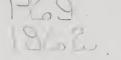

#### TOWN WARRANT

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Plaistow in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Plaistow on Tuesday, the Twelfth of March, next, at eight of the clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles:

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

Article 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to accept Trust Funds now held by the Cemetery Trustees.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow in anticipation of taxes.

Article 5. Shall the provision of Chapter 171-A of the revised Laws relative to playing games of Beano be adopted in this Town.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 to repair sidewalks.

Recommended by the Budget Committee.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell tax deeded property at public auction.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$3,000.00 to be set aside as a Capital Reserve. Fund for the future purchase of a fire truck.

Recommended by the Budget Committee.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to repair the presently unimproved portion of Cifre Lane, from the homestead of Peterson on the southerly end to the homestead of Beaton on the northerly end, a distance of approximately Thirteen Hundred Feet. By Petition.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$550.00 for chairs in upper hall, and the sum of \$200.00 for lighting in the Library.

Recommended by the Budget Committee.

Article 11. To see if the Town will rescind action to Town Meeting of March 9, 1954 in regards election of Chief of Police.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to accept as submitted the reports of Agents, Auditors and other Officers and Committees heretofore appointed.

#### **REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN**

#### **YEAR OF 1962**

Your Town closed the year of 1962 with an unexpended balance of \$11,623.85 against the 1962 appropriations. The total surplus was \$29,083.01, a reduction of \$5,490.66 as the Selectmen chose to use \$19,430.00 of this surplus to hold the 1962 tax rate at \$52.00 the same rate as 1961. This, plus an increase of \$356,865.00 in valuations enabled Plaistow to be one of the very few communities in the area that can boast only one increase in tax rate in the last six years. This has been accomplished without change in the valuation ratio.

The total valuation of Plaistow is now \$5,737,651.00 and the veterans exemptions have now reached \$311,850.00, a decrease of \$8,600.00 over 1961.

It has been a year of improvement in most of the departments of the Town and the Selectmen feel that you are getting good value for your tax dollar. You will notice as you study this Report that the Budget Committee is recommending a decrease in the Town Budget for 1963 of \$3,425.14. We are sure that with continued cooperation of all and good administration in all departments of the Town we can live quite comfortably within this substantial cut in appropriations.

You will notice as you vote this year the beginnings of a newly equipped Court Room which we hope when finished will add the needed proper atmosphere to your vastly improved Court. When you attend Town Meeting you will be pleased with your newly decorated Hall, a job accomplished by your wise vote at last years Town Meeting.

The recent completion of Veterans Memorial Field and the increased use of Town Hall for well operated youth activities have been of great benefit to our younger citizens. Plaistow is a far better place to live because of the unselfish efforts of so many people interested and active in these programs. Your Selectmen in an attempt to improve your Town government have attended all instructional meetings held by the State Tax Commission and several meetings of the various Municipal Associations and have found them to be of benefit. Also repeated trips to Concord were made to solve your proplems. We can report Plaistow has received exceptional cooperation from all State Departments.

Your Selectmen found it necessary to spend three days in court in an attempt to find the real worth of the land now used as your Town Dump. Inasmuch as the Courts decision was that the Town should pay \$1,000 for the land taken, this board has decided to appeal it.

There are other problems facing this board. Two that are most disturbing are the increase in deliquent taxes each year and the increase in unlicenced dogs. The remedies for these problems are not very popular but steps must be taken and the problems solved.

We again welcome all new residents of our Town and again urge you to participate in the affairs of the Town. We would like to point out that as citizens of Plaistow it is your privilege and duty to register, vote and to attend the School District and Town Meetings armed with this report.

Plaistow continues to progress thanks to the cooperation and efforts of all of its citizens.

### **REPORT OF LIBRARIAN FOR 1962**

Crowded conditions exist in our library, both as to the study area and storage for books. New wall shelves have been built, as well as shelves in the center of the room to take care of reference books. Every available space is being utilized.

New reference books have been added to our collection to meet the growing demands of students doing research. The New World Book Encyclopedia was purchased. Books have been purchased to meet the outside reading requirements of the various high schools. Lists of books were asked to be submitted by Sanborn Seminary, Haverhill High School, and St. James High School.

