TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Plaistow in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Plaistow on Tuesday, the Thirteenth of March, next, at eight of the clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles:

- Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- Article 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to accept Trust Funds now held by the Cemetery Trustees.
- Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow in anticipation of taxes.
- Article 5. Shall the provision of Chapter 171-A of the revised Laws relative to playing games of Beano be adopted in this Town.
- Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to accept as submitted the reports of Agents, Auditors and other Officers and Committees heretofore appointed.
- Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 to repair sidewalks.

Recommended by Budget Committee.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for improvement of water holes.

Recommended by Budget Committee.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to change the number of Trustees of the Public Library of the town from three to six, and to provide for the election of two members each year for a term of three years; this article to take effect with the annual Town Meeting of 1963, at which time there shall be elected two trustees for a term of three years, one for a term of two years, and one for a term of one year, and annually thereafter to elect two members of said Board of Trustees for a term of three years.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to pay the Collector of Taxes as full compensation for the collection of Property and Poll Taxes, a commission of one half of one per cent of the sum collected.

Recommended by the Budget Committee.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a sander for the Highway Department and to appropriate the sum of \$450.00 therefore.

Recommended by the Budget Committee.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a tractor with mowing and snow removal attachments and to appropriate the sum of \$835.00 therefore.

Recommended by the Budget Committee.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to apply all or so much of the Capital Reserve Account designated as "Road Machinery Account" set up at the Annual Town Meeting held March 12, 1957, as may be required to defray the cost of the machinery purchased under articles 11 and 12.

Recommended by the Budget Committee.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell tax deeded property at public auction.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a dictating machine for the use of the Town Offices and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 therefore.

Recommended by the Budget Committee.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following Ordinance:

Pinball Machines

Section 1. Definition

Mechanical Device. The term "Mechanical Device" shall mean any machine which upon the insertion of a coin, slug, token, plate or disc may be operated by the public generally for use as a game, entertainment or amusement, whether or not registering a score, but shall not include juke boxes. It shall include such devices as marble machines, pinball machines, skill ball, mechanical grab machines, and all games, operations or transactions similar thereto under whatever name they may be indicated.

Section 2. Prohibition

No person, firm or corporation shall operate or permit to be operated on premises owned or controlled by him of any mechanical device described in Section 1.

Section 3. Penalty

Any person, firm or corporation violating any provision of this ordinance shall be liable to a fine or penalty of not more than ten dollars for each offense.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and Appropriate \$3,000.00 to be set aside as a Capital Reserve Fund for the future purchase of a fire truck.

Recommended by the Budget Committee.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the painting of the main auditorium of Town Hall and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,200.00 therefore.

Recommended by the Budget Committee.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following amendments to the Zoning Ordinances of the Town of Plaistow.

Amend zoning ordinance of the Town of Plaistow adopted March 14, 1956, as follows:

- 1. Amend ARTICLE IV General Provisions Section A. by striking out the word "except" in the third line and all that follows after it, so that the said section shall read as follows:
 - "A. No junk yard or place for the storage of discarded machinery, vehicles, or other scrap materials shall be maintained in any District."
- 2. Amend ARTICLE IV General Provisions by adding the following new section:
 - E. No quarry or gravel or sand or other burrow pit shall be opened or maintained in any district except such as may be permitted under the appropriate provisions of ARTICLE VIII Section 2.
- 3. Amend ARTICLE V Section 2 by adding the following "No dwelling and appurtenances shall occupy more than forty percent of its lot. Every dwelling unit shall have a minimum ground floor area of 700 square feet except that dwelling having living space on more than one floor above the basement may be reduced in ground floor area to 600 square feet. Open porches, garages and other appurtenances shall not be included in computing ground floor area or living space. Living space for one family shall not be less than 600 square feet of floor space exclusive of halls, stairways or other facilities used for access or in common." so that the said section shall read as follows:

