#### **TOWN WARRANT**

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Plaistow in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Plaistow on Tuesday, the tenth of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles:

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

Article 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$150.00 to acquire Broad Form Money and Securities Insurance for one year indemnifying the Town and its Officers against the loss of Town Funds due to Hold-up, Burglary, Damage or Destruction caused by Fire, Flood and/or other manner of loss not covered under present Town Officers' performance Bonds.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,800.00 to widen the approaches and Bridge on Westville Road over Pollard Brook. This sum to be supplemented by State Bridge Aid.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to accept Trust Funds now held by the Cemetery Trustees.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow in anticipation of taxes. Article 7. Shall the provision of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to playing games of Beano be adopted in this Town.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 for the control of Dutch Elm Disease.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$750.00 for the repair or removal of damaged or diseased Town-owned trees and the replacement of same wherever possible.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to eliminate the payment of discount on Property Tax Bills as voted under Article 16 of the 1955 Warrant.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums as herein listed to be expended by the War Memorial Committee for development of the War Veterans' Memorial recreational area:

(A) Spread, roll and seed loam which is on hand. This will cover about one third of play area three inches thick.

(B) Excavation of embankment of small pond designated as "Ice skating rink". \$300.00

(C) Fill and complete grade of Northeast corner. \$200.00

(D) Purchase, spread, roll and seed approximately 1,030 cubic yards of loam on balance of playing field area. \$3,000.00

Total \$4,000.00

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$425.00 to resurface Banquet Hall floor in Town Hall.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 to resurface the library floor in Town Hall. Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the use of the Industrial Commission in carrying out the purpose of that commission.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the expenditure of \$1,000.00 in the Road Machinery Account to replace the same amount of money expended for the purchase of one hydraulic Wing Plow and equipment.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to continue the sidewalk construction program.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to consolidate the office of Tax Collector and Town Clerk into one office and pay a salary of \$4,000.00 annually for such services. Also, to provide suitable facilities, -- in the Town Hall, for such office. This action to take effect with Town election, March 1960.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$370.00 for the use of Civil Defense.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to accept as submitted the reports of Agents, Auditors and other Officers and Committees heretofore appointed.

#### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN YEAR OF 1958

#### Statement of Condition

The Town of Plaistow closed the year 1958 with an unexpended balance of \$2,597.47 against the 1957 appropriations.

The town surplus on Dec. 31, 1957 amounted to \$14,909.10. The total surplus on Dec. 31, 1958 was \$14,311.02. This surplus consisted of unexpended funds, \$5,327.69 and unredeemed taxes in the amount of \$6,528.87, with uncollected taxes of \$2,454.46. The net surplus is \$598.08 less than the 1957 surplus.

The property valuation increase was \$155,577.50. This with other economies, was responsible for the  $50\phi$  per thousand decrease in the tax rate.

The following table details the increase or (decrease) in the various types of taxable property located in Plaistow, 1958 as compared with 1957.

During the past year this office was instrumental in obtaining improved road conditions in conjuction with the State Highway Dept. to alleviate several bad road drainage conditions. Several such conditions still exist and it is our intention to pursue this matter further in cooperation with the State of N. H.

An ordinance was enacted in 1958 to prohibit parking on Rte. 125 and on East Road in the Westville District. This action was taken in the interest of safety.

Through the efforts of Mr. Fred Rand the physical property of the Town Hall have continued to improve.

Because of the use of \$4,000.00 of surplus accured from the previous year, plus the efforts of the Board to curtail on expenditures, without reduction in services rendered the community, and because of the diligence of the Board in equitable assessments, the Tax Rate was reduced  $50\phi$  per \$1,000.00. A departure from the current trend of rising costs.

Again an effort should be made by all taxpayers to attend both school and town meetings. Appropriations voted at these meetings form a major part of the tax rate. The last vestige of democracy rests in the town meeting form of government.

#### REPORT OF THE ROAD AGENT FOR 1958

I hereby submit my annual report to the townspeople on the maintenance of the highways in the Town of Plaistow.

We try to allocate our appropriation so that we can do as much as possible and as economically as we can.

A part of our money goes for patching roads, tarring, resurfacing and sanding and salting, bush-cutting, picking up bushes, etc. There is also a certain amount of culvert work, fence post, railings, street signs and numerous other projects.

For the last few years we have been doing more grader work on widening roads and cutting down the banks to give us more room to put our snow in the event of a winter with a lot of snow.

