE II

Districts

For the purpose of this Ordinance the Town of Plaistow is divided into districts as shown on the Zoning map filed with the Town Clerk and dated Feb. 1, 1956, and including the following: (1) Residential District; (2) Commercial District; (3) Industrial District.

ARTICLE III

Definitions

For the purpose of this Ordinance, certain terms are defined as provided in this section.

A. Home produce and products means and includes everything of an agricultural nature grown, produced, conditioned or otherwise carried on the property of the resident, also such articles as are manufactured or altered by members of the household of the bonafide resident of any property.

- B. Right of Way means and includes all town, state and federal highways and the land on either side of same as covered by statutes to determine the width of rights of way.
- C. Permanent residents. A family shall be considered permanent residents when they have used any building continuously as a residence for a period of six months or more.
- D. Tourist Home shall mean any place consisting of a room or groups of rooms located on one premises where transient accommodations for sleeping or living purposes for not more than six persons are provided for a price.
- **E.** Front Yard. A space extending for the full width of a lot between the extreme front line of a building and the nearest side of the right-of-way.
- F. Frontage shall mean the length of the lot bordering on the public right-of-way.
- G. Junk means any old metals, old bottles, cotton or woolen mills waste, unfinished cloth, unfinished cotton or woolen mill yarns, old paper products, old rubber products, two or more unregistered motor vehicles and other second hand articles the accumulation of which is detrimental or injurious to the neighborhood.
- H. Nonconforming use means a building, structure or use of land existing at the time of enactment of this Ordinance and which does not conform to the regulations of the district in which it is situated.
- I. Trailer camp means a land area, occupied or designed for occupancy by two or more trailers or camp cars in use for living purposes.
- J. Industry is the gainful activity involved in producing, distributing and changing the form of raw materials, or of assembling components and parts, packaging, warehousing and transporting finished products; such production involves the employment of management, labor, machinery and real estate to create tangible products, or utility services having value.

ARTICLE IV

General Provisions

- A. No junk yard or place for the storage of discarded machinery, vehicles, or other scrap materials shall be maintained in any District, except that after public hearing in which evidence on both sides is heard, the Board of Adjustment shall have authority to decide whether the permit shall be issued or not.
- B. No owner or occupant of land in any District shall permit fire or other ruins to be left but shall remove the same within two years.
- C. Any uses that may be obnoxious or injurious by reason of the production or emission of odor, dust, smoke, refuse matter, fumes, noise, vibrations, or similar conditions, or that are dangerous to the comfort, peace, enjoyment, health or safety of the community or that contribute to its disturbance or annoyance are prohibited in any District.
- D. No trailer park shall be permitted in the Town in any District.

ARTICLE V

Residential District

The following provisions shall apply to the Residential District:

- 1. It shall be a district mainly of residences.
- 2. No building shall house more than two families as permanent residents.
- 3. There shall be between the nearest right-of-way and the extreme front of any building a yard having a minimum depth of thirty feet; but said minimum depth may be less than thirty feet if in conformity with the yards on ajoining lots. No building shall be located within ten feet of the side property line.
- 4. Each lot shall have a frontage of at least 100 feet, except that where lots are not rectangular the mean width shall be 100 feet. No lot shall be less than 15,000 square feet in area.

- 5. No cesspool or sewage disposal area, shall be constructed less than 75 feet from the edge of a public water body or from a well; or 20 feet from an adjoining property line.
- 6. Residences may be used to house such uses by owner or tenants as offices for doctor, engineer, architect, lawyer, real estate and insurance agents and brokers, or other recognized home occupations.
- 7. Home produce and products may be sold and exposed for sale in this district.
- 8. The growing of horticultural products, greenhouses, nurseries or other limited production of agricultural or farm products is permitted. Farming on a commercial level, or on other than a limited scale may be carried on under special permit of the Board of Adjustment.
- 9. Property owners conducting enterprises shall be allowed two advertising signs for produce sold on the premises, each sign not to total over fifteen square feet in area; also one or more signs pertaining to the lease, sale or use of a lot or building on which placed, which shall not exceed a total of five square feet.
- 10. Tourist homes may be maintained and operated in this district.
- 11. Churches, schools, hospitals and rest homes or convalescent homes are permitted in this district.

