### TOWN WARRANT

# THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Plaistow in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Plaistow on Tuesday, the twelfth of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles:

Article 1 To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

Article 2 To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

Article 3 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$150.00 to acquire Broad Form Money and Securities Insurance for one year, indemnifying the Town and its Officers against the loss of Town funds due to Hold-up, Burglary, Damage or Destruction caused by Fire, Flood and/or other manner of loss not covered under present Town Officers' performance Bonds.

Article 4 To see if the Town will vote to continue the sidewalk construction program and to raise and appropriate funds for same.

Article 5 To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow and have made copies of the old Merrill family maps and to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed the sum of \$300.00 to cover costs of copying and insuring said maps while in the possession of Agents of the Town.

Article 6 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$300.00 for the printing in pamphlet form (a) the Building Zone Ordinance and (b) the Zoning Ordinance proposed by the Zoning Commission and as voted by the Town.

Article 7 To see if the Town will vote to give authority to the Board of Fire Engineers to dispose of the present wooden building which is now the present fire house and appropriate the sum of thirty-five hundred dollars, \$3500.00 to replace the same.

Article 8 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum not to exceed \$270.00 for the purchase of an adding machine.

Article 9 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum not to exceed \$700.00 for the purchase of a multi-purpose machine to mow the parks and to plow the sidewalks of the Town.

Article 10 To see whether the Town will vote to pay the Collector of Taxes the salary of \$1,500.00 as full compensation for the collection of taxes for the ensuing year. (By Petition.)

Article 11 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 for the centrol of Dutch Elm Disease.

Article 12 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$1,000.00 for the repair or removal of damaged or diseased town-owned trees and the replacement of same wherever possible.

(By Petition.)

Article 13 To see if the Town will vote to accept Kimball Avenue. (By Petition.)

Article 14 To see if the Town will vote to accept Whiton Street, off Westville Road. (By Petition.)

Article 15 To see if the Town will vote to appoint a committee of three persons to constitute an Industrial Commission to study the suitability and advantages of this community for various types of industrial development, to prepare and disseminate brochures and other advertising of the advantages of this community and to endeavor to secure the location of suitable industries within the community. Said Committee to be appointed by the Moderator and Selectmen acting in concert.

Article 16 To see if Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the use of the Industrial Committee in carrying out the purpose of that committee.

Article 17 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the use of the Civil Defense.

Article 18 To see if the Town will vote to permit the Plaistow Bowling Alleys to open and operate said Bowling Alleys on the Sabbath after 1 p. m. afternoon, and to close no later than 11 p. m., and shall abide by all By-laws and ordinances that the Selectmen shall adopt.

Article 19 To see if the Town will vote to authorize a fund of \$1,000.00 to be set up as a Road Machinery account.

Article 20 To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to license open-air theatres and set the amount of license fee.

Article 21 To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 22 Shall the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to playing games of Beano be adopted in this Town.

Article 23 To see if the Town will vote to accept as submitted the reports of Agents, Auditors and other Officers and Committees heretofore appointed.

# Statement of Condition

The Town of Plaistow closed the year with a deficit of \$2,911.54 of the 1956 Appropriations.

The Town Surplus at Dec. 31, 1955 was \$15,232.07. From this \$4,000.00 was transferred to the Fire Truck Account leaving a balance of \$11,232.07. An overexpenditure of \$8,743.39 in the Winter Maintenance Account and \$1,050.53 County Tax, reduced this even more to \$1,438.15.

Even with the Reimbursement of \$1,475.00 in the Town Poor Account and \$1,470.12 in the Municipal Court Account and the savings of \$667.86 in the Town Dump Account the deficit in the 1956 Appropriations was still \$2,911.54.

The Town Surplus December 31, 1956 amounting to \$8,321.81 is composed as follows: Cash \$3,237.95 Unredeemed Taxes, \$4,279.88 and \$803.98 in Uncollected Taxes. Of the \$3,237.95 cash, \$375.00 is encumbered by a firm order for radios that have not yet been delivered.

#### **REPORT OF LIBRARIAN FOR 1956**

To serve the community well is always the aim of the Trustees, the Librarian and assistant Librarian of the Plaistow Library.

Our library has grown a lot in five years but its years of greatest responsibility and promise lie ahead.

The thought, "Any book is new until it is read," gave the Librarian an idea for more good reading. During 1956, many of the older books were brought to the front shelves from the back room.

A good number of the "best reading books" were rebound. These books are being read and enjoyed especially by our younger readers.

The annual tea for the teachers of the Pollard School was held in September. At this time the Librarian explained the services available to the school. The Librarian wishes to thank Mr. Walter Leathe, principal, for his splendid cooperation.

The children from several rooms visited the Library for study. Some Girl Scouts worked at the Library for Reading Badges.

