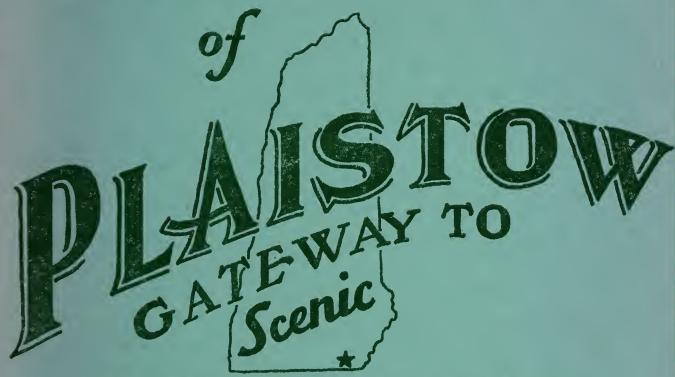

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Plaistow in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Plaistow on Tuesday, the eighth of March, next at eight of the clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles:

- Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- Article 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$150.00 to acquire Broad Form Money and Securities Insurance for one year indemnifying the Town and its officers against the loss of Town Funds due to Hold-up, Burglary, Damage or Destruction caused by Fire, Flood and/or other manner of loss not covered under present Town Officers' performance Bonds.
- Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,337.52 to take care of over expenditure on Bridge on Westville Road.
- Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to accept Trust Funds now held by the Cemetery Trustees.
- Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow in anticipation of taxes.

- Article 7. Shall the provision of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to playing games of Beano be adopted in this Town.
- Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 for the control of Dutch Elm Disease.
- Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$750.00 for the repair or removal of damaged or diseased Town-owned trees and the replacement of same wherever possible.
- Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to eliminate the payment of discount on Property Tax Bills as voted under Article 16 of the 1955 Warrant.
- Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$900 to be transferred to the War Memorial Committee in futhering development of the Recreation Area at the rear of the Pollard School.
- Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of the Municipal Budget Law. (By Petition).
- Article 13. To see if the Town will elect a Budget Committee after the first year.
- Article 14. To have the Town elect 9 members to the Budget Committee.
- Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the use of the Industrial Commission in carrying out the purpose of that commission.
- Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to continue the sidewalk construction program.
- Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 for the use of Civil Defense.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$750.00 to replace compressor for Air Horn at the Fire House.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to accept as submitted the reports of Agents, Auditors and other Officers and Committees heretofore appointed.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to amend Paragraph 4 of Article V of the Zoning Ordinance to read "Each lot shall have a frontage of at least 150 feet, except that where lots are not rectangular the mean width shall be 150 feet. No lot shall be less than 22,500 square feet in area".

Article 21. To see if the Town shall amend the building code to require 480 square feet living area on the first floor per dwelling.

Article 22. To authorize tax collector to levy a 20 cent penalty on Poll Taxes not paid before December first of the year in which the tax is levied.

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$450.00 to modernize town tax records and bookkeeping methods.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN YEAR OF 1959

Statement of Condition

The Town of Plaistow closed the year 1959 with an unexpended balance of \$5,222.07 against the 1959 appropriations.

The town surplus on December 31, 1958 amounted to \$14,311.02. The total surplus on December 31, 1959 amounted to \$14,713.33. This surplus consisted of Unexpended funds, \$4,913.87 and unredeemed taxes in the amount of \$7,139.04 with uncollected taxes of \$2,660.42.

The net Surplus is \$402.31 greater than the 1958 surplus.

The property valuation increase was \$214,848.50. This brings the town valuation to \$4,669,135.00. We had veteran's property exemptions in the amount of \$253,625.

Because of increased budgets and in spite of the use of \$6,300.00 Surplus in Overlay account, the tax increase amounted to \$7.50 per thousand.

During the past year this office in conjuction with the State Highway Department has been instrumental in bringing about improved road conditions.

Construction of one new street, May Ray Avenue, was possible through Town Road Aid program.

A bad drainage condition at Forrest Street was corrected.

The Westville Road bridge was completed. The State of New Hampshire estimate for construction was \$8,000.00. Our share to be \$4,800.00 and the State Bridge Aid to furnish \$3,200.00. This amount was exceeded because of continued high water and we are oblidged to pay an additional \$2,337.52.