ARTICLE VI

The following shall be permitted in the Commercial District:

- 1. Any use permitted in the Residential District under the same provisions as apply to residences in that district.
- 2. Lodging houses, apartment houses, hotels, motels, tourist courts or cabins, including such retail businesses within these permitted buildings as are conducted for the convenience of the residents or guests.
- 3. Shops, restaurants and other retail and wholesale businesses.

- 4. Garages, other than garages for the housing, maintenance and dispatching of fleets of more than three commercial vehicles; parking lots and filling stations.
- 5. Business offices and banks.
- 6. Light industry under special permit of the Board of Adjustment.
- 7. There shall be between the nearest right-of-way and the extreme front of any building a yard having a minimum depth of thirty feet; but said minimum depth may be less than thirty feet if in conformity with the yards on adjoining lots. No building shall be located within ten feet of the side property line.
- 8. If any proposed use is such as to attract vehicles, ample space shall be provided on the property to accommodate all such vehicles attracted by the business.
- The Building Inspector, upon application for a permit 9. for the construction of a commercial building within a 500 foot radius of any established residence shall withhold action upon such permit for a period of two weeks, and shall forthwith send by certified mail, return receipt requested, to the owner or occupant of each such residence, notice of such application. The cost of such notice is to be borne by the applicant. Any such owner or occupant who shall object to the issuance of such permit, shall then file his objection. together with a request for a public hearing, with the Chairman or Acting Chairman of the Board of Adjustment. If no objection is filed, such permit may be issued at the expiration of the two week waiting period. If such objection is filed, the permit may be issued only upon the authorization of the Board of Adjustment after a public hearing.

This provision shall apply only to the owner or occupants of such residences at the time of the passage of this ordinance, and not to those who become such

owners or occupants after its passage.

ARTICLE VII

Industrial District

1. Residences shall not be permitted in the Industrial District.

2. Industrial uses of land and buildings may be permitted if approved, after public hearing, by the Board of Adjustment in accordance with such conditions, restrictions and safeguards as may be deemed necessary by the Board for the purpose of protecting the health, safety and general welfare of the community from the emission of dust, smoke, odor, noise or vibration.

ARTICLE VIII

Nonconforming Uses

- A. Any nonconforming use other than uses specified in B and C below may continue in their present use except that any nonconforming use or building may not be:
- 1. Changed to another nonconforming use;
- 2. Re-established after discontinuance for one year except to a use conforming to the District in which it is located;
- 3. Extended;
- B. No junk yard may continue as a nonconforming use for more than one year after the effective date of this Ordinance without special permit from the Board of Adjustment. The Board of Adjustment shall prescribe the conditions under which special permit shall be granted.
- C. No outdoor advertising structure may continue as a nonconforming use for more than two years after the effective date of this Ordinance unless it is designed to direct attention to a business or profession conducted on the premises.

ARTICLE IX

Enforcement

- 1. It shall be the duty of the Board of Selectmen, and the Board is hereby given power and authority to enforce the provisions of this Ordinance.
- 2. There shall be an Inspector of Buildings who shall administer the provisions of the Ordinance.

- 3. The Building Inspector shall issue any and all building permits requested when such permit is in accordance with the provisions of this ordinance.
- 4. Permits: After passage of this Ordinance, it shall be unlawful to erect any building or relocate any building in any district without first obtaining a building permit from the Building Inspector.
- 5. Upon any well founded information that this Ordinance is being violated the selectmen shall take immediate steps to enforce the provisions of this Ordinance by seeking an injunction in the Superior Court or by any other legal action.

ARTICLE X

Board of Adjustment

Within thirty days after the adoption of this Ordinance and thereafter as terms expire or vacancies occur, the moderator, with the consent of the Board of Selectmen, shall make appointments to a Board of Adjustment of five members conforming in duties to the provisions of Chapter 31 of the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955. Thereafter as terms expire or vacancies occur, the appointing authority shall be responsible for filling vacancies and maintaining full membership in the Board of Adjustment. The Board of Adjustment shall conform in membership and term of office to the provisions of Section 67, Chapter 31 N. H. Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955.

ARTICLE XI

Amendments

This Ordinance may be amended by a majority vote of any legal town meeting when such amendment is published in the warrant calling for the meeting, and when such amendment has received a public hearing, which hearing has been advertised and given a legal fifteen day notice.

ARTICLE XII

Saving Clause

The invalidity of any provision of this Ordinance shall not affect the validity of any other provision.

