



## TOWN WARRANT

---

### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

---

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Plaistow in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Plaistow on Tuesday, the Tenth of March, next, at eight of the clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles:

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

Article 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to accept Trust Funds now held by the Cemetery Trustees.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow in anticipation of taxes.

Article 5. Shall the provision of Chapter 171-A of the revised Laws relative to playing games of Beano be adopted in this Town.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 to repair sidewalks.

Recommended by the Budget Committee

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell tax deeded property at public auction.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$3,000.00 to be set aside as a Capital Reserve Fund for the future purchase of a fire truck.

Recommended by the Budget Committee

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$450.00 for chairs in upper hall, and the sum of \$150.00 for lighting in the Library.

Recommended by the Budget Committee

Article 10. To raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the continuance of the sidewalk program - namely - to extend from Evans Avenue on the Westerly side of Main Street traveling South to Forest Street.

Without Recommendation of Budget Committee.

(By Petition)

Article 11. To see if the Town Will vote to abolish the provisions of the Municipal Budget Law.

(By Petition)

Article 12. To see if the Town of Plaistow will adopt the following Ordinance.

Section 1. Night Parking to interfere with snow removal operations prohibited.

It shall be unlawful for any person having custody or control of any vehicle to park or cause the same to be parked during the months from November 1 to May 1, between the hours of 12:00 midnight and 7.00 A. M. on any public street or highway in the Town of Plaistow so that said vehicle interferes with snow plowing or snow removal operations.

Section 2. Penalty. Whoever violates the provisions of this ordinance, upon conviction shall be fined not more than ten dollars for each offense.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following amendment to the Zoning Ordinances of the Town of Plaistow, as adopted on March 14, 1956, and as amended on March 20, 1962:

To reclassify Route 108, commonly known as Newton Road, from the Haverhill, Massachusetts line to the Newton, New Hampshire line, as a residential district, instead of a commercial district.

(By Petition)

Article 14. 2. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning Ordinances of the Town of Plaistow as amended by adding to Article IX the following new section.

7. Penalty. Any person, firm or corporation violating any of the Provisions of this ordinance shall be fined not more than Ten Dollars (\$10.00), upon conviction, for each day such violation may exist.

3. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following ordinance.

PENALTY: Violation of Subdivision Regulations.

Whoever, being the owner or agent of the owner of any land located within a subdivision or proposed subdivision, transfers or sells or agrees to sell or negotiates to sell any land by reference to, or exhibition of, or by other use of, a plat of a subdivision, before such plat has been approved by the Planning Board and filed or recorded in the office of the Register of Deeds of the County, shall forfeit and pay a penalty of One Hundred Dollars for each such lot or parcel so transferred or sold or agreed or negotiated to be sold. The imposition of such penalty shall not in any way operate to deprive the Planning Board of any of its rights, duties or prerogatives or excuse the violator or any other from the duties imposed on them by said Subdivision regulations or any order or direction of the Planning Board in connection therewith.

1. To see if the Town will adopt the following ordinances.

Amend Article IX of the Zoning Ordinances of the Town of Plaistow by renumbering section 5 as section 6 and adding the following new section.

5. The building inspector shall not issue a building permit for any building on any subdivision until the said subdivision has been approved by the Planning Board of the Town, with adequate security for the construction of streets and utilities to the minimum standards required by

the Planning Board, nor to issue a building permit for the construction of any building on any extension of any existing road or street until the said extension shall have been brought up to said minimum standards of the Planning Board to the satisfaction of said Board or satisfactory security therefor has been posted with said Board.

Article 15. To raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to buy land to expand the cemetery and improve said land.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$500.00 for the Industrial Commission.

(Without Recommendation of Budget Committee)

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,100.00 to replace gutters on Town Hall Southwest and Southeast side.

(Recommended by Budget Committee)

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$816.00 to pay salaries and expenses of the Plaistow District Court from July 1, 1964 to December 31, 1964.

(Recommended by Budget Committee)

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to accept as submitted the reports of Agents, Auditors and other Officers and Committees heretofore appointed.

## REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN

---

Your Town closed the year of 1963 with an unexpended balance of \$4,529.67 against the 1963 appropriations. The total surplus was \$37,793.02, an increase of \$8,710.01.

