#### **TOWN WARRANT**

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Plaistow in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Plaistow on Tuesday, the Fourteenth of March, next at eight of the clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles:

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

Article 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$150.00 to acquire Broad Form Money and securities Insurance for one year indemnifying the Town and its officers against the loss of Town Funds due to Hold-up, Burglary, Damage or Destruction caused by Fire, Flood and/or other manner of loss not covered under present Town Officers' performance Bonds.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to accept Trust Funds now held by the Cemetery Trustees.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow in anticipation of taxes.

Article 6. Shall the provision of Chapter 171-A of the revised Laws relative to playing games of Beano be adopted in this Town. Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 for the control of Dutch Elm Disease.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$750.00 for the repair or removal of damaged or diseased Town-owned trees and the replacement of same wherever possible.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to continue the formerly appointed War Memorial Committee for a period of one year, with one new appointment by the Moderator to fill existing vacancy; and to qualify said committee to receive and handle money appropriated to the War Memorial Fund.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the amount of \$3,000.00 for the War Memorial Fund for the purposes of completing two baseball fields, court play area, skating rink and miscellaneous facilities.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize appointment of a Recreation Commission, to serve without compensation, to consist of five Plaistow citizens, and to be responsible for control and direction of maintenance of the War Memorial Recreation Area and for the scheduling and supervision of its uses.

Appointments to the Recreation Commission to be made by Selectmen and Moderator in concert as follows: Two for three years, two for two years and one for one year; their successors to be appointed for three years.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of the Municipal Budget Law. (BY PETITION.)

Article 13. To see if the Town will elect a Budget Committee after the first year. (BY PETITION.)

Article 14. To have the Town elect nine members to the Budget Committee.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the use of the Industrial Commission in carrying out the purpose of that commission.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 to continue the sidewalk construction program.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to change the number of Trustees of the Public Library of the town from three to five, and to provide for the election of one member each year for a term of five years; this article to take effect with the annual Town Meeting of 1962, at which time there shall be elected one trustee for a term of three years, one for a term of four years and one for a term of five years, and annually there-after to elect one member of said Board of Trustees for a term of five years.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to increase the membership of the Industrial Commission created by article adopted by the annual Town Meeting held in March 1957 from three members to seven members.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 to install and maintain flashing light at Pollard School crossing on Main Street.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for improvement of water holes.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,400.00 to replace pump on tank truck.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to accept as submitted the reports of Agents, Auditors and other Officers and Committees heretofore appointed.

#### **REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN**

#### **YEAR OF 1960**

The Town of Plaistow closed the year 1960 with an unexpended balance of \$4,044.75 against the 1960 appropriations.

The total surplus was \$28,094.72. There was \$11,743.19 in unredeemed taxes and \$2,505.80 in uncollected taxes.

The property valuation increase was \$384,251.00. This brings the total Town's valuation to \$5,053,386.00. We had Veteran's Property Exemptions in the amount of \$283,325.00 which was an increase in Exemptions of \$29,700.00.

With an increase in the total Town Budgets the above increase in valuation, and this was in new and additional construction, was a factor in reducing our Tax Rate by \$2.00 per thousand.

We installed a new system for bookkeeping to keep record of valuations. This system took considerable time to set up this year but in years to come it will save countless hours.

The system which in its form is the first of its kind in New Hampshire has created a great deal of interest throughout the state.

Numerous towns have made inquiry and have contacted us and Cybernetics, Inc., the firm that did the machine work for the Town.

An example of the work it will save is in the fact that the old hand method of doing the "Blotter Book" which took two to three weeks to do is done in about one and one half hours.

The Tax Collector's Warrant which was actually a copy of the "Blotter Book" which was done by hand is done at the same time. The Tax Bills which took the Collector some two or three weeks to type are done by this machine in about an hour. This machine will free the selectmen of the hand, time consuming work and give them more time to treat other problems.

This past year has been marked by improvement by the State in a section of South Main Street. Drainage in this area was very bad and the surface was very bad because of frost heaves.

We also, with Town Road Aid and State funds put a finished surface and installed culverts on Sunrise Terrace and with the same funds took care of a drainage condition on Center Circle.

An ordinance which was recommended by the Chief of Police to register bicycles was adopted.

Because of the outbreak of theft and breaks into business establishments, the Selectmen ordered a nightly patrol by the Police of the Town.