The growth of the town is evidenced by the fact that the Building Inspector, Mr. Samuel Winrow, issued 76 Building Permits in the amount of \$386,310.00

Through the efforts of Mr. Fred Rand the physical condition of the Town Hall has shown continued improvement.

With the continued efforts of all Town and School District departments we feel optimistic about the future.

If all taxpayers will show an effort towards thrift at both school and town meetings we are sure that services will not be affected and we shall continue to progress at not too great a cost, TAXWISE.

REPORT OF THE ROAD AGENT FOR 1959

This is my first report as Road Agent. Just after I was elected, we had the largest snow storm of the year. There was a lot of criticism concerning the condition the roads were in, but I think I did a good job considering I didn't have time to get the town equipment installed on my trucks.

We had another big snow storm last December which was the first storm of the season with no funds left in the winter maintenance. I tried to keep the cost at a minimum, but the storm was larger than I anticipated. Therefore, I ran over the winter maintenance fund.

The TRA funds that the state provides were spent on May Ray Avenue for rebuilding and surfacing the Avenue.

The summer maintenance for 1959 was spent mostly in patching, puting up guard rails, and tarring the following roads: Pollard Road, Wentworth Avenue, Old County Road, Old Road, Jesse George Road, West Pine Street, Westville Road, Morton Avenue, Kimball Avenue, Maple Avenue, Witch Lane, Cifre Lane, Evans Avenue, Whiton Avenue, Davis Park, Duston Avenue, Stanwood Avenue, Railroad Avenue, Kelleher Avenue, the road by Caillouette's Store, side of Main Street from the railroad track to Al's Variety Store was tarred two coats. Center Circle, Ingall's Terrace and Pine View Avenue were gravel roads which needed two coats of tar. I took advantage of the fact that tar was cheap this year so I tarred as many roads as possible.

A new catch basin and culvert were needed on Forest Street so these were installed.

There was a little money left so I bought safety signs for some of the streets. They were so late arriving that they are not up yet.

I want to thank the people of the Town of Plaistow for the excellent cooperation given my department in my first year as Road Agent.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH 1959

In the year 1959 it has been the duty of the Board of Health to report to the State Board of Health the following contagious diseases.

Measles-22. Scarlet Fever-2. Chicken Pox-7. Mumps-2 German Measles-2. Dog Bite-8.

It has been necessary to make reports to the Dept. of Public Welfare of the State concerning the birth of three premature babies, who had to remain in the hospital until their weights became normal (5 lbs.) This was a question of settlement.

Eleven homes were investigated for the care of foster children, or a day nursery or a kindergarten school.

Nine cases of nuisances against public health were investigated and letters sent requesting abatement of such nuisances. All were investigated after due time to see that such demands were met and nuisances abated.

Three polio clinics were held at Town Hall under the direction of the Board and a number of adults as well as pre-school children were given the required number of innoculations.

It was demanded of the Board that an investigation be made relative to the complaint that three children were neglected and underfed. This was done with the assistance of the Deputy Chief of Police.

Three food dispensing places were investigated and demands made for adequate health conditions of premises, with adequate water supply and proper sewerage disposal.

At the request of the school Nurse, in accordance with the State Health Dept. order, two investigations were made, one of a skin condition and the other for condition of scalp. Request for remedy of both made.

It has become needful that this Board investigate every new structure and home construction with the Building Inspector as to the adequacy and situation of both the water supply and the sewerage disposal plant, relative one to the other and their situation relative to those of the neighboring water supply and all sewerage plants. This inspection is made before such installations are covered so that any necessary change can be made without too great disturbance of the already existing plants. The Building Inspector notifies the Board as to the conditions existing at each new construction and inspection of same is made in his company.

Two home sites and plans of water and sewerage disposal were seen under the Veteran's Aid Act.

It has been a busy year for the Board and with the help of all the people of the Town we can help to make this town a clean and healthy one and any complaints against the sanitary laws of the town will be fully investigated if such complaints reach the Board by mail. If any neglect of our civil duty ensues than all of us can get into costly trouble both as to contaminated water and inadequate sewerage disposal.

REPORT OF THE PLAISTOW FIRE DEPARTMENT January 1, 1959 to December 31, 1959

In submitting my annual report of the Plaistow Fire Department, I would like to take this opportunity to thank the members of the department for their fine cooperation and the citizens of the town for being considerate and careful in out-door burning.