This year we built a new section of road with TRA funds on Forrest Street. We had let the money accumulate for two years and built over a half-mile for less than forty-five hundred dollars. This is a new type road for Plaistow, being a plant mix and laid by machine with a twenty foot surface. We also replaced two culverts on this stretch and it will be much more economical to keep up, with less patching and tarring to do. (Had the article on widening and fixing the bridge with matching funds from the State of New Hampshire been voted upon favorably at the last Town Meeting the above type of road would have been built on the Westville Road.)

In the winter we try to keep our roads open and well sanded to insure the safety of the pupils as well as the school bus routes that take so many pupils to and from school.

Unfortunately for the taxpayer, Plaistow has many miles of Town maintained roads, probably as many alone as any three towns put together in this vicinity, but we are well rewarded for our work from the tradesmen that make deliveries in our Town each day and sing our praises as to the condition of our roads as compaired to those of other cities and towns for miles around us. We also get a lot of nice remarks from most of our townspeople.

In closing this report, let me say it has been a pleasure to be your Road Agent.

#### **REPORT OF PLAISTOW FIRE DEPARTMENT**

It is with pleasure and pride that I make this twentysixth annual report of the Plaistow Fire Department as its chief.

Sixty alarms have been answered during the year classified as follows — seven automobile fires, five chimney fires, three buildings, three oil burners, one woods fire, five out-of-town calls, nine calls to the Town Dump, ten emergency and accident calls, the remainder being grass and brush fires.

A station radio was installed during mid-summer at the firehouse — the radio which had been previously used by the Civilian Defense in the Town Hall. This station radio, in conjunction with the mobile units, have improved the efficiency of the Department.

The new fire station was officially dedicated March 2, 1958, with Open House. Over five hundred citizens and guests inspected the building. The Town was represented by Mr. William C. Bramley and Mr. Charles Goodwin of the board of selectmen. There were also present descendants of the donors of the first piece of fire apparatus in Plaistow — the old hand tub.

I wish to again thank the citizens of Plaistow for their continued support of the Fire Department.

#### **REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH 1958**

It has been the duty of your Board of Health to report to the State Board of Health the following number of contagious diseases; Dog Bite 3; Chicken Pox 23; Measles 30; German Measles 21; Mumps 26; Whooping Cough 3; Scarlet Fever 2; Tuberculosis 1, Premature Birth 1; Total 129.

It was Necessary to make inspection of two beauty parlors and barber shops; three homes for boarding children, licensed by the state. Complaints to the number of eleven were received for stagnant water; mosquito nuisances and septic tank overflow with pollution of adjacent water supply also an odor nuisance. These were inspected, in some cases by the entire board as well as the building inspector. In all cases the owner or agent was notified to remedy same after a suitable time limit was given by written notice.

No Complaints can be accepted other than by a written, signed complaint and such complaints will be inspected within twenty four hours after notice is received.

During the past year there has been a widespread outbreak of different contagious diseases but many such cases were never reported to your Board. The State law specifies that every case of a contagious disease must be reported to your Board of Health and failure to do so can involve a penalty as well as aid in spreading such diseases where it is not known that such a case exists in a household. A post card will suffice to notify me of such a case and will aid in keeping our town clean and healthy.

#### **TREE WARDEN'S REPORT FOR 1958**

The first spraying for Elm Beetle started about the 20th of May. Ten days later we sprayed the Elm and Maples. As our appropriation was reduced to \$500.00 last town meeting, our care of trees was limited to taking care of the most dangerous dead trees overhanging the highways, there being very little trimming of dead wood from the good shade trees. We are losing so many of our good shade trees in town, I think it would be well if

we could replace them with young Maples. We could use twenty or more new trees. Due to dry season of 1957 most of the trees set out died. The U. N. H., last June, had two men go through town tagging diseased Elms. There were twenty-four tagged. We have cut only six of these. The Exeter and Hampton Electric Company and the New England Tel. and Tel. Company have been most cooperative in helping take care of a number of dead and diseased trees, which has saved the town a great deal of money.

#### **REPORT OF WAR MEMORIAL COMMITTEE**

During 1958 the  $4\frac{1}{2}$  acre recreational site at the rear of the Pollard School was almost completely transformed into a clear and level area.

Clearing began in 1957 by Veterans and local woodsmen, was completed, including the picnic grove and tennis court site. Disposal of the brush was accomplished mostly by Fire Department personnel and committee members.