All organizations in the Town have been most cooperative. As an example, the Carl G. Davis Post, No. 34, A. L., donated and erected a steel flag pole in Pollard Park to replace the wooden one which was decayed and dangerous. We wish to thank the American Legion for this most generous gesture. Members of other organizations have given countless hours in traffic control and we express our gratitude to them.

We have other physical problems in the Town but we must proceed with caution less we increase our Tax Rate too severely.

We know that with the concerted efforts of all departments, both School and Town, that toward economy we shall progress without too much additional cost.

If all taxpayers will show a continued interest in effective thrift we shall continue to have our necessary services and progress, without too great a cost, Taxwise.

#### **REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH 1960**

I do, hereby, submit my report for the year 1960 as health officer of the town of Plaistow.

It has been my duty to send to the State Department of Health at Concord notices of the following cases of reportable diseases.

Dog Bite - 10; German Measles - 2; Measles - 9;

Mumps - 5; Chicken Pox - 10; Scarlet Fever - 11.

There has been no report made either for Tuberculosis or Anterior Polio.

Polio clinics were held at the Town Hall for all ages and all the innoculations from the primary up to and including the fourth.

It is necessary at this time to ask for cooperation of all heads of families to report to this Board every case of a contagious disease occuring to any member of the family since the State Department of Health has written to your board, that, many such cases have not been so reported to the local boards.

When a signed, written complaint is received by this office, relative to any infraction of the sanitary code of this town it has been investigated. No unsigned letter or telephone complaint will be so investigated. In this category fifteen complaints were received, investigated, letters written, reports made and in all satisfactory results obtained.

Reports to the State Welfare Board were made concerning three premature infants born to members of this town. Five requests for boarding State Children were received and these homes were checked and investigated and reports of same made to the Welfare Board.

At the request of the Appeal Board of this Town, this board was requested to aid in examining a piece of property which was to be used as a business site. This request was due to the peculiar layout and topography of the site. At the suggestion of this Board the owner was to have this land examined by a sanitary engineer with percolation tests made of the land. When this report was received from the owner it was sent to Concord to the State The site was then ex-Sanitary Engineers Department. amined by one of their engineers and on the receipt of his examination report, this Board did certify to the Appeal Board that the site was suitable for such use. This action involved a great amount of time and travel.

In conjunction with the Building Inspectors, Mr. Winrow and the late Mr. Newton Holmes, we have examined complaints relative to faults in the layout of both sewerage and water supply systems and have caused changes to be made in such layouts before construction had gone too far, also we have examined such systems in many new building sites in the town.

It is requested, therefor, that every new home builder submit to this Board plans for such systems and that each such system be examined before such sites are covered by fill so that there can be proper control of both sanitation and a clean water supply.

I wish to thank all the people of this town for their cooperation in trying to keep this Town clean and healthy.

I am proud to be able to submit the following report to the citizens of Plaistow; proud of the citizens for their extra care in preventing fires and of the men in my department for their efficiency.

We answered fifty alarms during the last year with a fire loss of less than \$6,000.

Of these alarms thirteen were for buildings; three emergencies; one chimney; and the rest grass and brush fires.

We were called out of town to assist on three occasions; Haverhill, Atkinson, and Hampstead.

Only once this past year were we called to the dump compared to seventeen calls the previous year. I think credit should be given to the supervision of the dump this year. The department has purchased and is installing a new air system composed of a compressor and tanks to replace the one that has been in service for almost thirty years.

I would like to remind all citizens that no burning is allowed in the open without first obtaining a permit. A permit may be obtained from your fire chief or Mr. Donald Davis, Deputy Forest Fire Warden.

The department regrets the loss of Deputy Chief Fred Rand, who passed away in December. He was a faithful member for almost twenty-five years.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the eleventh day of March, 1961 at twelve o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary School District Officers for the ensuing year.

2. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors and Committees or Officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

3. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this Warrant.

4. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriations of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

5. To see if the district will vote to add the services of a teacher of Special Education to the Union staff. This would not be effective on a Union basis until September 1962, and would not rai e any money in the 1961-62 school year.

6. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate five hundred dollars (\$500.00) to hot-top a section of the school yard.

7. To see if the district will authorize the school board to make application for and to receive, in the name of the district, such advances, grants-in-aid, or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from Federal, State, local or private Agencies.

8. To transact any further business that may legally come before the meeting.

#### **REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS**

To the School Board and the Citizens of Plaistow:

I am presenting herewith my Fifth Annual Report as Superintendent of Schools in Plaistow. A report from the Principal will discuss more in detail the activities of the school. Statistical reports are listed separately.