The library observed Book Week in November. Four classes in library instruction for the seventh and eighth grades of the Pollard School were conducted by your librarian, as well as one for the fourth grade. Your librarian was invited by the fifth grade of the Pollard School to attend a book display and talk upon "Books" given by Mrs. Rachel Sanborn, State Bookmobile representative, at the school. At the request of pupils, books upon display were loaned to the library. A Story Hour was held for The Sweet Hill Kindergarten.

Two hundred and twenty non-fiction books were borrowed from the State Library at Concord; and two thousand four hundred and twenty-five Adult and Children's books were loaned by the State Bookmobile during its five visits to our library.

Your librarian and assistant librarian attended a neighborhood meeting at the Bookmobile office in Exeter, when a panel discussion was held upon Library Techniques. I also attended a "Book Banquet" at the Exeter office, where five hundred books were on display for librarians to examine.

I am grateful to the teachers of the Pollard School for their cooperation in giving me advance notice of material needed for their pupils.

A thank you goes to friends and organizations who contributed books and magazines during the year.

Added library facilities are urgently needed to keep pace with the fast-growing community and especially the outside reading requirements of our many students at all age levels.

#### **REPORT OF ROAD AGENT FOR 1962**

This is my annual report as Road Agent. The summer maintenance consisted of patching and grading, cutting brush and trees, mowing along the sides of the roads, grading off shoulders and trucking fill off to lower land on shoulders. Considerable saving was made to the town by use of grader to mix patch.

We resurfaced Forest Street, Canterbury Forest, Danville Road, Garwood Hill, section of Old County Road, Walton Road, Old Road and part of the Westville Road.

Our TRA money (town road aid from the State) was used to rebuild part of the Greenough Road. This is a two year program to be completed in 1963.

The winter maintenance allotment was used for buying salt, plowing, sanding and salting the roads. Considerable saving was made to the town by the buying of bulk salt.

I again want to thank the people of Plaistow for the excellent cooperation given my department.

#### **REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH 1962**

In the past year it has been the duty of this board to report to the New Hampshire Board of Health the following number of contagious diseases so reported to this board as follows: Mumps, 176; Measles, 130; Chicken Pox, 85; Dog Bite, 9; Hepatitis, 2; Salommelia, 3; Total 405.

Despite the increase in the number of such cases so reported, there have been some cases in this town not so reported to this board. The Law states that every householder must report to the local Board of Health every case of a communicable disease within his household stating the disease, sex and age and the location of such a home for each such a case. Failure to do so can involve serious difficulties.

The State Department of Public Welfare have been notified of the birth of (11) Eleven premature babies who had to remain in the hospital until their weight became normal, 5 pounds, 4 ounces. Such notices were received by this Board from various hospitals where the babies were born. One such case a stillborn baby, all others were normal.

Two homes requesting home care for State Children were investigated and passed, one was not passed due to incomplete home facilities, and four others were renewed by the Welfare Department who in turn notified this Board of their decision requesting investigation if necessary. One such request was in turn investigated and the Welfare Board asked to decide the complaint.

Eleven (11) cases of nuisances against the Public Health were investigated and in every such case a letter was sent to the owner of such property requesting correction or abatement of such a nuisance within a fixed time limit. In some cases it was necessary to suggest a court action for such abatement before such a correction was instituted. Three (3) Polio Salk Vaccine Clinics were held in the Fred Rand Room a month apart beginning in April in which all shots were administered 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, if necessary, 368 such doses were administered.

This Board of Health wishes to thank both the registered nurses who helped conduct the clinic as well as others who acted as clerks.

The number of new homes being built has increased the work load of this Board since the law relative to sewerage systems demands that the Board investigate the layout of all sewerage systems, septic tank, distribution box, leeching field, before such a system is covered and if passed the coverage of such a system is investigated again before final coverage; or backfill. So it has been necessary for each new home that two examinations were necessary for each new home. Twenty-one (21) such new homes were examined and in some, changes either in location or increase in leeching field were requested and complied with by the operator laying out the sewerage system.

The Building Inspector has aided this Board in examining all the sewerage disposal plants and by his advice has caused some changes to be made in the layout of some of the plants, either a change in location of the septic tank or the extent of the leeching field or the condition of the ground in which the system was being installed.

The Board of Health of Plaistow will consider only written, signed complaints relative to nuisances, and each letter will be investigated and means to its abatement will be instituted to the best of our ability, if necessary, court action.

The firemen attended a fire training school at both Meadowbrook and the Pease Air Base this year.