In the year 1963 the selectmen used \$4,500.00 of this surplus to keep the tax rate from increasing to a higher rate than the \$56.00 approved by the Tax Commission. There has been no change in the valuation ratio.

The total valuation of Plaistow is now \$5,883,001.00 an increase of \$145,350.00 over last years valuation.

Veteran's exemptions are now at \$334,150.00 an increase over last year of \$22,300.00.

This year again has been one of improvement. Greenough Road was completed and the Town Dump received commendation from the State.

The Selectmen have attended State Meetings so that information in regards changes in regulations were brought back to aid in administration of town business.

We have had the cooperation of all State Agencies. A betterment program was enlarged and improvements were made, and we are sure that they were noticed, North Main St. resurfacing and removing dangerous condition at Jesse George Road and North Main St.

A drainage condition was corrected on East Road by the State and one at the intersection of East Road and Sunrise Terrace will be corrected in the near future. This will save Town Funds.

Because of a shortage of land at the cemetery it would be advisable to purchase additional land for development.

Rose Avenue which has always been a dead end has been opened for winter maintenance. This fascillitates plowing and saves time and money. This cost the town practically no money.

Two bridges were fitted with iron guard rails.

This year the town was plagued by high dog damages. The extent of this damage was close to \$500, making it impossible for the town to satisfy these claims.

The Town is having its tax bills and accounting machine work done by a new firm and the results have been very satisfactory.

Your Selectmen have enjoyed the co-operation of all the people and all departments in town have co-operated. We have not solved all problems as yet but with continued help from all we know that we will be successful.

We again welcome all new residents of our Town and again urge you to participate in the affairs of the Town. We welcome constructive criticism and hope that you will make it a point to register and vote at the Town and School District Meetings.

We feel that Plaistow is continuing its progress due to continued cooperation from its citizens and the various Town Committees.

## REPORT OF LIBRARIAN FOR 1963

---

A Friends of the Library was organized September 24 at a meeting held in the library. The purpose of the Friends group is to assist the Trustees and Librarian in extending services where the library does not have time to do. A very enthusiastic group met in December and appointed special committees to carry on the work during the coming year. A membership drive for charter members was conducted in December by a hard-working committee. One hundred and twenty-seven charter members, ten contributing, and one memorial gift were the results of the drive. The Librarian and Trustees were saddened in December by the death of the Assistant Librarian, Virginia Robinson. Her radiant personality won her many friends. She will be greatly missed.

This is my annual report as Road Agent. The summer maintenance consisted of installing culverts on Smith Corner Road, installing catch basins and culverts on Old Westville Road and a catch basin on Wentworth Avenue.

Steel guard rails were put up on Crane Crossing Road and Danville Road. Wooden guard rails were installed on other roads. I also installed new street signs on some streets. Walton Road was leveled off. Several roads were widened. Five hundred more feet of road were built in Cifre Lane. Rose Avenue was also continued through.

The following roads were tarred: Canterbury Forest, the east side of Old County Road, Hale Spring Road, Rolling Hill Avenue, Maple Avenue, Witch Lane, Davis Park, Whiton Place, Chadwick Road, Evans Avenue, Rose Avenue, East Pine Street and part of the Old Danville Road.

A lot of repairs on washouts had to be made and considerable patching of roads.

The TRA money (town road aid from the State) was used to finish the Geenough Road.

The winter maintenance was used for salting, sanding, plowing and labor. We had a lot of icy weather and an unusually bad month of December.

I wish to extend my thanks to the people of Plaistow for the excellent cooperation given my department.

## REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH 1963

---

I hereby submit my report for the Board of Health for the year 1963.

It has been the duty of the Health Officer to report to the State Department of Health the following cases of contagious diseases.

- 43 Cases of Chicken Pox
- 1 Case of Mumps
- 14 Cases of Scarlet Fever
- 9 Cases of Measles
- 13 Cases of Dog Bite
- 1 Case of Infectious Hepatitis
- 2 Cases of Infectious Salmonellosis
- 3 Cases of German Measles
- 3 Premature Births

It is the duty of each householder to report to the Board of Health each case of any contagious disease found in a home.

It has been the duty of the Board of Health to condemn two dwellings on Danville Road as unfit for human habitation due to the unsanitary conditions which were contra to the State as well as Town sanitary regulations.