- 2. No building shall house more than two families as permanent residents. No dwelling and appurtenances shall occupy more than forty percent of its lot. Every dwelling unit shall have a minimum ground floor area of 700 square feet except that dwelling having living space on more than one floor above the basement may be reduced in ground floor area to 600 square feet. Open porches, garages and other appurtenances shall not be included in computing ground floor area or living space. Living space for one family shall not be less than 600 square feet of floor space exclusive of halls, stairways or other facilities used for access or in common.
- 4. Amend ARTICLE V Section 4 by striking out the figures "100" wherever they occur and inserting the figure "150" and striking out the figure "15,000" and inserting the figure "22,500" so that said section shall read
 - "4. Each lot shall have a frontage of at least 150 feet, except that where lots are not rectangular the mean width shall be 150 feet. No lot shall be less than 22,500 square feet in Area."
- 5. Amend ARTICLE V Section 9 by striking out the whole thereof and inserting in place thereof the following:
 - "9. Property owners conducting permitted enterprises shall be allowed two advertising signs, each sign not to total over fifteen square feet in area; also one or more signs pertaining to the lease, sale or use of a lot or building on which placed, which shall not exceed a total of five square feet."
- 6. Amend ARTICLE V Section 11 by inserting the words "government office buildings" after the word "schools" so that the same shall read:
 - "11. Churches, schools, government office buildings, public utility buildings, hospitals and rest homes or convalescent homes are permitted in this district."
- 7. Amend ARTICLE VI Section 9 by striking out the whole thereof and inserting in place the following:

9. The Building Inspector, upon application for a permit for the construction of a commercial structure within a 500 foot radius of any established residence shall withhold action upon such permit for a period of two weeks, and shall forthwith send by certified mail, return receipt requested, to the owner or occupant of each such residence, notice of such application. The cost of such notice is to be borne by the applicant. Any such owner or occupant may file a request for a public hearing with the Chairman or Acting Chairman of the Board of Adjustment. If no request is filed, such permit may be issued at the expiration of the two week waiting period. If such request is filed, the permit may be issued only upon the authorization of the Board of Adjustment after a public hearing.

This provision shall apply only to the owners or occupants of such residences on March 14, 1956, and not to those who become such owners or occupants after that date.

- 8. Amend ARTICLE VI of the Zoning Ordinance by adding the following new section:
 - 10. Signs having an area on one side of over 15 square feet, illuminated signs, electrified signs or signs not pertaining to enterprises conducted on the premises shall not be erected or maintained without permission being granted by the Board of Adjustment and a finding by the Board that such use is not objectionable under the terms and in accordance with the spirit of this ordinance, which findings shall not be made except on proper notice and hearing. A published notice two weeks in advance of the meeting shall be deemed sufficient.
- 9. Amend ARTICLE VII Industrial District Section 1 by adding at the close of said Section 1 the following words "Except that after notice and hearing special exceptions may be made by the Board of Adjustment" so that the same shall read:
 - "1. Residences shall not be permitted in the Industrial District except that after notice and hearing special exceptions may be made by the Board of Adjustment."

- 10. Amend ARTICLE VIII Nonconforming Uses by striking out the whole thereof and inserting in its place the following:
 - "ARTICLE VIII Nonconforming and Restricted Uses
 - 1. Nonconforming uses.
 - A. Any nonconforming use at the date of the adoption of the amendments to the ordinance on March 14, 1956, other than uses specified in B and C below may continue in their present use except that any nonconforming use or building may not be:
 - (1) Changed to another nonconforming use;
 - (2) Re-established after discontinuance for one year except to a use conforming to the District in which it is located:
 - (3) Extended; provided, however, that in proper case the Board of Ajustment after notice and hearing may grant relief from hardship imposed by strict enforcement of the above provisions. Nothing in this clause shall be construed to permit the establishment, re-establishment, or extension of junk yards or other patently objectionable uses.
 - B. No junk yard may continue as a nonconforming use for more than one year after the 14th day of March 1956, without special permit from the Board of Adjustment. The Board of Adjustment shall prescribe the conditions under which special permit shall be granted.
 - C. No outdoor advertising structure may continue as a nonconforming use for more than two years after the 14th day of March, 1956, unless it is designed to direct attention to a business or profession conducted on the premises.
 - 2. Restricted uses.
 - A. Quarry and temporary use: Permits may be issued by the Board of Adjustment for a quarry or gravel or sand pit, or for a nonconforming temporary building or use incidental to the development of a neighborhood, and may be issued for an initial period of not more than

two years, provided the application therefor is accompanied by a bond to the Town to secure performance of the conditions of the permit, and provided the Board of Adjustment after a duly called public hearing shall rule that such building or use is not seriously detrimental or injurious to the neighborhood. Permits may be renewed under like conditions for successive periods of not more than one year each.