During Fire Prevention Week in October the firemen put on a demonstration at the Pollard School. A fire prevention film was also presented through the courtesy of the District Fire Chief, Merton Webber.

4. To see if the District will vote to purchase land, to construct and equip an addition to the Pollard School, to authorize the School Board to execute any and all contracts or agreements necessary and proper or advisable in connection with the purchase of land and the construction and equipping of such an addition and authorize the school board to issue bonds or notes in an amount not to exceed One Hundred Forty Thousand Dollars (\$140,000.00) for the purpose of financing such purchase and construction.

5. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Eight Houndred Dollars (\$2,800.00) to meet the first interest payment on the notes or bonds authorized in Article 4.

6. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Two Hundred Twenty-four Dollars (\$3,224.00) to operate the addition to the Pollard School. 7. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Hundred Dollars (\$700.00) to provide student furniture for an additional classroom.

8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Plaistow:

I am presenting herewith my Seventh Annual Report as Superintendent of Schools in Plaistow. A report from the Principal will discuss more in detail the activities of the school. Statistical reports are listed separately.

## Personnel

Mr. Thomas Caron is the new Principal of the Pollard School. Mr. Caron was formerly principal of the Grinnel School and the Hood School in Derry, New Hampshire.

Mrs. Margaret Williams, a graduate of Keene Teachers College, was elected to teach grade four. Mrs. Williams taught in Pollard School last year to fill a vacancy which occurred during the school year. Mrs. Dorothy Wright, with teaching experience in Goffstown and Littleton, New Hampshire, is the new mathematics teacher in the Junior High section.

All teachers have continued membership in local, state and national professional organizations. Thirteen teachers have taken courses this past year to improve themselves professionally.

It is imperative that we continue to evaluate our salary schedule. As salaries continue to rise in our neighboring towns and cities Plaistow must be prepared to meet this competition or the education of our children will suffer. The majority of our teacher applicants come from Massachusetts and this fact, along with a continued shortage of well qualified teachers, makes it necessary to at least meet the Massachusetts minimum salary in order to maintain our present position.

#### Curriculum

The class in special education has continued to prove its worth. The class is housed in Atkinson this year. Plaistow has four pupils registered in the class.

This coming year we are proposing a remedial reading program to help those pupils who have not learned completely all of the basic skills. Classes of five or six pupils permits this learning, and then the pupils can progress normally at their grade level after working with the remedial reading teacher for a period of time. This work is supplementary to their regular reading groups.

We have departmentalized our fifth and sixth grades in the same manner in which our seventh and eighth grades are taught. We believe that the teachers who concentrate on teaching one basic subject can do better at this age level than teaching several subjects in a selfcontained class.

We have started a program of modern mathematics in grades one and two. The pupils in these classes will learn by discovering and understanding rather than by rote. The introduction of concepts of algebra and geometry are started at an early age - in simplified form of course. We expect to continue this program in grade three again next year and possibly in grade four.

In grade one we are using the Phono-Visual method of teaching phonics in conjunction with the reading program. This is based on pictorial charts arranged on a scientific phonetic foundation together with a definite plan for training in auditory and visual discrimination.

The school district continues to take advantage of funds provided by the Federal Government for special projects in mathematics and science.

We are now studying the possibility of using programmed texts in the junior high classes to help in the teaching of English grammar and its usage. Programmed texts use the same approach as a teaching machine but each pupil has a copy. Using a teaching machine, only one pupil can use it at a time. A programmed text would be supplementary to the regular program if it is adopted. The long range evaluation program started last year by the teachers continues in force. They are working in conjuction with all teachers in Union No. 55 under the direction of the Teacher Consultant and from this evaluation it is expected that specific recommendations will be forthcoming which should prove helpful in improving our schools.

#### Housing

We still continue to have two major problems confronting the School Study Group. Namely, what to do about the increased enrollments in the elementary grades and what to do about the high school students who may be cut off at Haverhill High School and Sanborn Seminary.

To handle the elementary problem the School Study Group and the School Board is proposing an eight room addition to the Pollard School. This addition will permit us to eliminate our basement rooms which are substandard and at the same time, take care of our elementary housing for a few years.

If it is at all possible, I believe that the people should include in the planned addition an all-purpose room large enough to handle the graduation exercises, school and town meetings, large group meetings, assemblies, concerts, etc. . A town of this size needs such a room. It would be much cheaper to build it now, and I'm sure that the room will be a very popular meeting place.