One of our most threatening fires took place on May 8, when nine fires were set along the B. & M. right of way by a train. A distance of over two miles was burning at one time. At the height of the fire we had the assistance of nine outside departments, which prevented a possible conflagration.

During the year we have answered a total of seventy alarms. In this number were two out-of-town calls; eleven buildings; eight autos and trucks; twenty-six grass and brush; two oil burners; two chimney; dump eight; and the rest were emergencies.

The estimated fire loss was approximately eleven thousand dollars.

During 1959 the following work was accomplished on the War Memorial $4\frac{1}{2}$ acre recreational area at the rear of the Pollard School:

Plans were to harrow, power rake and seed the whole play area before frost, but were unable to locate a harrower who could spare us the time.

A test scoop in the skating area was made, but the continual wet weather all through the summer prevented heavy equipment from doing much. We have Bob Morin hired to do this work as soon as ground conditions will allow.

Helping to hold costs down on the project were; the low costs at which fill and loam were delivered to the site by Al Hoyt and the Senter Brothers, John Johnson's donation of time and equipment in spreading the lime, and work by Bob Morin's 'dozer and operator for which he refused payment. We've had other offers of help which we hope to be able to accept next Spring.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and the Citizens of Plaistow:

I am presenting herewith my Fourth Annual Report as Superintendent of Schools in Plaistow. A report from the principal will discuss more in detail the activities of the school. Statistical reports are listed separately.

Personnel

Last September six teachers and a principal were new to the Pollard School staff. They were Albert Wilson, your new principal, with teaching experience in New Hampshire and Connecticut, and last year was principal of the Central School in Hampstead; Miss Patricia Plumber, Keene Teachers College, with two years teaching experience, grade 1; Miss Ruth Fleming, Keene Teachers College, grade 4; Mrs. Amy Kimball, Keene Teachers College, with ten years teaching experience, grade 5; Mrs. Phyllis Whitcomb, Bridgewater State Teachers College, with one year experience, grade 5; Stuart Curtis, Plymouth Teachers College, social studies, grades 7 and 8; Mrs. Ruth Webster, English, grades 7 and 8.

All teachers have continued membership in local, state and national professional organizations. Union No. 55 had 100% membership last year in these organizations and was only one union of four in New Hampshire that could claim this distinction, which speaks well of the professional attitude of our teachers.

Although teachers' salaries have increased in Plaistow, they have not kept pace with the other towns in our Union and they are below the average paid elementary teachers in New Hampshire. The salaries paid New Hamshire teachers are substantially below the national average for teachers. The Massachusetts State Legislature passed, to take effect September 1, 1960, a minimum salary law of \$4,000.00 for all beginning teachers. This law affects Plaistow and Union No. 55 because of our close proximity

to the Massachusetts' border. Many of our inquiries for teaching positions come from persons who are natives of Massachusetts communities. These facts we must consider. Another important fact is the rate of teacher turn-over.

I feel very strongly about the need to raise teacher salaries. The citizens of Plaistow want the best education possible for their children. If you do not raise the salaries comparable to other communities in this area you will not get fully-qualified beginning teachers and you may lose some of your younger experienced teachers. If this happens you will not be able to provide a satisfactory education for your children. All communities are coming to this realization and are doing something about it. The teachers are the backbone of any school system and I again urge all those interested in their schools to recommend and support a good salary schedule in order to have an equal chance with your neighboring communities in hiring the average and above average teaching candidates.

My congratulations to the citizens of Plaistow for the fine addition to your school. You now have sixteen rooms satisfactory in all respects and I know that the teachers and pupils were glad to leave the basement.

Your School Board has continued to maintain and improve the physical condition of the old section so that the floors, ceilings and furniture have all been modernized. A regular painting program has given the rooms a clean look.

The School Board has had a fire detector system installed throughout both the old and the new sections which will give adequate warning in case of fire.

Curriculum

The courses of study and the textbooks used in the Pollard School meet the highest standards. Emphasis has continued to be placed on reading and a complete testing program under the direction of Robert Dolph, supervisor of instruction, is in operation. The results in both areas are very gratifying.

Through the efforts of the Parent Teacher Association, educational television has been added to the curriculum. This medium will help supplement class work and will be a worthwhile contribution.