- B. Stripping loam: No loam or top soil for commercial use or sale shall be removed or hauled from any property within the Town of Plaistow unless the same is removed in the course of construction or improvement of the premises or unless the same is approved by the Board of Adjustment after notice and hearing."
- 11. Amend ARTICLE IX of the Zoning Ordinance of the Town of Plaistow by striking out Section 3 thereof and inserting in its place the following:
 - 3. Building Permits.
 - A. Every person intending to erect, construct, alter, restore or move any structure or portion thereof within the Town of Plaistow, at a cost of One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars or more, shall, before proceeding to do any of the work connected therewith file with the building inspector a request for a permit so to do accompanied by so much of the following information as may be pertinent.
 - a. A plan or diagram of the lot on which the work is to be done showing the location of all distances pertinent to the ordinance.
 - b. Evidence of ownership or other right or title to the said lot.
 - c. A plan and specifications of the work to be done in sufficient detail to enable the building inspector to determine if the same conforms with the requirements of the Laws of the State of New Hampshire and the terms of the ordinance and regulations of the Town of Plaistow.

- d. A plan showing the water supply system and sanitary installations together with such additional data as may be required by the Board of Health to determine the adequacy and healthfulness of the supply or installation.
- e. An estimate of the cost of such work.
- B. On receipt of application and accompanying information the Building Inspector shall, if the same appear to conform to the applicable laws, ordinances, and regulations, including the health regulations, issue a building permit for the same, the said permit to be kept in a prominent place on the premises at all times until the work is completed. The Permit shall become void unless work thereunder is commenced within six months of the date of issuance thereof and such work shall proceed with reasonable expedition once it is begun.
- C. The applicant shall pay to the building inspector a fee of \$2.00 for each \$1000.00 or fraction thereof of estimated cost at the time of filing application.
- D. Should a building permit be denied the applicant shall have a right to appeal the denial to the Board of Adjustment.
- E. The Building Inspector shall have the right to enter on any premises in the Town of Plaistow for purposes of examining the same in connection with his duties and must inspect all sanitary installations before they are covered. He shall inspect all such installations within one working day of notice by owner or contractor.
- F. The grant of a building permit is only prima facie evidence of the lawfullness of any work done thereunder, and shall not operate to legalize any work in violation of any ordinance or statute or other regulation.

- G. The Building Inspector in his own capacity and as agent for the Board of Selectmen and the Board of Health shall have the power and duty to enforce all applicable provisions of these regulations and other ordinances of the Town of Plaistow and laws and regulations of the State of New Hampshire or any department thereof or other proper authorities."
- 12. Amend ARTICLE XI of the Zoning Ordinance of the Town of Plaistow by striking out the word "and and all the words thereafter" and inserting in place thereof the following: "in accordance with the Statutes of the State of New Hampshire" so that the said Section shall read:

ARTICLE XI Amendents

"This Ordinance may be amended by a majority vote at any legal town meeting when such amendment is published in the warrant calling for the meeting in accordance with the Statutes of the State of New Hampshire."

13. In all other respects the Zoning Ordinance of the Town of Plaistow adopted at the Town Meeting held on March 14, 1956, are hereby ratified and confirmed.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Selectmen to make the presently untraveled portion of Cifre Lane subject to gates and bars from the homestead of Peterson on the southerly end to the homestead of Beaton on the northerly end.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to print the amendments to the Zoning Ordinances.

REPORT OF THE ROARD OF SELECTMEN YEAR OF 1961

The Town of Plaistow closed the year 1961 with an unexpended balance of \$4,577.80 against the 1961 appropriations.

The total surplus was \$34,573.67. There was \$13,472.78 in unredeemed taxes and \$2,502.30 in uncollected taxes.

The property valuation increase was \$327,400.00. This brings the Town's valuation to \$5,380,786.00. We had Veteran's Property Exemptions in the amount of \$319,450.00 which was an increase of \$36,125.00.