#### Personnel

Four new teachers were added to the Pollard School staff in September. They were Dennis DiGennaro of Methuen, Massachusetts, a graduate of Lowell Teachers College who teaches grade 6; Miss Ann Woodman of Plaistow, a graduate of Salem Teachers College with teaching experience in Ipswich and West Newbury, who teaches grade 6; Mrs. Faith Palmer of Haverhill, Massachusetts, a graduate of Ohio State University with teaching exper-ience in Merrimac and Haverhill, Massachusetts, who teaches English in grades 7 and 8; Frederick Smith III of Haverhill, Massachusetts, a graduate of Salem Teachers College who teaches Math in grades 7 and 8. Mrs. Jean Moore of Plaistow with training at the Keene Teachers College, and who has done substitute work at the Pollard School has been added to the staff to assume the responsibilities of a third first grade, due to the heavy enrollment in this grade.

All teachers have continued membership in local, state and national professional organizations, and I am extremely proud of the fact that Union No. 55 has 100 per cent membership in these groups.

As we replace and add more teachers each year it is important that we constantly review our salary guide so that we can compete favorably with neighboring communities both in regard to a minimum and a maximum salary. Teaching candidates prefer certain geographical areas and it is more important that we are able to compete with our neighbors if we want better teachers, than be concerned with State and National averages irrespective of whether our salaries are above or below these averages. I believe that in most cases the calibre of teachers we hire depends upon the salary we are able to offer, and most important the success of the pupils depends upon the worth of the teacher.

#### **Future Housing**

This year the enrollment in grade one has reached 74. In fact, in this most critical area, where a class size of 25 is advocated, another first grade has been established and is being housed in the basement music room.

Next year we believe we may have as many as 75 in grade one. This means we should have three first grades as well as three second grades. Our total enrollment will probably exceed 500 pupils. The extra grade two, if established, will be housed in the basement leaving the Rainbow Room the only room for expansion; and at the present time it is being used for television and music, as well as an all-purpose room.

It would seem to me that the School Building Committee should be reactivated or a new one formed. It is necessary for Plaistow to study the prospects of future housing, the solution of which may be the building of a regional secondary school, grades 7-12. If grades 7 and 8 are eliminated from the Pollard School it may be sufficient then to handle grades 1-6 in the present building for the immediate future and at the same time be assured of a high school for Plaistow children. In any regard we have an immediate problem coming up at the Pollard School as the prospective large primary grades move up.

It is always problematic as to whether or not Haverhill, Massachusetts will continue to accept our high school pupils due to their own housing problems. At this time they say they will continue to take us. Sanborn Seminary will also continue to take our children, but if they have increased enrollments one never knows how long they will be able to do so. We may have two problems on our hands instead of one, and we should begin thinking about it now. Your School Board has continued to maintain and improve the physical condition of the Pollard School. A regular painting program each year improves the appearance. We can be proud of the work that the custodians do to keep a clean "look".

#### Curriculum

Last year in my report I recommended that a class in Special Education be provided, and the Plaistow budget included funds for this purpose. By pooling our resources with three other towns in Union No. 55, we were able to conduct such a class this year. We are very pleased with the results and glad that these pupils can get a fuller ed-There is more and more interest being shown in ucation. helping this type of pupil. The White House Conference Report for New Hampshire 1960, the State Department of Education, through Commissioner Charles F. Ritch, Jr., and various agencies throughout the state are advocating special classes for these pupils. The General Court may enact some legislature pertaining to these classes and may give some financial aid. It is complimentary to you that you have seen this need and have taken steps to create this class, one of the very few smaller districts to do so. A report on this class follows my comments.

Educational Television, another modern educational tool, is available at the Pollard School. Channel 11 is providing more courses and we now have a much fuller program from which to choose. This year Grade 5 has been grouped by ability in reading, as an experiment, and the top section is taking the television course "Parlons Francais". It will be interesting to note the progress that is made.

The National Education Defense Act makes it possible to improve the curriculum in several areas, notably science. The Federal Government will pay one-half of the cost of math, science and modern language materials and equipment for use in the classroom. We should again avail ourselves of this opportunity to provide better class instruction. It is expected that the school secretary will be placed on full time. This will enable the Principal to do more supervision of teachers. He should not be bogged down with office details when he can do more good in the classroom.