It is becoming more apparent that a special class in education, for the group of pupils between the trainable and the slow learner, must be provided for outside the regular classroom. There are pupils who cannot benefit from regular class attendance in Plaistow, who should be helped. A special class can be started on a part-time basis, and I believe such a class should be established. Every child has a right to a full education.

The early grades are becoming larger, and as they increase I would like to recommend a remedial teacher who would help in the area of reading where skills need more reteaching.

One trend in education which is becoming more popular is the use of teacher aids. This device is being used in areas where classes are becoming large. A person, usually one with vocational experience now at home, may come in the morning to help one teacher or a group of teachers. She comes in at a nominal fee, usually so much per hour, to do many of the clerical tasks that take so much time from teaching. This help permits the teacher to do the things she is professionally trained to do.

I wish to call to the attention of the public that such activities as home economics, manual training and hot lunch which were formerly a part of the Pollard School program might eventually be reconsidered.

A summer school program was offered last year in the Union for pupils who needed extra help. It may be continued this coming summer if parents are interested.

The National Defense Act makes it possible to improve the curriculum in several areas, noteably science. The Federal Government will contribute approximately \$700 or any part to Plaistow, under the Act, provided we match it dollar for dollar. We should avail ourselves of this opportunity to purchase science equipment that we might not otherwise purchase.

Community Organizations

Appreciation is expressed for the continued support and cooperation of the Plaistow Parent-Teachers Association, the Band Parents, the Lions Club, the American Legion Auxilliary and all other local organizations. Special thanks to Mrs. Carter Keezer who has established a second scholarship program for worthy Pollard pupils, and to the late Harry Hurd who presented to the school a fine art collection.

I wish to thank the School Board, teachers and children for their cooperation in making our work successful.

PRINCIPAL'S ANNUAL REPORT

The enrollment at Pollard School has increased over the 1958-59 figures. Our present enrollment is as follows:

The objectives of the school are based on the development of skills in the basic subject areas, such as language arts, arithmetic, science, social studies and study skills. Skills by themselves do not produce abilities, any more than knowledge produces abilities without skills. A skill

is a method of operation, or a means of meeting a new problem situation. Although these contribute to the general storehouse of knowledge, knowledge comes into play when the intellectual ability of a student requires him to organize and reorganize a problem situation, and to make use of proper materials in developing a plan of attack by which he hopes to arrive at a solution. Our primary objectives then, are two fold; one, to develop skills and knowledge, two, to produce abilities.

The process is being repeated daily in every class-room. In reading for example a "word attack" skill is presented; the student is then given the opportunity to apply that skill to a new problem in identifying an unfamiliar word. If the student is successful, it can be assumed that the student has achieved a skill, has the knowledge to apply it in a new problem situation and is now in possession of a single ability. The number of abilities taught through grades 1-8 are prodigious. No attempt has been made to enumerate them, or to synthesize the various abilities, except in a few compendiums issued by the State Department of Education. Such a project would have significant value in curriculum organization.

Pollard School also pursues the development of attitudes in specific areas. It is expected that children will acquire healthy attitudes toward their existence and their relationship with one another. "Healthy attitudes" as such is a vague generalization as here presented, but our efforts in this direction are decidedly more specific. For example, it is hoped that by showing a need to cooperate with the custodians in keeping the school clean and neat, an attitude of pride in their school may develop in some youngsters.

A guidance program has been initiated this year in the eighth grade. This program was designed to explore attitudes and to suggest ways of improving them. The second part of the program will involve parents and high schools in helping the graduating class to select the high school curriculum best suited to the students. In general we endeavor to keep abreast of the newer concepts in education and to keep our program in a state of flexibility to allow for innovations required by a rapidly changing world. Teachers are encouraged to experiment with, and evaluate newer methodologies, to evaluate their present techniques and to vary their programs and approaches to an otherwise traditional curriculum.

The Parent-Teachers Association has been very cooperative and helpful. The programs have been varied, interesting, and certainly educational. Pollard School received as a gift from the P.T.A. a television receiver so that our curriculum is now enriched through the use of educational television programs. In the first term we utilized the programming of WENH-TV, Channel 11, Durham, N. H. in the area of science, music, art and literature.