Logs were hauled away and lumber returned, by Lyman Hill and Bill Kershaw, at no cost to the town, other than the expense of tractor work in snaking out and loading logs. About 7,000 board feet of square edged lumber is now stacked at the West edge of the football field and will eventually be used in constructing the "Field House". As a baseball field seemed to be the prime objective, specifications were drawn up by Clint Goodwin for completion of the regulation size baseball field, and that only. Bids were advertised for on those specifications, and one was received; that of Yemma Brothers of Haverhill.

After comparison with eight bids submitted on Haverhill's new school area at White's Hill, Yemma's bid was found to be in line with the lowest. However, as the total exceeded funds available, the bid was rejected, and a meeting was held to negotiate with interested parties for contracting for such portions of the project as finances would allow. The original bidder agreed to do the loam stripping, stump removal and sub-grading as directed, at the original unit prices, with the exception that stump removal cost could be reduced with a convenient disposal area provided. (By allowing the use of his property for the stumps, Rudolph Woyvoda permitted a saving of nearly five hundred dollars.) On October 7th the contract work was begun and before winter closed in, all but one corner of the area was brought to level grade.

Your committee held over 25 meetings and work assemblies during 1958, and a majority of members were present at most of them. Their recommendations for further development are included in an article of the 1959 Warrant, along with a sum for appropriation should the Townspeople wish to bring the project to relative completion during 1959.

If it is decided that this committee is then to continue development, its further efforts will be turned toward promotion of final preparation and maintenance of the individual sports areas by local civic organizations.

It's conceivable that dedication ceremonies can be held in 1959, and it is the belief of the committee that the completed Veteran's Memorial recreation area will be one of Plaistow's most valuable, and least costly, assets.

#### SCHOOL WARRANT

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School district in the town of Plaistow qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the seventh day of March 1959, at twelve o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.

2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.

4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.

6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

9. To see if the district will vote to construct and equip an addition to the Pollard School; to authorize the school board to execute any and all contracts or agreements necessary and proper or advisable in connection with the construction and equipping of an addition, and authorize the school board to issue bonds or notes in an amount not to exceed sixty thousand dollars (\$60,000) payable from funds to be raised by taxation for the purposes of financing such construction.

10. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate one thousand eighty dollars (\$1080.00) to pay the first interest payment on the bond issue for the addition.

11. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate one thousand fifty dollars (\$1050.00) to operate the addition.

12. If article 9 does not pass, to see if the district will raise and appropriate four thousand dollars (\$4,000) to provide transportation for double sessions.

13. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate sixteen hundred thirty dollars (\$1,630.00) to provide and install automatic fire detecting equipment in the Pollard School.

14. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate three hundred dollars (\$300.00) to install two fire doors for basement doorways, as recommended by the State Fire Marshall's office.

15. To see if the district will vote to add the services of a Union Art Supervisor. This position will not start until September 1960, and will not raise any money at this time. This service and expense will be shared with three other towns in Union No. 55.

16. To see if the district will vote to add the services of a Union Remedial Reading Teacher. This position will not start until September 1960, and will not raise any money at this time. This service and expense will be shared with three other towns in Union No. 55.

17. To see if the district will vote to add the services of a Union Special Education Teacher. This position will not start until September 1960, and will not raise any money at this time. This service and expense will be shared with three other towns in Union No. 55. 18. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) to provide transportation for children in grades one and two, who live between one-half mile and one mile from school.

19. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) to construct a driveway in the front of the Pollard School to make it safer for the children when they board or leave the school buses.

20. To see if the district will authorize the school board to make application for and to receive, in the name of the district, such advances, grants-in-aid or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from Federal, State, local or private Agencies.

21. By Petition - To see if the district will vote to make available, in the annual report of the Plaistow School Board, the following: "A detailed report showing the amount of all monies allowed for each item in it's budget to indicate all expenditures showing over and under expenditures against the total school appropriation." This report to be included in the annual School Board report to the Town of Plaistow, New Hampshire. This report to become effective in the report of the year 1959.

22. To transact any further business that may legally come before the meeting.

## **REPORT OF THE SCHOOL LUNCH PROGRAM**

To the Citizens of Plaistow:

We, the Plaistow School Board, herewith submit the following report relative to the deficit that was experienced in the School Lunch Program when a final audit was made by the State, at our request, after the program was closed in March 1958.