Three Sabin Oral Vaccine Clinics were held at the Town Hall in February, March and June when all types of that vaccine were administered and all clinics were well attended; all Selectmen were in attendance.

All new septic tank installations with leeching fields were examined both before coverage and after same were covered at the following places within the Town , Newton Road, Sunrise Terrace, Route 125, Sunrise Terrace, Main Street, Pollard Road, Old County Road, Kelly Road, Main Street, Chandler Avenue, Canterbury Avenue, Main Street, West Pine Street, Kingston Road, Wildwood Park, Sweet Hill Avenue, Pollard Road, Kingston Road, Forest Street, Rolling Hill Avenue, 2, Route 125 and Canterbury Avenue, 25 such Installations.

Examined a complaint with all Selectmen, relative to a written complaint that an abandoned well was being used as a cesspool for a washing machine. No evidence of any such usage was found.

A contaminated well was inspected on Rutledge Avenue and was found to be due to surface water contamination, condition corrected.

Homes for the care of Welfare children were inspected and six such homes were licensed for the care of such children.

Complaint of water overlying ground at corner of Woodland Park and North Avenue was received and a letter sent relative to control of same.

Complaint relative to unsanitary disposal of sewerage water was received and inspected by Selectmen and correction imposed on Pollard Road.

Complaint received relative to unsanitary disposal of water at Hoyt Plaza from Laundromat, inspected and letter written to occupant and a new system of decontamination has been installed and will be under state inspection for at least six months. A new leeching field has been installed.

A permit was granted for the removal of a body from Holy Angels Cemetery for removal to Maine.

A complaint relative to a contaminated well was received from South Main and Maple Avenue. Inspected and consultation with State Sanitary Inspector held. Contamination was due to leakage of motor oil and gasoline into well thru imperfect cover. To be corrected or new well to be driven.

Inspected New Beauty Parlor at Hoyt Plaza.  
Inspected New Barber Shop at Hoyt Plaza.  
License granted to both.

**January 1, 1963 to December 31, 1963**

I submit the following annual report of the Plaistow Fire Department.

There was a total of seventy-eight alarms. Of this number eight were for buildings; five were automobiles; five were oil burners and oil stoves; forty-six were grass and woods fires; two chimney fires; four were false alarms; three calls for the resuscitator; one for a lost child; and four were calls for assistance out-of-town.

The estimated fire loss was seventy-six thousand dollars.

The most disastrous fire was that of the Foss Manufacturing Co. on East Pine Street. Additional help for this fire was called from Haverhill, Massachusetts, Newton, and Atkinson.

Ten new members were added to the department this year. We now have thirty-nine members including the five engineers.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the citizens of Plaistow for their fine cooperation during the extreme dry spell during October. We did not have one serious fire during that period. We had a twenty-four hour patrol at that time and very few violations were reported.

**SCHOOL WARRANT****STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE**

---

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Plaistow qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the seventh day of March, 1964, at twelve o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary School District Officers for the ensuing year.

2. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors and Committees or Officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

3. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this Warrant.

4. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the School Board to certify to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

5. To see if the district will authorize the School Board to make application for and to receive, in the name of the district, such advances, grants-in-aid or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from Federal, State, local or private agencies.

6. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) to increase the salary of the School District Treasurer.

7. To see if the district will elect to approve of the inclusion of its officers and employees (other than those eligible under the Teachers Retirement System) in the Employees' Retirement System of the State of New Hampshire, which system is provided for by Chapter 27-A of the Revised Laws, as inserted by Chapter 183 of the Laws of 1945, and as provided by Chapter 201 of the Laws of 1945 and any subsequent amendments thereto.

8. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Hundred Thirty Dollars (\$430.00) for the purpose of providing funds for the district's contribution to said retirement system for the coming school year.

9. To see if the district will vote to conduct the annual election of school district officials at the same time and at the same place as the election of town officials.

10. To transact any further business that may legally come before the meeting.

## **ANNUAL REPORT OF THE PLAISTOW SCHOOL BOARD**

---

At the last annual meeting of the Plaistow School District, we were authorized to proceed with the construction of an eight room addition to Pollard School. The construction of the building is almost completed and we hope to have it in use following the February vacation period. The Board feels that we have a well constructed building with several added features for a cost well within the allotted Bond Issue.