With an increase in the total Town Budget the above mentioned increase in the Town's valuation was a factor in reducing the Tax Rate by \$1.00 per thousand. This is the fourth time this has been brought about in five years.

This year was a good year for the Town Constructionwise. The new Post Office was completed and several other buildings were expanded included in these was an addition to the bank.

The roads in town were improved, through the efforts of our Representative, Road Agent, State officials and this Board.

Two new streets were built by the Town.

The State resurfaced South Main Street from the Massachusetts line through the center of the Town to The Railroad tracks in the center and spent considerable time in improving drainage on Main Street and Elm Street.

The Town Road Aid from the State in part was spent on Westville Road to eliminate a dangerous condition that has existed for too many years. The Town with our fast growth has now exceeded the 3,000 population mark. Most departments have been able to increase their efficiency and services to cope with this situation.

We welcome all the new residents to our community and hope that they will participate in the affairs of the Town. We urge them to register and vote and attend Town Meetings armed with this Town Report.

The Selectmen have deemed it advisable to look into the purchase of the Railroad station and at this time have the Town attorney investigating the legal aspects.

The Youth services in Town offered by the churches and various organizations have been numerous and outstanding. The Town is grateful for their efforts and hope they will continue.

The newly formed Budget Committee has worked diligently and we believe that the results will be the improvement of Town Government in Plaistow.

Plaistow has progressed this year and will continue to progress if there is continued cooperation between the Town Officers and its people.

Beginning Monday, October 3, the library was opened from 9 to 10 in the morning, so as to accommodate students attending the second session at Haverhill High School. This Monday opening was continued through December, when it was cancelled due to lack of interest.

It was later voted to remain open on Monday evenings from 6 to 8 upon a trial basis until April. Thus far, this has proved very successful.

This is my annual report as Road Agent. The summer maintenance was spent for patching, grading and mowing sides of roads, tarring the following roads: Smith Corner Road, Spinney Avenue, Kelleher Avenue, Laurel Avenue, Sunrise Terrace, Center Circle, the center of town, Rolling Hill Avenue, May Ray Avenue, Pollard Avenue, half of Danville Road and part of Congressional Avenue, also putting mix and place on the following roads: Woodlawn Avenue, Hillcrest Avenue, the lower end of Kimball Avenue, and building up low places on Witch Lane and Old Road with some of the mix I had left. Brush was also trimmed up on some of the roads.

Our TRA money -- that is, town road aid from the State -- was used to rebuild the section of the Westville Road beginning from the bridge going around the corner as far as Peterson's apartment house. A few new signs were installed.

The winter maintenance was used for buying salt, plowing snow, sanding and salting roads.

I want to thank the people of Plaistow for the excellent cooperation given my department.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH 1961

The State Board of Health requires, from each town or city in the State, a report on all communicable diseases and this town has this year reported the following cases.

Scarlet Fever - 32; Chicken Pox - 10; Measles - 7; German Measles - 2; Mumps - 2; Enteric Diarrhoea - 1; Infectious Hepatitis - 1; Dog Bite - 9

Release permits were given for 5 cases of Scarlet Fever where no Physician was in attendance.

Premature Births were reported to the District Health Officer as is required by the State Law relative to financial settlement of the cost of hospitalization. Five such cases were so reported.

Six homes were examined for the care of foster children cases, one such home was not passed as fit for small children due to non completion.

Two polio clinics were held at the Town Hall a month apart in which 225 innoculations were given, the youngest was just under 1 year and the eldest was 62, all stages of innoculations were given from the 1st to and included the 5th, or booster. We hope to be able to set up such clinics again this coming Spring.

The X-Ray mobile unit was invited to visit this town and conduct chest examinations From our industries and our towns people this unit did make 244 examinations and reports of the examination were mailed to each individual.

Two food dispensing places of business were examined for sanitary reasons and defects in their sewerage disposal plants, these defects were corrected and the places are now passed as corrected.

In conjunction with the building inspector new homes were inspected for the installation of water and sewerage disposal plants, these plants were inspected for size of septic tank and seepage area before they were covered and after covering to see that suitable cover was used. Twelve such inspections were made before covering and the same number after covering; in some cases it was necessary to require larger septic tanks and greater seepage areas; in one case a cess pool only was to be used for sewerage and this was rectified.