In submitting this report, we are revealing pertinent facts which, in our minds, contributed to this deficit. We wish to mention at this time, that when the deficit was discovered and the amount known, we immediately released this information to the press.

The last report the Board received relative to the financial standing of the Lunch Program revealed the status of the account as \$986.95 in the black. We had no knowledge or any reason to believe that the outstanding obligations were anything but normal; in fact, the report declared them to be \$576.13, which seemed normal with other reports. We did not suspect anything wrong until a creditor of the program contacted the board relative to an account that had been running behind for several months. We immediately proceeded to contact all creditors that we knew of for itemized statements of sales and receipts in connection with the Lunch Program. The first few reports we received revealed the same condition of account as the first one.

It was obvious then that the Program was in a deficit, although we had no way of knowing to what extent. We immediately closed the Lunch Program and prepared the records for audit. The results are a published fact.

Several things, in our minds, contributed to the deficit such as the fact that different surplus goods available to the program in the past had been discontinued — such as meats, turkeys, eggs, etc. These are expensive items and constitute a major part of the expense of foods in a program. To substantiate these facts we have comparative reports from the New Hampshire State Department of Education relative to surplus foods available to Lunch Programs. They reveal that the estimated value of distributed commodities in 1956-57 was \$360,642.30. In 1957-58, the value was estimated to be \$294,338.85 — or approximately \$65,000 less. It was also revealed that many districts needed financial assistance to carry on their program and many more closed early and ended with a deficit. We also have discovered that most of the lunch programs are receiving far more from local effort to help support them than the amount paid to the Plaistow program. Divided authority was allowed by the board which evidently caused confusion and resulted in improper records being kept relative to receipts and expenditures.

In closing we wish to state that in this report we have incorporated all the facts to the best of our knowledge facts that you as citizens are entitled to know relative to the deficit and reasons thereof in the Lunch Program. It was a regrettable incident and could have been avoided in part at least, had we had the facts sooner.

The School Board Plaistow School District Plaistow, New Hampshire Gentlemen: In accordance with your request an examination and audit of the accounts of the Pollard School Lunch Program of the Plaistow School District has been made by this Division. This audit covered the period from July 1st, 1957 to May 31st, 1958. Submitted herewith is our report in the form of Exhibits which reflect the financial activity during this period.

### Statement of Operations: (Exhibit A)

It is noted that during the period July 1, 1957 to May 31, 1958, total expenditures amounted to \$14,754.77. Income available for the School Lunch Program amounted in total to \$11,042.03, resulting in an excess of expenditures over income or a deficiency of \$3,712.74. An amount sufficient to cover this deficiency was received by the School Lunch Program from the School District.

# Summary of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit B)

A summary of receipts and expenditures for the period and proof of balance as of May 31, 1958, is presented in Exhibit B.

## Statement of Receipts and Expendituries: (Exhibit C)

A detailed statement of receipts and expenditures for the period is included in Exhibit C.

### Statement of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit D)

Exhibit D presents a detailed statement of receipts and expenditures for the period by months.

## **General Comments**

In order to avoid a repetition of the current situation with its attendant deficit, it is recommended that the procedure as outlined herewith be followed:

- Ist All receipts should be recorded daily and deposited in the bank.
- 2nd All payments should be made by check and supported by proper invoices.
- 3rd A frequent comparison should be made between available income and actual expenditures plus accounts payable.

The provisions of Chapter 184 of the Laws of 1955, require that this report or a summary of the findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) shall be published in the next annual report of the School District.

### **REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS**

January 30, 1959

To the School Board and Citizens of Plaistow:

I am presenting herewith my Third Annual Report as Superintendent of Schools in Plaistow. This Report is written under the main headings: Personnel, School Buildings, Curriculum, Housing, Bonded Indeptedness and Borrowing Capacity and Community Organizations. Reports of supervisors are included. Statistical reports follow the general report.

### Personniel

Last September four new teachers were added to the Pollard School staff. They were: Miss Marjorie Crossman, a graduate of Lowell Teachers College, Grade 5; Miss Judith Sullivan, a graduate of Merrimack College, Grade 5; Donald Lints, a graduate of the University of New Hampshire, Grades 7 and 8; Roderick Lewis, a graduate of the Salem Teachers College, began the year as a teacher in Grade 7 and 8, but has since been replaced by Mrs. Prudence Douglas, a graduate of the University of Maine, with several years experience, who previously taught in Plaistow.

All teachers have continued membership in local, state and national professional teachers' organizations.