Another problem is the future housing of your high school students. At present your School Board and members of your School Study Group are looking into various possibilities. Sanborn Seminary has announced its willingness to turn over their buildings to a regional group for an unannounced price with certain restrictions. The Interim Commission Report recommends that Plaistow tuition its pupils to Salem. It also recommends that Kingston pupils go to Exeter and some of the other school districts now attending Sanborn go to an area high school in Raymond. I do not believe it will work out this way. If a regional group is formed to take over Sanborn there will have to be a building program. The present buildings are not sufficient to handle the proposed co-operative. There is also the possibility of some of the school districts involved forming their own cooperative school. It is difficult to make recommendations because there are not enough facts available to make an intelligent decision. Your study committee should pursue each possibility to the fullest. The New Hampshire State Department of Education is evaluating the Sanborn proposition and will come up with some recommendations. Some people believe it will be difficult to accept any plan until Haverhill actually cuts off tuition pupils. Then it may be too late. Citizens should follow all developments as closely as possible.

Your School Board has continued to support a good maintenance program. We take pride in the appearance of our school building.

# Support Quality Education

Your support of our educational program is solicited for the benefit of a better community and a better America.

#### Appreciations

Appreciation is expressed for the continued support of all local organizations and individuals. Helping at the School, honoring special groups, presenting scholarships, looking after the health of the school children and presenting worthwhile programs are very commendable, and I wish to express my personal thanks for all that you do for the children.

In conclusion, I wish to thank the School Board, Teacher Consultant, Principal, teachers and pupils for their cooperation in maintaining and raising the educational standards of the Pollard School.

#### **PRINCIPAL'S REPORT**

I herewith submit my first annual report to the Superintendent of Schools, School Board, and the Town of Plaistow.

School opened on September 5th with the following number of students enrolled:

Grade	1	-	82	Grade	5	-	60

This total of 516 represents an increase in the school population of 32 students over last year's total. These figures point out the drastic need of additional classroom space at Pollard School.

The Plaistow Parent Teachers Association meet on the first Thursday of each month. The theme for this year's meetings is "Opportunities for Our Children in Education Today." The monthly programs are geared to this theme and the number of parents attending attest to the skill and leadership of the officers in this organization.

In keeping with the spirit of the season, children exchanged gifts and sang carols. With the aid of funds from the P. T. A. a Christmas Party was given and each student received cookies, ice cream and a candy cane.

The Health Program under the direction of Mrs. Gwendolyn A. Banks, R. N., Nurse Teacher, continues to provide physical examinations for grades 1, 4 and 7. Her office hours are from 9 to 3 on Monday and Friday of each week at the Pollard School. It is becoming more apparent each year that the time allocated to Plaistow is not adequate to meet the demands.

If the school is to provide the complete health services that the town expects and demands, there is a need for additional personnel to provide these services. The vocal, band, and music program continues to be under the direction of Mr. Evan Williams. His Junior High Chorus presented a fine Christmas Program for the December meeting of the Parent-Teacher Association. Plans and preparation are being made to conduct a Spring Festival of music under his direction.

At Pollard School this year we departmentalized grades 5 and 6. It has been well received by students and teachers because the teachers are able to concentrate their teaching in the area in which they have specialized. Preliminary evaluation of this program indicates that it is a success. Further evaluating will be done before making this a permanent part of our regular program.

A guidance class has become a permanent part of our Eighth Grade program. The program covers vocational and educational guidance. The purpose of the class was to guide the students in selecting the proper high school course of study.

A complete testing program is carried on at Pollard School which includes:

- 1. Reading Readiness Test for Grade 1.
- 2. Otis Mental Ability Tests for Grades 2 4 6.
- Stanford Achievement Tests for Grades 3 through 8.
- 4. Individualized testing is done with students needing special attention.
- 5. Standard tests are administered to each group as they finish a reading book. This gives the teacher a clear picture of just how the class has learned the basic skills. It also provides an outline for review and re-teaching.

To augment our reading program in the skill area of Phonics, the Phono-Visual system has been added to our already fine phonics program at the First Grade level. The Town of Plaistow and the school children should be happy and considered very fortunate that the staff has very few replacements each year. This assures the school of having a consistent high level of teaching. The permanency of staff members allows for every student to achieve the greatest degree of success.