In addition to our interest in the new facilities, your School Board feels that it is in the best interest of all to maintain our present facilities at a high level. Consequently, we have inaugurated several projects during the year in accordance with a continuous program of building upkeep.

Our primary purpose is the education of our children. We believe that our educational program and achievement compares favorably with other school systems in our area and with the national averages. We believe, also, that it is our responsibility to constantly evaluate our educational program and achievements in order to discern areas where improvements can be made. We have attempted to fulfill this responsibility and to make needed improvements where possible.

The status of our High School situation and the future possibilities for our students in secondary education is a vital concern of us all. During the year, we have received the recommendations of the Engelhardt Survey and are presently awaiting the recommendations of the Co-operative School Planning Board. We feel that any action regarding our High School Educational Program cannot be taken prematurely until all the best possibilities have been thoroughly studied.

We have tried to administer our School Program in the best interests of our children and our community and in so doing, we have appreciated the opportunity of serving you in this capacity.

## REPORT OF THE SUPERVISORY UNION NO. 55 BOARD

---

New Hampshire School Districts are grouped by state statutes into some 47 Supervisory Unions, ten of which are single or "city" unions. As the name implies, these unions enable the individual Districts to enjoy as a group, supervisory advantages and functions, which they would find difficult or impossible to enjoy as individual Districts.

Our Union, No. 55, is comprised of the towns of Salem, Plaistow, Hampstead, Atkinson and Newton, with present estimated populations of 16,000, 3,200, 1,600, 1,500, and 1,600 respectively. Union No. 55 has an annual growth rate of approximately 15 per cent and is in the fastest growing area of the state. It is seventh from the top of the 47 unions in the number of teachers employed. (Five cities and one Union have more teachers.) It is fifth out of 47 in the number of pupils enrolled. (Four cities in the state enroll more students than we do.) It is eighth out of 47, in the size of the tax base. (Seven cities have greater real estate valuation than does Union No. 55.)

During the past three years, the growth has been phenomenal in all five towns. The enrollment during this time in Salem has increased over 800 students in grades 1-12, in Plaistow over 60 in grades 1-8, in Hampstead over 80 in grades 1-8, in Atkinson over 80 in grades 1-8 and in Newton over 40 in grades 1-8. The PHAN towns (Plaistow, Hampstead, Atkinson and Newton), all of whom tuition their high school students outside their districts, now have 64, 23, 19 and 38 new high school students respectively, for a total 3-year increase of 144 new students. "In-district" students in the Union have increased 36 per cent, and "out-of-district tuition students have increased 42 per cent, during the three year period from September 1960 to September 1963.

Our Supervisory Union No. 55 Board is comprised of the three School Board Members from each of the member districts. The normal business which comes before this

Board consists of establishing and approving the administrative and salary budgets for the Union office and staff. This business is done in the fall of each year, before the individual district budgets are established. The PHAN towns share several educational services, such as Nurse-teacher, Special Education Class, and Music Supervision. These services, and related teaching aids and equipment are also budgeted by the PHAN portion of the Union Board. Each line item in these budgets is debated, and either approved or disapproved by a vote of the Union Board. In budget matters, each Union Board member has one vote. The school board members from your town are your representatives in all Supervisory Union Board business.

Each spring, usually in April, the Union Board holds another regular meeting. At this meeting Union Administrative personnel are elected for the following fiscal year, and their salaries are established.

At the regular board meeting in April 1963, it had become evident to most Board members that something must be done to relieve administrative congestion in the office. As a result, a meeting was held in October of the Board Chairmen from each of the individual districts, the Supervisory Union Board Chairman and the heads of the administrative staff. The key subjects discussed at the meeting by the Chairmen were:

1. Change in Administrative Staff functions.
2. Feasability of machine accounting, for at least Vendor and payroll accounting.
3. Inadequacy of present office housing.

As a result of this meeting, a Job analysis was initiated of all administrative functions, present and proposed.

On November 6th, and again on November 12th, the full Union Board met to budget for the 64-65 school year. Before the meeting temporarily adjourned on the 12th, the Union Board directed the Chairman to appoint a study committee of three Board members to investigate feasibility of:

1. Realignment of administrative staff functions.
2. Acquisition of some basic machine accounting equipment.

Mr. Perri, of Atkinson, Mr. Schmidlin of Salem and Mr. Swasey of Newton were appointed to serve on the study committee. The Board directed that they report back to the full Board in January 1964.