An examination of a water supply system was made for question of a possible contamination by an adjacent sewerage system and a sample of the well water was requested sent to the State for examination, a report from the State showed no contamination.

Faulty sewerage systems to the number of 5 were examined and letters sent to the owners demanding correction of same, inspection of same was made after a suitable time limit was given for correction and these faults were corrected.

Two sanitary complaints were received, one due to the overflow of a septic tank which was corrected; the other to determine the sanitary state of a building recently partially destroyed by fire, this examination was made at the request of the Chief of the Fire Department and a report of the condition of the dwelling was sent to the Chief.

At the request of the Selectmen an examination of the Town Dump was made, with the Fire Department, the Board of Selectmen and supervisor of the dump, being present. Under the circumstance of such a necessary part of the Town it was found to be in a good working order and not a nusiance, as was implied by the complainant.

No complaint of any nature will be received by the Board of Health unless it be written and signed by the writer, telephone complaints are a waste of your and my time so write your complaints and sign them.

It is with pleasure that I submit my thirtieth report as fire chief.

We have had one of the finest fire records in years. The citizens of Plaistow should be commended for their continued carefulness about fire prevention.

The department has answered thirty seven alarms this year. They have been: eight buildings; five automobiles; one railroad car; two wood fires; five out-of-town assistance calls; and four emergency calls. The remaining alarms were for grass and brush fires.

Our fire loss was less than six thousand dollars.

I must emphasize again that no outdoor burning shall be done without first obtaining a permit from your fire chief or deputy forest fire warden, Donald Davis.

No power oil burner shall be installed or replaced without first obtaining a permit from your fire chief.

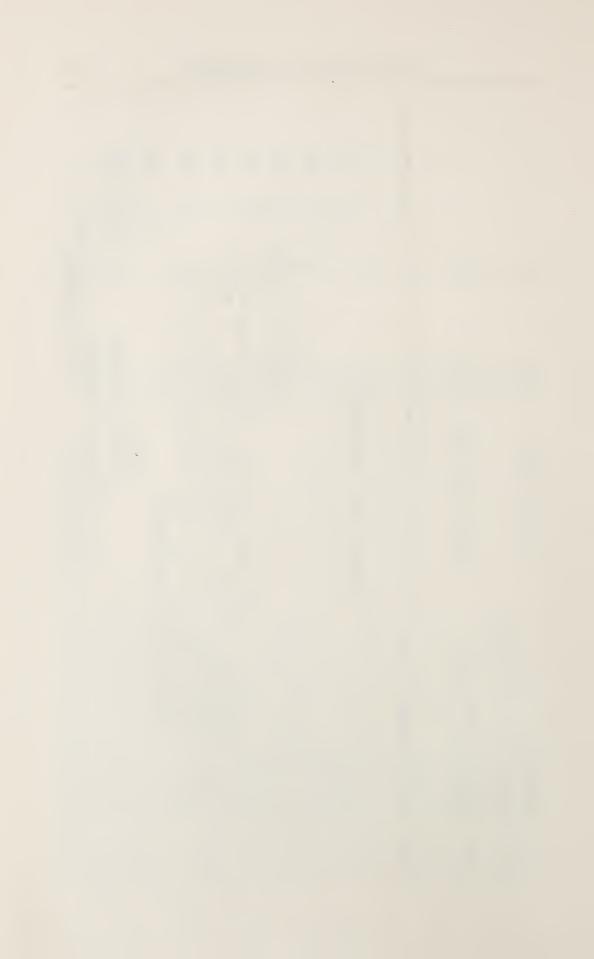

- 3. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this Warrant.
- 4. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriations of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) to participate with the towns of Newton, Atkinson and Hampstead, each contributing a like amount, for the purpose of engaging a professional school survey group to make recommendations regarding a regional school for these towns.
- 6. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate an amount not to exceed Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) to cover a deficiency incurred during the current school year, such amount to be paid to the district prior to June 30, 1962.

- 7. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) to provide funds for the activities of the present School Survey Committee.
- 8. To see what action, if any, the school district wishes to take to authorize the school board to enter into a long-term contract relative to educating secondary school students.
- 9. To transact any further business that may legally come before the meeting.