Although teachers' salaries have increased in Plaistow, the salaries are noticeably under the New Hampshire average for elementary teachers and the salaries in New Hampshire are substantially below the national average paid all teachers. To further complicate matters, the Massachusetts State Legislature passed, as of November 1, 1958, a minimum salary law for all beginning teachers, of \$3,600. This has a considerable effect on all towns bordering Massachusetts. In addition, the prevailing wage for teacher college graduates this coming June will be about \$3,800, according to reliable sources. I strongly urge the citizens of Plaistow to support a good salary schedule if they want fully qualified teachers who are the backbone of any school system.

### School Buildings

Your School Board has continued to maintain and improve the physical condition of the Pollard School. Important improvements made since the last annual report have included extensive renovations to the Rainbow Room, additional lighting in one basement room, two classrooms have been repainted, two classrooms have new ceilings and the floors on the first floor corridor, stairs and landings in the old section have been tiled. A new entrance door has been installed on the north side.

# Curriculum

The courses of study and the textbooks used in the Pollard School meet the highest standards. Emphasis has been placed on reading, and a complete testing program under the guidance of Robert Dolph, Helping Teacher, is in operation. Mr. Dolph also acts as a consultant in the areas of retardation and maladjustment. Plaistow has been fortunate in holding class size to 25-30 pupils in single grades. This has helped materially in producing achievement results above the national norms.

Placed before the citizens of Plaistow at the District Meeting will be warrant articles pertaining to hiring on a Union basis — exclusive of Salem — a Remedial Reading teacher, a teacher for Special Education, and an Art Supervisor. These people will be available for Plaistow, Hampstead, Atkinson and Newton schools, prorated according to enrollments and adjusted valuation. The law states that new services such as these must be voted on by the people one year previous, if they are to be used on a Union basis. These are services that will improve the educational program and should be seriously considered.

Many school districts have subscribed to Educational Television this past year. This is becoming increasingly popular and very worthwhile. In addition to Channel 2 in Boston, Channel 11 in Durham will be operated during the year 1959. Two of the school districts in your Union subscribed to the educational series broadcast out of Channel 2 at 9:30 and 11:00 each school day morning. These programs on music, literature, social studies and science, help supplement the regular classroom work. Each subject was assigned to a different grade once a week. The cost would include television sets and installation plus 50 cents per pupil for study guides, etc.

A summer school program was carried out last year in the Union under the able direction of Robert Dolph and it proved very successful. It may be continued this coming summer if parents are interested.

People generally in the United States are becoming more concerned about education. It is a healthy situation. I believe the United States has the best educational system in the world and I hope that we may in each community strive for an improved system that will produce intelligent and understanding leadership.

### Housing

This year you will be asked to vote on an addition to the Pollard School. As you may know, we need an additional room in September to take care of the two classes in the present seventh grade. We have only one eighth grade room available.

It seems to me also, that this addition is needed basically to allow us to remove the temporary classrooms from the basement. These rooms were approved only tentatively and are not satisfactory. The ventilation, lighting, room size, safety hazards and acoustical properties leave room for considerable improvement. The rooms have been improved and can be used in many ways. The Rainbow Room can be made available as an all-purpose room, a lunch room or a meeting room. There is a great need at the school for an audio-visual room and a storeroom for the custodian. Parents might wish to have home economics and/or shop included in the curriculum once again.

If this addition is not voted, the alternative will be double sessions which have many disadvantages educationally. This would mean an additional cost of at least \$4,000 yearly for extra transportation. It would be much wiser to build the addition.

### **Bonded Indebtedness and Borrowing Capacity**

According to New Hampshire State Law, a school district may borrow up to 4% of the assessed valuation as equalized; by special permission the district may borrow up to 6%. The Plaistow School District has an assessed valuation as equalized of \$7,455,019 for 1956. The present indebtedness is \$57,000, which means that the present net borrowing capacity of the district as of March 1959 is \$241,201 at the 4% rate and \$390,301 at the 6% rate When the 1958 figure is released, it undoubtedly will be larger.

The 1957 State Legislature increased state contributions toward costs of school construction from 20% to 30% of the district's annual payment of principal on all outstanding indebtedness.

### Report of the Principal of the Pollard School Walter G. Leathe

Once again this year the Pollard School was placed high in the County Spelling bee. Out of thirty-six entries a student from Pollard took third prize.