ARTICLE XIII

When Effective

This Ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

To the Inhabitants of the School district in the town of Plaistow qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the tenth day of March 1956, at six o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- Article 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
 - Article 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- Article 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
- Article 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- Article 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- Article 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- Article 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- Article 8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
- Article 9. To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to issue bonds or notes in an amount not to exceed sixty thousand dollars (\$60,000) payable

from funds to be raised by taxation, for the purpose of financing the cost of constructing and equipping an addition to the Pollard School, and to authorize the School Board to execute any and all contracts or agreements necessary and proper or advisable in connection with the construction and equipping of an addition to the Pollard School.

Article 10. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate \$900.00 to pay the first-year interest payment on the bond issue for the addition to the Pollard School.

Article 11. To see if the district will authorize the School Board to make application for and to receive, in the name of the district, such advances, grants-in-aid or other funds for educational purposes, as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from Federal, State, local or private Agencies.

Article 12. To transact any further business that may legally come before the meeting.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

February, 1956

To the School Board and Citizens of Plaistow:

I am presenting herewith my Sixth Annual Report as Superintendent of Schools. This report is written under the main headings: Supervisory Union No. 55; The Teacher Situation; Housing; Enrollments; Proposed Addition to the Pollard School; Bonded Indebtedness and Borrowing Capacity; Books and other Teaching Aids and Community Organizations.

Following this report are tabulations showing: New Teachers for 1955-56; Enrollments of Plaistow Children and Tuition Charges in High Schools; Enrollments and Teachers in Pollard School, showing numbers of children per teacher and per grade; Census Report; Numbers of children age 0-18 years of age by age groups and by years (1951-55); Statistics for 1954-55 School Year; Federally-Aided Lunch Programs and School Calendar.

SUPERVISORY UNION No. 55

For the information of people who are new to the area, this Supervisory Union, as organized by our State Department of Education, is composed of the School Districts of Atkinson, Hampstead, Newton. Plaistow and Salem. The number of schools, pupils, teachers, the assessed valuation and total school budget in each district is shown in the following tabulation:

As compared with the other forty-seven supervisory unions in New Hampshire, this one is fourteenth from the largest in number of teachers and tenth from the largest in the number of pupils. Personnel employed by the five school boards making up the Supervisory Union Board to work throughout the five districts, consists of the Superintendent of Schools, an Elementary Consultant, a school secretary and clerk. One music supervisor and one school nurse-teacher is employed by Atkinson, Plaistow, Hampstead and Newton collectively.

Robert Dolph of Wilmington, California has recently been employed to replace Natalie Hopkins, who had so effectively served this Supervisory Union as Elementary Consultant for the past four years, and who accepted a similar position in Connecticut as of December 15, 1955. Mr. Dolph, a graduate of Buffalo, New York State Teachers College, has had experience in the Rollinsford, New Hampshire Elementary School, the Bourne, Massachusetts High School, the Salem Central School and was principal of the Pollard School in Plaistow from September 1951 to June 1955. He completed work for a Masters' Degree in Education at the University of New Hampshire in August of 1955. Mr. Dolph returns to this area with a knowledge of the general school area and with a personal and professional acquaintance with most of the principals and teachers. It is expected that his past experiences will be of much value to the work of the schools in this area in the future.

Miss Gwendolyn Curtis continues her excellent work during this, her fourth year as school nurse-teacher for Atkinson, Hampstead, Newton and Plaistow. In addition to her routine work, she is alert and attentive to various specific health problems that occur in the schools and in the community, and is prompt to arrange for various clinics in cooperation with county and state policies and programs. Perhaps the most unusual clinic during the current year has been "Polio Shots" for all children up to fourteen years of age. More details of the work of the nurse-teacher appear later in this report.

Robert Wood, a graduate of the College of Music, Boston University, was chosen to replace Kenneth Jewett as Music Supervisor for Atkinson, Hampstead, Newton and Plaistow on a three-day-per-week schedule. Mr. Wood assists in carrying on the vocal work in the schools and is cooperative in preparing for community programs as persented by the children and regular teachers.

TEACHERS:

Last September six teachers were new to their respective positions. Walter Leathe who replaced Robert Dolph as principal and teacher of seventh and eighth grade subjects, is a graduate of Staley College and is completing work for a Masters degree in Education at Boston Teachers College. Mr. Leathe had been the teaching principal at Newbury, Mass. since 1951. Other teachers who were new to their respective positions this year are listed in a following tabulation.

Because of the shortage in teachers with training and experience in Mechanic Arts it was necessary to discontinue manual training instruction for the current year.