The School Housing Survey Committee has been meeting monthly since September, 1961. At your request, our efforts have been directed toward determining the classroom space needs of our students for the next several years. As the amount of research work being done by our various sub-committees is increased, it is expected that we will be meeting more frequently. We hope that by the end of this school year, most of our study work will be completed, and that early next fall we will be able to formulate our recommendations and present them to you for your consideration.

While there continues to be some difference of opinion in town as to which housing problem is more acute, the elementary or the high school, it is generally agreed by the members of the committee that both problems must be studied simultaneously since they are somewhat interdependent if we should later consider a departure from the present eight-four system.

We plan to study as many facets of these problems as possible, and it is quite probable that we will offer you alternate sets of recommendations at a later date.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Plaistow:

I am presenting herewith my Sixth Annual Report as Superintendent of Schools in Plaistow. A report from the Principal will discuss more in detail the activities of the School. Statistical reports are listed separately.

Personnel

Four new teachers were added to the Pollard School staff in September; Mrs. Edna Boyd with teaching experience in Haverhill, Melrose, Hampstead and Newton, New Hampshire who teaches grade three; Mrs. Bernice MacAskill with teaching experience in Salem and Newton, New Hampshire who teaches grade two; Miss Marilyn Glazier with teaching experience in Harwinton, Connecticut who teaches grade two; and Miss Nancy Slipp, a recent graduate of Merrimack College, who practice taught at North Andover High School and who teaches mathematics in grades seven and eight.

All teachers have continued membership in local, state and national professional organizations. Thirteen teachers have taken courses this past year to improve themselves professionally.

The teachers have proposed a salary schedule for next year which the School Board has approved. This schedule is realistic and compares favorably with schedules in other towns and cities in the area. Such a schedule permits us to hire well qualified teachers and encourages our younger teachers to stay with us and rewards our older teachers for their many years of experience. A feature of the salary schedule requires teachers to seek additional credits periodically in order to advance on schedule.

Housing

At this time there are two major problems confronting the School Study Group. Namely, what to do about the increased enrollments in the elementary grades and what to do about the high school students who may be cut off at Haverhill High School.

Our projections showed a gradual increase in the elementary grades that will require in the not too distant future additional space, especially if we are to maintain satisfactory class sizes which have proven most beneficial to us. At present we are using two of the three basement rooms. Only the Rainbow Room is available for expansion and that room is needed for music, television and other worthwhile activities.

Our high school enrollment is increasing and if Haverhill High School refuses admission to our students we will have problems. Sanborn Seminary is not equipped to handle all of them.

My recommendation is to join with our neighbors and build a regional high school, grades 7-12. Such a school will not only take care of your high school students but will release space in the Pollard School for four more rooms. You will then have eighteen rooms for three sections each of grades 1-6, which should take care of your needs for many years to come. Having your own regional school will permit you to have a voice in the administration of your school and set its policies. We do not have any such opportunities at this time. Furthermore, the curriculum for the seventh and eighth grades will be much improved over what we are able to offer now. If four towns join together in building such a school the State of New Hampshire will pay fifty per-cent of the construction costs.

I believe that one or two procedures should be followed or perhaps combined. One would be to form a twenty member committee, five members from each of the towns of Atkinson, Hampstead, Newton and Plaistow, to study the advisability of building a regional high school.

This committee could come from our present survey group. Our present group could still continue to operate. All of these towns mentioned have relatively the same problems and you would need the number of students that these towns will enroll to adequately provide the services and finances that such a school will need. The other possibility would be to hire a professional survey firm, as many school districts are doing, to study your problems and advise. They can advise the various towns as to whether it is better to add on to present buildings, discard old buildings, where to build and in fact give us professional assistance as to whether we should build or not.

Your School Board has continued to maintain and improve the physical condition of the Pollard School. We have two excellent custodians who take pride in the appearance of their building.

Curriculum

The class in special education has continued to prove its worth. Six pupils from Plaistow are members of the class. The New Hampshire State Legislature appropriated money this past year to aid school districts in financing such classes.

A second television set was added this year through the generosity of the Parent-Teacher Association so that more pupils will be able to benefit from the excellent educational programs broadcast by Channel 11.

The School District continues to take advantage of the National Defense Education Act which provides funds for expenditures in science, math and modern languages materials and equipment for use in the classroom.