A Science Fair was held on the front lawn of the school. Grades 5, 6, 7 and 8 participated in this program. The Plaistow Lions Club added extra incentive by an Award Fostering Program and the presentation of several large prizes. Extensive coverage of the fair was given in the Western Electric "Communicator".

The Plaistow Public Library again extended its facilities to the school three days a week for those youngsters who ride the buses. The librarian planned special hours for the distribution of books to bus pupils. The Grade Two book club held its annual observance with great success.

For the second year in a row, a student in the Pollard School won the American Legion Essay Award for writing the best essay on a patriotic theme.

Savings stamps were sold for thirty weeks during the school year at an average sale of \$125 per week and a grand total of \$3,752.25. Eighty-two bonds were purchased by Pollard School students. A very important phase of bicycle safety was presented by State Motor Vehicle Inspector Kenneth Hurteau, to the pupils of the school at a Town Hall assembly. Along with this should be mentioned the success of the Pollard School Safety Patrol and the advent of the Safety Patrol "officer-of-the-month".

The Annual Christmas Pageant for the Parent Teacher Association was held under the co-direction of Music Supervisor Ann Treadway and teacher Louise Jackson. This pageant included readings by several pupils and musical numbers by the School Glee Clubs.

The Pollard School field trips of an academic nature were very successful. These included special historical trips to Boston, cultural museum trips and environmental trips. Of special interest was the Grade 4 trip to a Maple Sugar Farm outside Concord. At Concord they met Governor Dwinnell who welcomed them to the State House. A visit to the State Wild Life room, where most of the New Hampshire wildlife is exhibited, was enjoyed.

### **Report of the School Nurse-Teacher**

The annual health examinations were conducted by Dr. Herbert Q. Horne and the following pattern indicates results in comparison with recent years:

1956 - 180 examinations given - 49 defects found

- 1957 160 examinations given 56 defects found
- 1958 186 examinations given 85 defects found

Notices of defects are sent home and are generally taken care of by parents. The examinations are given each year to those students in grades 1, 4 and 7 — as well as to children new to the school.

All children receive a hearing and vision test with proper follow-up work through cooperation with parents, school and organizations. This year we have a new Audiometer for the hearing tests and through the generosity of the Lions Club we have a new Vision Tester available. The usual tests in color perception, charts of height and weight for each child, home visits, health films, pre-school registrations and visits to clinics take up much of the time of the nurse's program.

### Report of the Vocal Music Program Ann Treadway, Supervisor

In the first two grades music classes include singing, listening, rhythmic activities and simple dramatic portrayals of the stories and moods found in the songs. The main emphasis is on enjoyment and the development of a sense of rhythm and a sense of pitch. From the third grade through the sixth, note-reading and technical learning are added to the basic program of singing, listening, developing rhythm and dramatizing. The emphasis shifts in junior high from development of skills to understanding and appreciation of many forms and types of music. Recordings of orchestral pieces are played and discussed; songs from many countries are sung, and the technical foundation is reviewed.

At Pollard the Glee Clubs (Treble Clef, grade 7-8 and Songsters, Grade 5-6) gave a Christmas Concert for the Parent Teacher Association. They will also present a Spring Concert for the general public in late April. Several classes have had opportunity to perform for the entire school at the Christmas program, and other classes will sing or play at the Memorial Day service. The eighth grade class will present musical selections at their graduation.

### Report of the Instrument Music Program Calvin Schraga, Supervisor

Our aim has been to produce an instrumental instructional program, leading to an advanced and beginners band in Plaistow. Demonstrations were given early in the year in an effort to stimulate growth in the program. Plaistow had a good response. At the present time Plaistow has a very fine young band and a goodly number of new students working on instruments. I think this organization is strong and is progressing very well. At present there are nine students in the beginners band and about 32 in the advanced band. These include students from grade four through eight. We have made considerable progress by having a monthly combined meeting of the four towns which gives the youngsters of the smaller schools an opportunity to participate as a band, and the reaction on the part of the students was wonderful. If this could be made a weekly procedure, I am convinced this would foster the growth of the program in our smaller schools.

### COMMUNITY ORGANIZATIONS

Appreciation is expressed for the continued support and cooperation of the Plaistow Parent Teachers Association, the Band Parents, the American Legion Auxiliary, the Lions Club and all other local organizations. Special thanks to Mr. Carter Keezer for establishing a fine scholarship program for Pollard students. I wish to thank the School Board, teachers and children for their cooperation in making our work successful.