In 1956 many questions were asked the Librarian—a major question was — What is TV doing to Reading habits? We hope an answer was found by urging good reading for children. Good programs on TV were followed by requests for books pertaining to the programs.

As is done each year, many books and magazines were purchased. The Plaistow Library book fund is not enough to purchase all books requested. We borrowed over 500 books from the State Library to fill the needs of our readers.

The hour given to the bus children of the Pollard school was greatly appreciated. The average number visiting the Library on each Friday was over eighty. The younger children were helped by the Patrol Leaders of the School.

Book Week was observed by Posters made by Pollard School children.

On Catholic Book Week, books from our Library and also from the State Library were on display.

Circulation has remained about the same as last year. More magazines have been taken out particularly by students of the upper grades.

More children as well as adults, have enjoyed browsing in our Library. Also, more have remained for a period of quiet relaxation by reading.

The Story Hour was held during vacation and was very well attended. Many children about to enter first grade were interested listeners.

The Bookmobile visited Plaistow four times during the year.

The Librarian wishes to thank her assistant, Mrs. Virginia Robinson, for the splendid work done by her during the year.

The Building Custodian, the Gazette Reporter and the Selectmen were very cooperative.

The Librarian extends a cordial invitation to all citizens of our community to visit the Library on Monday, Wednesday and Friday from two to six o'clock.

#### REPORT OF THE PLAISTOW FIRE DEPARTMENT

It is with pleasure that for the second consecutive year, I submit a report with no depreciable fire loss.

The department answered 48 alarms; - the majority being brush and grass fires; a few for flooded oil burners; a few chimney fires and the other calls were of minor consequence.

Through mutual agreement we assisted Newton on three fires. The total fire loss for the year was less than fifty dollars.

In the last part of October, our new 750 gallon, triple-combination pumper, which was voted at the last Town Meeting, was delivered. On November 8 an Underwriter's Test was made by the N. H. Board of Underwriters and the truck was passed with excellent results. The spurt test results were 890 gallons per minute at 150 pounds pressure.

I believe this piece of equipment will be a great addition to our department and for the protection of the community.

Because of the new piece of equipment it became necessary to build an addition to the present firehouse. Through the generous response of the members of the Fire Association and a few townspeople all labor on the building has been donated. The Association has also furnished over twenty-three hundred dollars toward the cost of materials.

At this time, I would like to express my personal thanks and those of the Association to the citizens of the Town for their generous contributions and support of the Annual Firemen's Ball.

I wish to thank the citizens for their continued "fire consciousness" in regard to incenerator and out door fires.

#### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH 1956

It has been the duty of the Board of Health to report to the State Department of Health the following diseases for the year 1956: Chicken Pox 8; German Measles 1; Measles 1; Mumps 5; Scarlet Fever 5; Dog Bite 5.

We have been fortunate up to January 1 this year to have avoided any great outbreak of the contagious diseases, but we must be warned that all such cases must be reported to the Board of Health.

From the paucity of such reports made this year, it is possible that many more should have been so reported. This is a State Law.

In regards to the Salk Vaccine program institued by the State Department of Health, all children from 1 to 19, whose parents gave consent, have had to date, two innoculations with this vaccine and it is now understood that the third innoculation will soon take place.

It is my pleasure to have helped in this undertaking. Those who have not had the vaccine should avail themselves of the chance to help prevent any further outbreak of this disease by consulting their family physician and get vaccinated.

There have been many complaints received either by word of mouth or by telephone relative to infractions of our sanitary code. These had to be disregarded as it is compulsory that all such complaints should be in writing and signed before any action by the Board can take place according to the revised State statutes.

# SUPPLEMENTARY REPORT ON ACTIVITIES OF PUBLIC HEALTH

The State Health Department through the nurse in our district, Mrs. J. Bernier, R. N., in cooperation with the School Department and many volunteer workers held two polio clinics in our town in 1956.

In the first clinic 392 received their first polio vaccine. At the second clinic, held in July, 330 were innoculated; of these, 53 received their first injection, 277 returned for their second innoculation.

A clinic for the third or booster shot will soon be held. Three child health conferences were held and at these there was a total attendance of 59. Thirty were vaccinated against small pox, ten were innoculated against diptheria, whooping cough and tetanus.

Our district nurse visited our town several times during the year, calling on new babies and doing follow up work necessary. Physical defects found were referred to private physicians or to facilities existing in our state for correction.

Your board of health contributed its part in this program.

## REPORT OF SUMMER PLAYGROUND

This year the Pollard School PTA Recreation Committee was formed to take care of the leisure hours of Plaistow's children as a yearly program.