At the November 12th meeting, the Board authorized acquisition of larger administrative quarters. As a result some 2,200 sq. ft. of new space will be available for occupancy on July 1st, 1964. This doubles the office space with a rental increase from \$150 per month to \$265 per month.

On November 25th, the PHAN portion of the Union Board met for a third budget session, involving those items relating to the four PHAN districts.

In January, the study committee reported. Their report was excellent, and well presented by their chairman, Mr. Perri. Their unanimous recommendations were as follows:

1. Installation of a basic IBM system, to alleviate the severe load in the areas of statistics and financial accounting.
2. Establishment of a position of Assistant Superintendent of Operations, and to budget \$8,500 for this position. A request to the State Board of Education for approval, should establish state support, to the extent of \$2,500 of the \$8,500, leaving a net cost to the Union of \$6,000.
3. Request a change in title of Teacher Consultant to that of Assistant Superintendent of Instruction.
4. Appoint a committee of the five individual district chairmen, to meet on call of the Superintendent to interview and select not more than three candidates for the position of Assistant Superintendent of Operations. The candidates selected by the screening committee shall be interviewed and one of them elected, by the full Board, at a date to be set later.

5. Appoint a committee to report recommendations at the regular April meeting on a proposed salary schedule, sickleave allowances, absence provisions and any other fringe benefits for Supervisory Union Administrative and office personnel.

These recommendations were adopted by the Union Board except the title change of Teacher Consultant to Assistant Superintendent of Instruction was tabled. The Board stressed that the Teacher Consultant position shall hold the same level of responsibility as that of the new position of Assistant Superintendent of Operations, and further, that it is their intent that this recommendation should be taken from the table at a future meeting upon the recommendation of the Superintendent of Schools. The Union Board Chairman was instructed to appoint a salary study committee. The appointments made by the chairman were: John Wood of Plaistow, Chairman, William Letoile of Hampstead and Mrs. Lucile deBesche of Atkinson.

It is hoped that through the reading of this report, each citizen of all Districts in Union No. 55 will obtain a better understanding of the New Hampshire Schools' supervisional structure, and in particular, the underlying reasons which have necessitated the budgeting action taken during the 20 to 30 hours of effort expended by your Union No. 55 Board. The gains we are striving for, by our actions, can only result in greater efficiency, more service, a better informed public, and the resulting better education for all of our children.

## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

---

To the School Board and Citizens of Plaistow:

I am presenting herewith my Eighth Annual Report as Superintendent of Schools in Plaistow. A report from the Principal will discuss more in detail the activities of the school. Statistical reports are listed separately.

### Personnel

Seven new teachers have been added to the Pollard School staff for this year:

Dorothy Bragen, grade 2, a graduate of Boston University.

Louise Orlando, grade 2, a graduate of Merrimack College with teaching experience in Lawrence, Mass.

Beverly Reney, grade 2, a graduate of the University of New Hampshire with teaching experience in Middletown, Conn.

Mrs. Louise French, grade 3, a graduate of Western Kentucky State College with teaching experience in Kentucky and Vermont.

Mrs. Carol Svenson, grade 4, a graduate of Earlham College with teaching experience in Salem, N. H. and Wheeling, Illinois.

Mrs. Gail Shinberg, grade 6, a graduate of Tufts University.

Sylvia Kuzminski, grades 7 and 8, a graduate of Merrimack College.

All teachers have continued membership in local, state and national professional organizations.

It is true that teachers' salaries have increased during the past few years in Plaistow. We have also had to add additional teachers because of increased enrollments. However, it is also true that teachers' salaries as well as salaries in all lines of work have increased noticeably in all communities. We must accept the fact that until conditions change they will continue to increase.

There is still a shortage of good qualified teachers and we have to compete for these teachers. Unless we are prepared to meet this competition our education will not measure up to the standards we wish for our children.

Plaistow has adopted a policy of smaller class sizes and the achievement of your children shows the merit of this decision. However, if you failed to provide adequate funds for a good salary schedule in order to attract good teachers, hold good teachers and reward your older teachers, then you have adopted a program of false economy.

### **Curriculum**

Our curriculum has lacked remedial reading. We feel that certain children need more individual and supplementary help in reading to make certain they acquire all the basic skills. The proposed teacher will help in this area.