All teachers have continued membership in local, State and National professional teachers organizations and have attempted to keep abreast of modern practices by attendance at local and state teachers' meetings and by taking courses when possible.

Five of them are presently taking a course in Plaistow Teaching Arithmetic in the Elementary School, under the auspices of the University of New Hampshire.

Although teachers salaries in Plaistow compare favorably with other New Hampshire communities of similar size and wealth, more money must be provided for this important item in all localities.

In selecting teachers, our aim is to secure for every-classroom— for every group of children in our schools—a competent teacher who can create worthy ideals, right attitudes, and permanent life interests; who can help the children and youth of our generation to find worth-while work to do; who knows how to promote co-operation and develop the team spirit; who as an expert workman himself is able to direct the efforts of others to successful achievement.

A good school is a place where young people, of any age, come together to educate themselves and each other, with the effective guidance of inspiring teachers.

HOUSING:

Your School Board has continued to maintain and improve the physical condition of the Pollard School. Important improvements made since the last annual report have included exterior and some interior painting of the school building, and the removal of the old, unused chimney and outmoded ventilation system to the roof level. This project eliminated safety hazards and will prevent a tremendous loss of heat through the attic area.

The hot-topping of a driveway around the school was completed; it is now possible for the school buses to pick up students at either entrance of the building on stormy days.

With the Home Economics room in the basement area being used as a temporary classroom and with an expected first grade enrollment of fifty-three for September 1956, it is evident that there should be two additional classrooms ready for occupancy, as soon as possible, for the 1956-57 school year.

ENROLLMENT

Total enrollment in Pollard School increased from 293 in 1950 to 365 as of November 14, 1955. From a careful study of past first grade enrollments as compared to the numbers of births of Plaistow people six years earlier and of the 1955 school census, it appears that the first grades for 1955 to 1960 will have enrollments of 53, 53, 65, 49, and 72. From these expected first grade enrollments and the usual advances from grade to grade it appears that the total enrollment will increase to 474 pupils by 1960.

Regarding the number of pupils per classroom the American Association of School Administrators states that "the trend towards smaller classes has persisted until many school systems have now achieved class size in the elementary schools of twenty-five to thirty pupils. The trend is definitely toward an average class size of twenty-five pupils or less in the elementary schools..."

In regard to kindergarten classes in the regular school program, the same reference states, "Schooling for five-year-old children, as an integral part of elementary education, has definitely passed through the experimental stage and has proved its value."

Regarding the provision of a multipurpose room, the same reference states that newer educational services hold firm and. . . . "in northern climates at least, gymnasiums with the attendant dressing rooms and showers have become essential in high schools and some form of indoor playroom is required in elementary schools. The music program in good schools is no longer simply classroom choral work but now consists of bands, orchestras, and individual instrumental work. Kitchens and lunchrooms are needed in both elementary and high schools."

PROPOSED ADDITION TO THE POLLARD SCHOOL:

During past months your School Board has done considerable planning for additional rooms. An architect has met with the School Board on several occasions and has made preliminary drawings and estimates of cost. The proposed addition would include four classrooms and corridor directly over the four rooms which were constructed in 1952.

The warrant for the annual school district meeting carries an article which makes possible the voting of a bond issue for \$60,000 to cover the cost of construction and equipment for four additional rooms as planned for at the time of construction of the four-room addition in 1952.

BONDED INDEBTEDNESS & BORROWING CAPACITY

According to New Hampshire State Law, a school district may borrow up to 3% of the assessed valuation as equalized; by special permission of a State Legislative Committee, the district may borrow up to $4\frac{1}{2}\%$. The Plaistow School District has an assessed valuation as equalized of \$6,076,544. The present indebtedness of the district is \$75,000, which would mean that the present net borrowing capacity of the district as of March 1956 is \$107,296 at the 3% rate and \$198,444 at the $4\frac{1}{2}\%$ rate

Because action of the 1955 State Legislature made possible state contributions toward costs of construction, it is expected that the district will receive reimbursements equal to 20% of its annual payment toward capital expenditures, which would be \$1,200 per year for a two year period. It is possible that the state and federal government will contribute increasing amounts in future years.