Several mothers from the P.T.A. volunteered to sell savings stamps to students each week. This greatly facilitated the savings stamp program by freeing teachers for the more serious task of teaching without sacrificing a savings program.

The staff at Pollard is divided into three groups, each working on a project which will directly or indirectly effect an improvement in instruction. The primary teachers are working on a parent handbook. This handbook will include pertinent information to familiarize parents of primary children with school routines. It is hoped that eventually a handbook will be available for all parents.

At the intermediate level, the teachers are exploring the possibilities of a reading plan similar to the Joplin Plan of Joplin, Missouri. This is an ungraded plan where all children reading at the same level are in the same room for reading instruction. The plan would have to be modified to be harmonious with our particular situation.

Junior high teachers are involved in a program of articulation whereby we can coordinate our educational program with that of the local high schools enabling us to better prepare youngsters for their secondary education.

The efforts of the staff to continually seek improvement are reflected in another way. The results of our achievement testing program placed our students at an average of 3.1 months above the national norm. This is an achievement about which many schools cannot boast, and certainly pleasant rooms and adequate and up-to-date books and supplies are a contributing factor.

The sixth grade made a trip to the Science Museum in Boston this year, where they were able to further their study of Mexico. The eighth grade had the rare opportunity of visiting MIT and seeing an electronic computor in operation. MIT provided a trained operator who explained the intricacies of the computor and also explained the binomial system of computation by which the machine computes.

A Christmas program was presented to the P.T.A. for the December meeting. Mrs. Webster directed a series of tableaus which depicted the Christmas story while music was provided by the Songsters and Treble Clef under the direction of Miss Ann Treadway.

Miss Treadway has been conducting a successful inschool vocal music program. She spends approximately two and a half days in Plaistow.

Mr. Calvin Schraga continues to direct the instrument program. Many band members went to Derry, N. H. for a combined band and chorus concert. Mr. Schraga is to be complimented on the way in which he organized and directed such a large group. We are in hopes that a similar concert can be held in Plaistow.

With the aid of funds from the P.T.A. and the Pollard Staff a Christmas party was held in each room. Each student received cake, ice cream, and a candy cane. In keeping with the spirit of the season, the children exchanged gifts and sang Christmas carols.

The health program under the direction of Gwendolyn Banks, R. N., nurse-teacher, attempts to stimulate an awareness of the importance of good health, and to present

the means for remaining in good health. Physical examinations were given for children in specified grades by Dr. Francis S. Harris, the School Doctor. Mrs. Banks tested the sight and hearing and recorded the weight and height of each child in school.

Probably the most important single event this year was the completion of the addition. The third and fourth grades moved in on October 19th. Dedication ceremonies were held on November 12th and formal acceptance came on December 16, 1959. La Perle and Sons, the contractors, were most helpful and considerate during the period of construction while classes were being conducted. Moreover their craftsmanship and pride in their work have provided us with a superb addition to the building.

Custodial help had been inadequate originally and the additional four rooms further stressed the fact that additional custodial help was necessary. In December it was decided to eliminate the part-time custodial position and replace it with a full-time position. It is felt that this alteration will in the long run, stabilize custodial and maintenance costs.

Education is dynamic - ever changing. Our needs now are not the same as fifty years ago, nor will they remain the same for the next fifty years. For the very near future, thought should be given to a full-time remedial teacher, or a full-time remedial/retarded teacher. The need is here, but at present we do not have the means of coping with the problem.

Also in the very near future the needs of the administrative office should be considered. A principal's time should not be consumed by administrative detail. Rather a competent secretary should and could handle this minutiae, thereby freeing the principal for supervision, curriculum studies and other areas requiring his attention.

Looking further in the future, consideration should be given to the resumption of the courses in home economics and industrial arts. In this day when fewer and fewer unskilled laborers are required, it seems only necessary that we should develop some of these rudimentary abilities.

A portion of the program for any school should be physical conditioning. Without the services of a gymnasium we are seriously hampered in this respect. Although some activities can be carried on during the warmer months, we are limited to almost nothing for six months of the school year. November to April is the time when we should be providing more curricular and extra-curricular physical activities.

However, we are very thankful for what we have. The untiring efforts of the Superintendent, Helping Teacher and their staff, the School Board, the Parent-Teacher Association, and citizens groups have been greatly appreciated. We thank them for their help and cooperation.