We will continue to expand our program in Modern Math which has been very worthwhile. As funds allow, the program will be offered in all elementary grades.

For the first time we have initiated a program to help pupils with speech problems. The speech therapy was supported this year through public donations. It is recommended that the School District absorb this expense.

I believe Union No. 55 can be proud of the work it does for those who are handicapped. Each child has the opportunity to receive a better education. It is very commendable.

We still do not provide a full curriculum for the 7th and 8th graders especially in the areas of home economics and industrial arts. Perhaps this will be corrected when a probable cooperative is authorized.

The School District continues to take advantage of funds provided by the Federal Government under the National Defense Education Act for special projects in mathematics, science and modern languages.

## Housing

Our addition has been completed and the classes are out of the basement. We will be able to handle the increased elementary enrollment for the immediate future.

It is well known that a Planning Committee of twenty-four individuals from eight towns including three members from Plaistow have been working for several months on a cooperative school study. They have made an exhaustive study of various plans to solve the secondary school problem. The Engelhardt report is also available.

My only recommendation at this time is that Plaistow should join a cooperative school district, grades 1-12. Haverhill will eventually cut off tuition pupils and Sanborn Seminary will not be able to take all pupils who are eligible. You must protect the education of your secondary students. What vote you take on the type of cooperative or with whom should reflect what is best for Plaistow.

Credit should be given to our custodians for the work that they do to keep our building well maintained.

## Support Quality Education

What is quality education?

When we speak of quality education we mean **qualified teachers** in uncrowded classrooms, with the books, supplies and equipment they need to do a good job.

We mean **supervisory and special help** for teachers in these days of changing and expanding knowledge, so that they will continue to grow in their teaching skills and keep up-to-date in their knowledge of subject matter.

We mean a **curriculum** which is constantly being improved.

We mean **guidance services** that help parents and children to find what is suited to the child's needs and abilities, so that he may progress toward a useful, satisfying life.

We mean **administrators** who are competent and up to date in their knowledge and who are leaders.

We mean **maintenance** which assures cleanliness and safety which protects your investment.

We mean **informed citizens** who understand the importance of good education to their children, their community and their country.

### **Warning to Parents**

Do you know that school drop outs have twice as high a rate of unemployment as high school graduates?

Do you know that early marriage seems to be related to the high drop out rate for women?

Do you know that frequent absences and truancies lead to early drop outs?

Encourage your child to stay in high school and keep regular attendance.

### **Appreciations**

Appreciation is expressed for the continued support of all local organizations and individuals. Helping at the school, honoring special groups, presenting scholarships, looking after the health of the school children and presenting worthwhile programs are very commendable and I wish to express my personal thanks for all that you do for the children.

In conclusion, I wish to thank the School Board, Principal, teachers and pupils for their cooperation in maintaining and raising the educational standards of the Pollard School.

## PRINCIPAL'S ANNUAL REPORT

---

I hereby submit my second annual report to the Superintendent of Schools, School Board, and the Town of Plaistow.

School opened on September 4th, and the following number of students enrolled:

Grade 1 - 77	Grade 5 - 67
Grade 2 - 84	Grade 6 - 59
Grade 3 - 67	Grade 7 - 56
Grade 4 - 63	Grade 8 - 56

(Total 529)

This represents an increase of 13 students over last year's enrollment. The Rainbow Room has become a temporary classroom. The overcrowded conditions will be relieved when our present eight room addition is completed.

The Health Program under the direction of Mrs. Gwendolyn A. Banks, R. N., Nurse-Teacher, continues to provide physical examinations for Grades 1, 4, and 7. Her office hours are from 9 to 3 on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday. Because of the number of students now at Pollard School, it becomes more apparent that this school needs the services of a full time nurse.

Mr. Evan Williams again directed the entire music program at Pollard School. His School Band and Junior High chorus presented a Christmas music program at the Town Hall for the students of Pollard School and their parents. As is the case in many speciality areas, it has become apparent that our Music Department is in need of additional help if we are to present a complete, well organized, music program.

A two year evaluation program of the physical needs has been completed and compiled. Most of the recommendations made in this report will have been carried out with our new building addition. Curriculum evaluation is continuing in the following areas: Science, Arithmetic, Social Studies, and Reading. Final recommendations are anticipated in these areas before the end of the present school year.