BOOKS and OTHER TEACHING AIDS

As a result of a very reasonable budget for books during recent years, the Plaistow children are equipped with text books as good as are available. There is need for more library type books and a constant need to replace worn and outdated books in order to maintain the excellent present supply. New books purchased during the past year have included - - in addition to needs for increasing enrollments in the various grades - - new science books in grades 2-3-4-5 and 7, revised editions of the basic readers in grades 2-3 and 4, new health and personal development books for grades 3 and 4 and new dictionaries in several grades.

The usual annual program of the use of standardized achievement tests has been followed. It is by the use of these tests that pupils' achievement is measured objectively and is compared with standardized scores. These test results are consulted often by the teachers to diagnose pupil weaknesses in order to make improvements. Teachers made good use of the movie projector, the victrolas and other teaching aids which are available.

During the current year twenty Pollard School pupils are taking advantage of the P. T. A. sponsorship of private and group instruction in instrumental music under the guidance of Dr. Warren C. Freeman of Boston with Walter Lewis of Boston as the instructor. All costs of this special program are defrayed by the P. T. A., individual pupils and their parents; no school district money is used for instrumental music.

The following comments were presented by Principal Walter G. Leathe:

"Family style lunch was inaugurated in the Pollard School this year. This type of lunch serving is with the direct approval of Miss Cutter, and it eliminates the waiting in line of fifteen minutes by the hot lunch pupils.

Grade eight made a visit this fall to Concord and Manchester, N. H. In Concord they visited the State House and other points of interest. In Manchester they visited Grenier Air Base. This was the first of many educational trips planned for the different grades this year.

Once again, the U.S. Savings Bond Program is being

carried on at the Pollard School under the able directorship of Mrs. Loleta Palmer, Grade 4 teacher. All previous records have been broken this year with more pupils participating in the program than ever before.

A skating rink, constructed on the grounds of the Pollard School this fall, was made possible by many interested townspeople, town selectmen and firemen. It has proved to be a wonderful, safe place for the children to skate during the winter season.

Another project was finishing the hot-topping around the school which makes it possible for the children to play on clean smooth surfaces and for the school buses to pick the students up at the doors, on stormy days.

A combined Glee Club and Band Concert was held at the December 1955 P. T. A. meeting, under the leadership of Mrs. Louise Jackson, grade 5 teacher, with Mrs. Marion Brown, grade 4 teacher as accompanist.

The public library has again this year been of great assistance to the school. As in other years bus pupils have been alloted school time to attend the library and get books which they might otherwise have been unable to use."

HEALTH:

Miss Gwendolyn Curtis, the School Nurse has presented the following information:

"The School Health Program consists of a yearly medical examination by Dr. Peter Wheeler, M. D. for Children in grades 1 - 4 & 8. Notices of defects found are sent to parents. A successful "follow-up" program has been carried out with the help of parents, clinics and the School Health Program.

All children receive a hearing and visual test with the same cooperative "follow-up" work through parents, school and organizations. Cursory examinations are done at the beginning of school and after each vacation period. Each child is checked yearly with the "Wood Lamp" for Scalp Ring Worm as a precautionary measure. Color perception tests are done in the fifth grade yearly. Home visits, audio-visual programs, pre-school clinics, pre-school registrations, conferences with principal and teachers as well as parents are frequent during the year.

Health talks to students on such subjects as teeth, posture grooming, nutrition, importance of immunization clinics, care of and prevention of colds, etc., are given by the school nurse-teacher, often at the request of the teachers.

This year our major program has been and still is the Polio Clinics which have been well attended, the vaccine being administered by Dr. Francis Harris, M. D., under the sponsorship of the New Hampshire Health Department through the National Polio Foundation, and Mrs. Jeanette Bernier, R. N. State Public Health Nurse, with the school nurse-teacher assisting.

The Vollmer Patch Test for T. B. will be done in grades five through eight with the teachers and students, at their request.

We wish to thank local organizations through their interest and cooperation who have contributed in the assistance of our school health program.

I wish at this time to thank all those who helped methis past year to make it a success and to extend my appreciation."

COMMUNITY ORGANIZATIONS:

Appreciation is expressed for the continued support and cooperation of the Plaistow Parent-Teacher Association, Lions' Club and Firemen's Association. Donation of basketball equipment which will be greatly appreciated has been promised by Granite State Aroma D. O. S. of Plaistow.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

As soon as possible, Plaistow children should have the advantages of instrumental music, a physical education program and art as a part of their regular school program; manual training instruction should be reorganized when it is possible to secure a qualified instructor.

In closing, I again wish to thank the School Board, teachers and children and other citizens for their co-

operation in making our work successful.