I would like to mention at this time the 1960 New Hampshire White House Conference Summary report on Youth Priorities 1960-1970 as it affects Education. I believe this report is guite pertinent, and our hope for the future lies in the acceptance of its philosophy. Education is the main basis for the broad political participation and individual mobility essential for a full society. To fulfill these needs, we must provide varied educational opportunities to challenge each inividual to realize his full abilities. It should be recognized that all institutions and programs designed to meet individual needs can, and should maintain high standards. To do this, Local, State and Federal Governments as well as individuals, business and non-profit bodies must greatly increase their support of education on all levels. Further, the teacher must be more adequately honored as an individual and recompensed as a skilled professional.

#### **Community Organizations**

Appreciation is expressed for the continued support of all local organizations and individuals. Helping at the School, honoring specific groups, presenting scholarships, looking after the health of the children and many similar tasks are undertaken each year by these groups, and my personal thanks and the thanks of all those who work with me, are extended at this time.

In conclusion, I wish to thank the School Board, Principal, teachers and pupils for their cooperation in making the work of our school successful during the year.

#### **REPORT OF SPECIAL EDUCATION CLASS**

The School Districts of Hampstead, Atkinson, Plaistow and Newton raised funds in their respective budgets this year to provide a part-time class in Special Education. By combining these resources it was possible to establish a fulltime class for a group of children who would have either been excluded from school attendance or placed in a regular classroom where they would have been at a great disadvantage themselves, or created disadvantages for the regular students.

The Hampstead School District provided a classroom in the High School, and the other three districts have contributed rent and a share of the operational costs. The classroom was equipped with student furniture, tables, filing cabinet, and various teacher tools, and each town contributed to the supplies and testing materials.

At present there are eleven pupils in the class ranging in age from nine to sixteen. There are 3 pupils from Atkinson, 3 from Hampstead, 2 from Newton and 3 from Plaistow -- with previous school attendance varying from less than a year to seven years. There are several other students eligible for attendance in the various towns, but transportation of these students to Hampstead presents a problem. At present the students ride on the regular school bus in their respective communities, and then are transported by station wagon to Hampstead. As more transportation facilities are available additional children will be admitted to the class. Pupils of varying degrees of ability are being taught at their own level, regardless of chronological age.

Mrs. Ruth Webster, the teacher, reports on class activities as follows: "In **Reading** pupils are divided into three groups working at first and second grade level. Reading is one of the most serious problems because of speech defects and various reading problems. We work on reading skills, sight vocabulary, word analysis, phonetic analysis and word drill, reading for meaning and smoothness in oral reading. Arithmetic, so important in our daily living, is taught in three groups as well. All groups have worked together on oral problems, telling time and the concept of size, measurement and numbers. Group 1 has had carrying in addition and borrowing in subtraction, multiplication up to 8's and counting in 1's, 5's and 10's. They are working in a 3rd grade workbook and occasionally in a 4th grade book. Group 2 had simple addition and subtraction, with multiplication up to 4's. They have had board work, but are now using a 3rd grade book and workbook. Group 3 is learning numbers, how to write numbers and their meaning, and are adding and subtracting one and two place numbers. They have studied the calendar and time.

In Language most of the work is oral. We are emphasizing the use of complete sentences, correct verbs, correct speaking and manners in listening. Pupils enjoy "Show and Tell' periods when they speak in front of the class. Our Spelling has consisted of words from the Dolch Basic sight vocabulary and has been studied in conjuction with our Handwriting, when we write one letter a day in capitals and small letters and the basic sight words beginning with that letter. Social Studies has been about the Family and its Members, duties and habits. We also study the community and a field trip to the firehouse during Fire Prevention Week provided first-hand information about the equipment used by Firemen. In Science the students have learned about trees of New England, the five senses, etc., and personal hygiene and cleanliness have been emphasized.

**Music** is enjoyed under the direction of the Music Supervisor. **Handwork** helps in job and community preparation and develops coordination and motor skills, so time is spent almost every day in handwork. Our work is correlated to the reading stories with seasonal pictures and bulletin board displays. For Christmas the pupils made felt bookmarks, bell lapel pins, change purses, foam tree decorations, wall plaques and tree decorations from can covers with old Christmas cards and glitter. Girls are learning to knit and boys to make models of plastic and wood. A firehouse model was made by two boys, as well as weather vanes. Pupils have come to realize that the Special Class is not a "play" school, but a serious undertaking to help prepare them for a place in the world. Teaching a Special Education Class is a challenge, but it is certainly a very rewarding experience when one sees eyes light up with understanding and when progress slowly but surely is being made."