The following additions were made in the curriculum at Pollard School: Mental Abilities Test, administered to Grade 1, the Phono-Visual system which was added to our fine phonics program for Grade 1 last year has been extended to Grade 2.

As was stated in the report last year, the need for a Remedial Reading teacher at Pollard School has become a necessity.

In the modern school, extra curricular activities form an important part of the total growth of the children. This year there was organized a Junior High Touch football league, with the winning team receiving football decals. There was also formed a boys and girls bowling league. This was formed to teach the children a physical activity that they will be able to use when they complete school.

The Plaistow Parent Teachers' Association meet on the first Thursday of each month. The theme for this year's meetings is, "We Can Replace the Woodshed." The meetings were panel discussions with parents and teachers participating. The Association should be commended for its excellent work, which can be judged by the fine attendance at each meeting.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the following for their help, patience, and understanding: the Superintendent, Teacher Consultant and Union Staff, School Board, Pollard School Staff, P. T. A., Civic Organizations and particularly the people of Plaistow.

## REPORT OF SPECIAL EDUCATION CLASS

---

To the Superintendent of Schools and the School Boards of Plaistow, Hampstead, Atkinson and Newton:

I hereby submit my fourth annual report as teacher of the PHAN Special Class.

The Special Class is located for the second year in Atkinson Academy where we have a light, well ventilated room conducive to good physical health.

At present there are 13 pupils in the class whose September ages ranged from 7 to 15. There are 6 girls and 7 boys in the class with 2 girls and 3 boys in the 7 to 11 age group and 4 girls and 4 boys in the 12 to 15 age range. We have 2 pupils from Plaistow, 1 from Hampstead, 5 from Atkinson, and 5 from Newton. This year the pupils from Plaistow, Hampstead and Newton are transported directly from their homes to the Academy and returned to their homes, which is a more satisfactory arrangement than being left at the various schools.

This year's class presents a vast difference in mental development and ability as well as age, making it necessary to have 6 reading groups and 5 arithmetic groups so less time can be devoted to social studies and science than previous years. In these areas our emphasis is on preparation for daily living.

Handwriting lessons are held almost every day to develop this necessary communication skill and to help those with poor motor control.

We do not have an opportunity to take advantage of educational television programs this year because of conflict in program with the available television set. We hope to have a set of our own next year to again use this medium of modern education which is so beneficial to the retarded, who often grasp more by seeing and hearing at the same time.

Our health lessons of necessity emphasize personal hygiene and the care of our bodies.

Mr. Williams, our music supervisor, spends one-half hour with us every other week and two of our older girls are members of the seventh and eighth grade chorus.

Each day we spend time on our arts and crafts program, developing skills which may contribute to the ability to earn a living. New craft projects this year have been the use of plaster of paris in the making of plaques which are painted and presented as gifts to the parents. Oval and round baskets were made of natural reed. We made styrofoam of our own and molded star, bell and ball shapes which were decorated with glitter and sequins for our Christmas tree and later to adorn the trees at home.

It is the task of the special class teacher to build confidence in the pupils - - some of whom have spent several years in regular classes and known nothing but failure. Work has to be simple enough at first to give confidence in ability and then work to develop the individual as far as possible at his own pace. The special class is not a remedial class; it is not designed to force growth in academic skills, but to enable the retarded child to get enough out of the usual academic skills to lead a happy and effective life. A child has to learn his own limitations and assets in order to avoid continual frustration. He needs the opportunity to grow in emotional areas besides developing academic and motor skills and vocational training.

The special class teacher, with the help of test results, diagnoses the need of each child and deals with the individual accordingly.

Special class teachers in New Hampshire are required to complete a minimum of 12 units of study beyond a Bachelor's Degree dealing specifically with the mentally retarded and the work of the special class teacher. The courses I took this summer gave me an opportunity to meet other special class teachers and discuss our mutual problems. Our special class, in spite of the vast age range, compares very favorably with the others in the state.

I hope to develop a more extensive manual training and home economics program, especially for the older pupils, when facilities are available.

I wish to express my sincere appreciation to the entire staff of Atkinson Academy for their splendid cooperation and understanding these two years in Atkinson and many thanks to the Union staff for their continued guidance and support.