The evaluation program has continued into its second year. Some of the changes, to better education in Plaistow, have been departmentalizing grades 5 and 6, as mentioned before. Changes are being contemplated in the science program, a report card revision which will allow for better communicating between the school and the parents and a study of our mathematics and reading program is now being conducted.

The evaluation program has pointed up areas in which changes or additions are needed. One is the drastic need of additional classrooms which your Citizen's Survey Committee has worked on for almost two years. Along with classrooms, equally important and necessary, is an all purpose room. If we are to have a complete educational program, this room is a necessity.

Each year the number of students at Pollard School increases and the number of students with a variety of reading problems also augments. I believe that Pollard School has reached the point where the services of a full time Remedial Reading Teacher are necessary. This type of trained teacher will find trouble spots early and correct them before students have major reading problems.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the following for their help, patience, and understanding: the Superintendent, Teacher Consultant and the Staff, School Board, P. T. A., Civic Organizations and particularly the people of Plaistow.

## **REPORT OF SPECIAL EDUCATION TEACHER**

I hereby submit my third annual report as Special Class teacher. This year the Special Education class for Plaistow, Hampstead, Atkinson and Newton is located in the Atkinson Academy in a light, cheerful room which is an absolute necessity for the health and well-being of a group like ours.

Our district is one of only twenty-six school districts in the State with special programs for the mentally retared. Before this, the retarded had to struggle along in regular classes, either sitting doing nothing or under great stress and pressure trying to keep up with others.

The Special Class is not a class for the emotionally disturbed or the slow learner. Contrary to the impression of some parents, it is not a remedial class used to help children get up to their class level. Instead each child is helped to progress at his own speed. Ideally, a Special Class has no more than 12 pupils, but the State allows 15. We have at this time 14 pupils in our class comprised of Educable Children from 4 towns. We have 4 pupils from Plaistow, 2 from Hampstead, 4 from Atkinson and 4 from Newton. The September ages were  $6\frac{1}{2}$  to  $15\frac{1}{2}$  with a great range of abilities, making it necessary to have 5 reading groups and 5 arithmetic groups, ranging from pre-school to 5th grade level.

The highest group of students in a Special Class, according to State requirements, is expected to do 4th to 6th grade work by the age of 16. They are expected to progress only  $\frac{1}{2}$  rate of the average child.

With so many reading and arithmetic groups, much of our emphasis has to be on those subjects which are the basic foundations for living. With 3 small children in our group this year who do not have a foundation for study and who need so much individual help in order to get a firm foundation on which to build, the day has to be divided to give a fair proportion of teacher time to each pupil. Thought should be given to planning a second class for the younger pupils so that all pupils can advance as much as possible.

Much of our language work is cral so that all ages may participate, although capitalization, punctuation, sentence structure, and letter writing have been practiced by advanced pupils.

Our science program is based on the 5th grade TV program on Channel 11 on Nature and on the 4th grade text.

Through the kindness of Mr. Charles Yeaton, our principal, a TV set has been made available for our use for 3 programs we watch -- namely: 1. The Book Parade - a Reading Program for Kindergarten to Grade 4. 2. The 5th Grade Art Program every other week. 3. The Grade 5 Science Program weekly.

This year our class participated in the School's Christmas Program. The Special Class pupils sang with the 5th grade in the Angel Chorus and two of our boys were Wise Men and one a Shepherd in the Pageant. The class made 30 headbands for the entire Angel Chorus.

Our social studies program is for living in society the family and the community - as well as study about our own section of America. Our arts and crafts program is an essential part of our daily program - developing skills that will assist in future work. So far this year we have done regular crayon and paint work. We have made woven pot holders, popicle stick bird houses, leather belts, comb cases and change purses. We made Christmas corsages, foam ball tree ornaments, icicles from coffee can keys and metal strips. Very attractive bird ornaments were made from cones, foam balls, cardboard wings, sequin eyes and were decorated with gold and silver paint and glitter. We also made can cover ornaments. In the future we plan to do copper tooling, make earrings, do liquid embroidery, knitting and crocheting. You can see that our program emphasises reading, arithmetic and development of hand skills to prepare for future work.

Special classes are a step in the right direction but more is needed. We definitely need a Vocational Training School in this part of the State to help with job opportunities when the pupils leave the Special Class at the age of 16, and must prepare to earn a living. They need help to prepare for life as independent citizens.