Our first project was the summer playground which was deemed a hugh success due to the efforts of our supervisors, Mr. Robert W. Dolph, Mrs. John E. Atwood and

Miss Patricia Bramley. The average attendance was 50 pupils per day, and our Craft's program was at a cost of  $3\frac{1}{2}$  cents per child for the four week period. Red Cross swimming instruction at Sunset Lake, Hampstead, was an added feature.

The purchase of a set of swings, sand box and miscellaneous equipment for the permanent playground completed our program.

#### SCHOOL WARRANT

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School district in the town of Plaistow qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the ninth day of March 1957, at six o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- Article 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
  - Article 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- Article 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
- Article 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- Article 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- Article 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- Article 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- Article 8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
- Article 9. To see if the district will vote to establish a Survey Committee of ten people, to be selected as follows: three school board members, the moderator,

one selectman and five persons to be appointed by the moderator, such Committee to survey the proposed cooperative school district plan, and to survey present and future classroom needs at the Pollard School, and report to the district at either a special school district meeting or the next annual meeting.

Article 10. To see if the district will authorize the School Board to make application for and to receive, in the name of the district, such advances, grants-in-aid or other funds for educational purposes, as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from Federal, State, local or private Agencies.

Article 11. By petition, to see if the Plaistow school district will vote to petition the State Board of Education to become a part of a cooperative school district for the education of the secondary school children (grades seven through twelve) with other districts in the area, including the districts of Newton, Brentwood, Kingston, Danville, or any two of the districts in addition to the school district of Plaistow.

Article 12. By petition, if the preceding article is adopted, to see if the district will elect two representatives to serve on an interim committee who shall prepare a financial budget for the operation of the proposed cooperative school district, and to include in the organization warrant an article calling for an appropriation for the proposed cooperative school district during the first year and such other items of business as need to be acted upon at the organization meeting.

Article 13. To transact any further business that may legally come before the meeting.

#### REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

January, 1957

To the School Board and Citizens of Plaistow:

I am presenting herewith my First Annual Report as Superintendent of your school.

The worth of any organization is judged by the calibre of the personnel which represents it. I have found in a short time a very cooperative school board, an excellent principal and a very capable group of teachers who are all part of a fine well-established school system. I have found them very friendly and helpful.

I feel, too, that I would like to compliment the personnel in the Union office, who are most efficient, for the good work that they are doing.

Speaking further about teachers I can't emphasize too strongly the importance of good teachers in the classroom. It is most essential that we keep our good teachers and hire the best qualified teachers available. To me the teacher is the most important person in our school system. Progress in education is made because the pupil has a good teacher. It is essential that the salaries we pay our teachers keep pace with the average salary paid by comparable communities or the education of our children will suffer.

New teachers added to our staff this year include:

Mrs. Elizabeth Harris, a graduate of Boston University - grade 6.

Mrs. Harriette McKeen, a graduate of the University of Maine with  $3\frac{1}{2}$  years experience has replaced Mrs. Harris in grade 6.

Miss Jean McNally, a graduate of Merrimack College - grade 5.

Miss Nancy Richardson, a graduate of Lowell Teachers College - grade 3.

All teachers have continued membership in local, state and national professional teachers organizations and have attempted to keep abreast of modern practices by attendance at local and state teachers' meetings and by taking courses when possible.

Walter Leathe received his Master's Degree last summer and he is currently taking a course in Educational Finance and Business Management taught by Paul Fillion sponsored by the University of New Hampshire toward his Doctorate. He took courses in Methods of Teaching Social Studies, Principals Seminar of Educational Problems in the Elementary School, Methods and Materials of Helping a Mentally Retarded Child.

Plaistow teachers taking the Child Growth and Development Course taught by Dr. Wylie, sponsored by Harvard - Boston University are as follows: Dorothy Burden, Louise Jackson and Beatrice Reynolds. Richard Hillner took two courses last summer, Psychological Foundations I and II sponsored by the Salem Teachers College and is now taking the Educational Finance and Business Management and the Child Growth and Development Course being sponsored by the Teachers College, Salem, Mass. Jean McNally and Nancy Richardson are taking a course in Child Growth and Development at the Teachers College, Lowell, Mass. Janet Pelletier took Psychological Foundations I and II also.

Mr. Robert Dolph, the Helping Teacher for Supervisory Union No. 55, is acting as a consultant to the teachers of Plaistow and his work has proven most valuable. He is supervising the testing, evaluating the program and making recommendations for the books to be used in the

classrooms. A new arithmetic series has been instigated and the new social studies series started last year has been continued. The basic reading series has been completed. This makes it possible for continuity in all grades of the same subject field which is more advantageous.

Mr. Dolph has edited a teachers handbook and a copy has been given to each teacher which has proven most helpful.