All the teachers and principals in Union No. 55, including the Pollard School personnel, have taken upon themselves to evaluate their own schools. This is a long range program and they will self-evaluate their own school facilities, equipment, curriculum, subject matter, teaching methods and techniques. They will use as guides the latest evaluative criteria available. From this study it is expected that if there are any weak spots they will be evaluated and corrected.

It is necessary also to constantly review current trends and if we find any that are adaptable to our specific needs then we should do some experimenting. It is necessary that we learn more about enrichment, acceleration, departmentalization in the intermediate grades and teaching machines, to mention a few possibilities. We should also study the possibility of expanding school libraries, do more with elementary guidance, add a remedial teacher if our class size increases and, when funds are available I believe we should study the need for an art supervisor for Plaistow, Hampstead, Atkinson and Newton who could enrich and stimulate our art program.

Investing in Quality Education

The best way to attract good industry to your town or area is not to lower taxes. It is to have good schools. Labor supply, land cost, utility rates and taxes all take a backseat to the schools. A research laboratory is only as good as the men who work in it, and these men will not go to a new location unless they can be guaranteed good schools for their children. Support your School Board in their endeavor to provide quality education for your children.

Appreciations

Appreciation is expressed for the continued support of all local organizations and individuals. Helping at the School, honoring special groups, presenting scholarships, looking after the health of the school children and presenting worthwhile programs are very commendable acts and please accept my thanks for what you do for the children.

In conclusion, I wish to thank the School Board, Principal, teachers and pupils for their cooperation in working at all times for a better educational program.

PRINCIPAL'S ANNUAL REPORT

I herewith submit my third annual report to the Superintendent of Schools and to the Town of Plaistow.

The enrollment figures for the school year 1961-1962 are as follows:

Pollard School now has two television receivers: both the new receiver and the one in use were donated by the P. T. A. A second receiver was necessary to ease scheduling problems created by an increase in the number of programs. Available for our use are programs in such areas as music, science, social studies, guidance, phonics, and French.

The Parent-Teacher Association meets the first Thursday of each month. The present Executive Board has made a great effort to up-grade the quality of the programs with satisfactory results. The theme for the year centered on educational problems and the programs were consistent with the theme.

Mr. Evan Williams continues to direct the vocal music program, and in addition he now conducts the band. A fine Christmas program was presented at the Town Hall on December 21, 1961 and on another day the band toured neighboring towns presenting Christmas music.

The Health program under the direction of Mrs. Gwendolyn A. Banks, R. N. Nurse-Teacher, continues to provide physical examinations for grades 1, 4 and 7. Cursory examinations are made following each vacation by Mrs. Banks. Her office hours are from 9:00 a. m. to 3:00 p. m. on Monday and Friday of each week. It has become increasingly obvious that the time allocated to

Plaistow for the services of the nurse are not adequate to meet the demands. First-aid, while very important, is only a small part of the total health service required for a school of this size.

Two years ago, I recommended that consideration be given to the resumption of the industrial arts and home economics program. Plaistow is a suburban community and Pollard School is a large elementary school. of over 300 elementary schools in the State of New Hampshire, only 21 schools have larger enrollments and most of these enrollments exceed Pollard School by less than one hundred fifty students. One would expect a school of this size to contain a comprehensive program, especially at the upper grades. At the junior high level our curriculum is more than moderately limited in the effort to train youngsters for their future roles in life. Some lateral expansion, including shop and home economics, should take place in curriculum to accommodate the expanding interests and needs of young people. Certainly the potentially college-bound youngster no longer requires the same type of education as the youngster who will be taking his place as a semi-skilled or skilled laborer. Yet, due to our curriculum limitations, these children have the same academic program. Almost everyone, including educators, is opposed to lowering standards but no alternative is supplied, and not infrequently standards are juggled rather than adapting the curriculum. The alternative I suggest is a regional six year high school. It is inconceivable that Pollard School can provide the expanded curriculum required by today's youngsters, but a regional high school could. It behooves the people of Plaistow to carefully examine, the demands of society on education and to clearly delineate the adequacy of the present program.