The present budget includes funds for the continuation of this class. The cost in the 1961-62 year will be considerably less as all necessary equipment has already been purchased. Hampstead will continue to house the class. The School District Warrant for each of these towns will contain an article giving the voters the opportunity to make this a regular Union service as of September 1962. There has been legislation introduced to the present legislative session to provide State Aid to programs of this nature and the class now in operation should be eligible for this support. By combining resources with other towns having similar needs, we are able to provide a class of this nature that would otherwise be financially prohibitive.

### PRINCIPAL'S ANNUAL REPORT

I herewith submit my second annual report to the Superintendent of Schools and to the Town of Plaistow.

The enrollment at Pollard School has increased over the 1960 - 61 figures. Our present enrollment is as follows:

The television receiver donated last year by the P. T. A. is being put to extensive use. Programs are available in science, New Hampshire history, music and beginning French. These programs are being used to the degree that they dovetail with our curriculum.

Mr. Evan Williams has taken over the in-school vocal music program. He conducted the annual Christmas concert and also took a group caroling through the town and through the school. He spends approximately 2<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> days per week in Plaistow. Mr. Calvin Schraga continues to direct the band program. Band members meet at the Town Hall on Thursday mornings.

Christmas parties were held in each room. Each student received cake, ice cream and a candy cane. Funds were provided by the P. T. A. and the Pollard School Staff.

Physical Examinations were given to children in grades 1, 4, and 7, and to all new students by Dr. S. Francis Harris, the School Doctor, with the assistance of Mrs. Gwendolyn A. Banks, R. N., Nurse-Teacher. Several mothers from the P. T. A. also assisted in the examinations. Mrs. Banks is in Plaistow on Monday and Friday of each week, and daily from 8:30 to 9:00 a. m. Mrs. Banks tested the sight and hearing, and recorded the height and weight of each child in school. Following each vacation, a cursory examination is given to each child.

The Parent - Teachers - Association meets the first Thursday of each month. Teachers are in their rooms for consultation from 7:30 to 8:00 p.m. It was necessary to modify the consultation period in the seventh and eighth This was due to the large number of parents grades. wishing to see the four teachers in that department. The teachers will be in their rooms as usual on the night of P. T. A. to meet parents, and the work of each child will be available for his parent's perusal. All conferences concerning the work of individual children will be scheduled prior to the regular P. T. A. meeting. This will insure private conferences and also make it possible for those parents to see all of the teachers involved. Of course, it is possible for any parent to make an appointment to see a teacher at any time during the school year.

Achievement test results again have placed the Pollard School average above the National average. Tests are administered in Grades 2 through 8 in October of each year. Reading tests are administered at the completion of each reading book.

One often hears about changes these days; that changes are taking place at a breath-taking rate; that technological changes are staggering the imagination; and that these technological changes are causing us to react by changing our modes of living. There is no question that these changes are taking place at a rapid pace and with such consistency that one often feels like a trespasser in an age far beyond his comprehension.

These changes do not occur of and in themselves. They are the result of a more fundamental change -- a change in the process by which knowledge is validated. Less and less credence is being afforded to knowledge that cannot be tested by others than the ones who advance it. Knowledge must be derived from a rational process, and the same results achieved by others who apply the process.

The implications for public education are manyfold. Important among them is the gradual decay of undiscerning acceptance of traditional knowledge. This is not new to civilization; it is only becoming more prevalent. If this were a new attitude, Galileo never would have tested Aristotle's theory that heavier bodies fall faster than lighter ones. New knowledge is not easily accepted, especially when it supplants old accepted knowledge, as is proved somewhat by the fact that Galileo was forced to leave his university post when he upset the Aristotelian law of falling bodies because this brought him into conflict with ideas and colleagues.

The point here is that education must strive to arouse and nurture knowledge that is good because it works; it has survived the test. Knowledge must be convincing because it can be tested. Accompanying this should be a humility, a modesty, which allows one to say, "This is what I know; it is the best that I can do. You take it and try it. If it does not work, I will test it again, and if it is wrong I will discard it." Students will have to inquire not only of what they know, but how they know it.

Many innovations are in evidence at Pollard School. Any and all success achieved here is due to the cooperative efforts of the Superintendent, the Helping Teacher, and their staff; the School Board; the Parent-Teachers-Association; and citizens groups. To them we are very grateful.