When the addition to the Pollard School was not passed at the last school district meeting it was necessary to complete a new basement room at a cost of \$2,242.83. The two basement rooms which were formerly a shop and home economics rooms are now classrooms. We will attempt to go one more year with overloaded classes in the 7th and 8th grades but for September 1958 a new four-room addition is imperative. The double grades will have reached the 7th grade and there will be one room short. This addition will make it possible to again offer shop and home economics. By September 1959 the double grades will have reached through grade 8 and with the shop and home economics programs using the basement rooms we will have a well-rounded program with all rooms used to capacity.

It will be necessary for the addition to be completed by September 1, 1958 to prevent classes being housed outside the school proper.

This year for the first time transportation expenses will be paid for all students under fourteen years old attending high school.

Major repair items this year include — strapping up two ceilings, repair to the roof, installation of three additional toilets and partitions in the girls' lavatories. I would like to add that your building is well-kept by the custodians.

Mr. Walter Leathe, Principal of the Pollard School has made the following comments: "The Hot Lunch Program of the Pollard School continued very successfully in its family style serving of the hot lunches. The daily number of eaters increased from 175 to 330. This was the first year in many years that the lunch program has showed a small profit.

Pollard's Saving Bond Program, as recommended by the Commissioner of Education, has increased until 73% of the pupils of the Pollard School are now buying Savings Bonds and have bought stamps totalling \$4,842.18.

Every grade has taken a field trip this year of educational interest. These trips include historical trips to Boston, Newington Air Base, Submarine 'Seal', and local dairies and post office.

The band under the direction of Dr. Warren Freeman has grown to twenty-five members. Instrument lessons are provided free of charge and we hope to expand the band in the coming year. As a matter of special interest, the Sanborn Seminary Band, which presented a Christmas concert for the school children in December, was comprised of about one-third Pollard School graduates.

The glee club presented its annual P. T. A. presentation at the Town Hall, December 6th and at the First Baptist Church December 16. Plans for a spring concert are being made.

Basketball for boys and girls was enjoyed twice weekly at the town hall and in competition in Lawrence and North Andover, Mass. Other sporting events included a field and track meet with town contiguous with Plaistow. Another like event is planned for Spring 1957.

Each week the Plaistow Public Library sends over a number of books for room circulation and a fine repose exists between the library and school which not only increases circulation but the pupils' reading ability."

Miss Gwendolyn Curtis, the school nurse has presented the following information:

"The School Health Program consists of a yearly medical examination of grades 1 - 4 - 7 and new students. Notice of defects found are sent to parents. A successful "follow-up" program has been carried out with the help of parents, clinics, and the School Health Program.

The Vollmer Patch Test for T. B. will be given during the year. It is hoped that all pupils will take the examination. All children receive a hearing and visual test with the same cooperative "follow-up" work through parents, school and organizations when needed. Cursory Examinations are done at the beginning of school year and after each vacation period by the nurse-teacher. Each child is checked yearly with the "Wood Lamp" for scalp ring worm as a precautionary measure. Color Perception Tests are done in the fifth grade yearly. Home visits, audio-visual programs, pre-school registrations, conferences with principals and teachers as well as parents are frequent during the year.

Health talks to students on such subjects as teeth, posture, nutrition, grooming, immunization clinics, care of and prevention of colds etc. are given by the school nurse-teacher.

The nurse also attends Field Trips with the teachers and children upon request of children and teachers. This gives the nurse an excellent opportunity to meet parents and become better acquainted with the students. Also in case of accidents provides for administrating first aid. The nurse attends teacher and nurse conferences and regional institutes during the year for a better health program.

We wish to thank local organizations through their interest and cooperation who have contributed in the assistance of our school health program.

I wish at this time to thank all those who helped me this past year to make it a success and to extend my apprecitaion."

Dr. Warren S. Freeman, co-ordinator of the Music Activity in Supervisory Union No. 55 has made the following report:

"In Plaistow the regular vocal music program has been carried on under the direction of Mrs. Joan White. Mr. Walter Leathe, the Principal, has given active assistance with the music in the upper grades. Mr. Robert Ziegner has developed the school band, which is now divided into two groups, an advanced group and an elementary group. Twenty-five players are now taking part in the instrumental music program.

The value of the instrumental music program is being shown through the active participation of the school band groups in various schools and community functions thoughout the year. During the past year the combined band groups in Atkinson, and Plaistow have appeared at a number of important civic and school functions.

Plans for the balance of the year include the development of a spring music festival in each town which will utilize most of the boys and girls in the vocal classes and the combined instrumental groups from each of the four towns in the unit under my direction."

I have prepared charts to cover the Pollard School Lunch Program, information in regard to Supervisory Union No. 55, charts covering census and enrollment figures plus the school calendar.

Appreciation is expressed for the continued support and cooperation of the Plaistow Parent - Teacher Association and all other local organizations.

In closing, I wish to thank the School Board, teachers and children for their cooperation in making our work successful.