If our junior high students were attending a regional high school, Pollard School would be relieved of the pressure of crowding. It would be possible to provide increased services and an expanded program for the remaining six grades. The net result of a regional six year comprehensive high school for this area should be increased quality education for all of our youngsters.

Another point should be mentioned. Under present conditions, Plaistow and surrounding towns are spending many thousands of dollars to educate youngsters in grades 9-12, but no town has a voice in the policy-making of the receiving schools. In a regional situation, Plaistow and the other towns would be represented on a regional school board.

Finally, from an administrative point of view, the present situation provides for disparate and insufficient articulation between Pollard School and receiving secondary schools. In the main, we send students to five different secondary schools. This in itself limits our ability to build consecution into a program.

The faculty at Pollard School is undertaking an evaluation of the curriculum in collaboration with the other towns in the Supervisory Union. The principal components of any evaluation are standards or criteria against which a measure can be made. The measuring stick we will employ will be an objective philosophy. The current curriculum will be critically examined against the aims as stated in the philosophy. From this examination will ensue recommendations to maintain, modify or reconstruct all or part of the present curricular organization.

I would like to thank the School Board, Superintendent, Teacher Consultant, Parent-Teacher Association and other local organizations, and the people of the Town of Plaistow for their splendid cooperation in furthering the cause of education.

REPORT OF SPECIAL EDUCATION TEACHER

Since last April the Special Education Class for Plaistow, Hampstead, Atkinson and Newton has been located in the former cafeteria at the Hampstead Central School. We have been provided with a large light room ideal for our classroom and craft activities.

Our class started in September with 12 pupils, but in November 3 were added, making a total of 15 pupils. We have 4 from Atkinson, 4 from Hampstead, 1 from Newton and 6 from Plaistow. These pupils range in age from 11 to 17, with varying abilities and personalities.

We start each day with devotional exercises followed by singing. Opportunity is often given for Telling Time, when pupils share experiences with the other class members. This encourages oral self-expression and improves spoken language. We have three arithmetic groups working at levels from 2nd to 5th grades, and three reading groups. Because of speech defects and various reading problems, pupils are working from primer level to third reader level. In the small groups pupils receive word drill, phonetic help, and basic reading skills besides oral reading.

Most of the language work is oral and pupils are encouraged to express themselves in good sentences and to speak clearly. Written language has been used to express capitalization and punctuation.

Handwriting skills are practiced several times a week and penmanship papers are turned in weekly to the principal's office along with those of other grades.

This year in social studies we are studying about New Hampshire. The pupils have taken advantage of the Hampstead television set to watch "The Story of the Granite State" each Monday. This is an educational program at 4th grade level from Channel 11. The pupils are able to see what they have been studying and so better understand their own state.

In science the students have studied about nature, the earth, the seasons and the weather. We have utilized the Grade 3 Science Program on television, too, when the pupils have learned about aquariums, terrariums, the seasons, electricity, sound, the eye, the ear, and other basic scientific studies. One of the lessons led to a field trip to the woods and around Sunset Lake, where we collected specimens for a terrarium for our classroom.

In health we emphasize personal hygiene, cleanliness and the care of our bodies. Each week the Music Supervisor, Mr. Williams has a 15 minute class and classroom singing shows much progress over last year. Pupils were especially enthusiastic over Christmas music and at present are enjoying patriotic songs and learning our own state song, "Old New Hampshire".

An important phase of Special Class work is the Arts and Crafts program. Pupils are trained to use their hands and develop skills that may help later in earning a living. At Christmas time decorations and various gifts were made by the children. Art work is varied to correlate with reading, social studies, science or health lessons. Each class member has made a woven reed basket and many have made gravel pictures and kitchen plaques. Future projects will include leather and felt work. Funds for craft work are limited and we are especially grateful to Mr. and Mrs Fred Gray for donations of glitter, foil, glue and leather scraps. The class would appreciate any gifts of yarn for spool knitting and regular knitting. We would be most appreciative of any books of grade 1 to 6 reading level that interested persons may wish to donate toward establishing a library for the room.

The responsibility of the Special Class teacher provides a tremendous opportunity for service to youth, and is very demanding of her resources and abilities; however, is is probably one of the most rewarding areas in the teaching profession. I wish to express my sincere appreciation to the many people who have given their support and cooperation to the Special Education Class.
