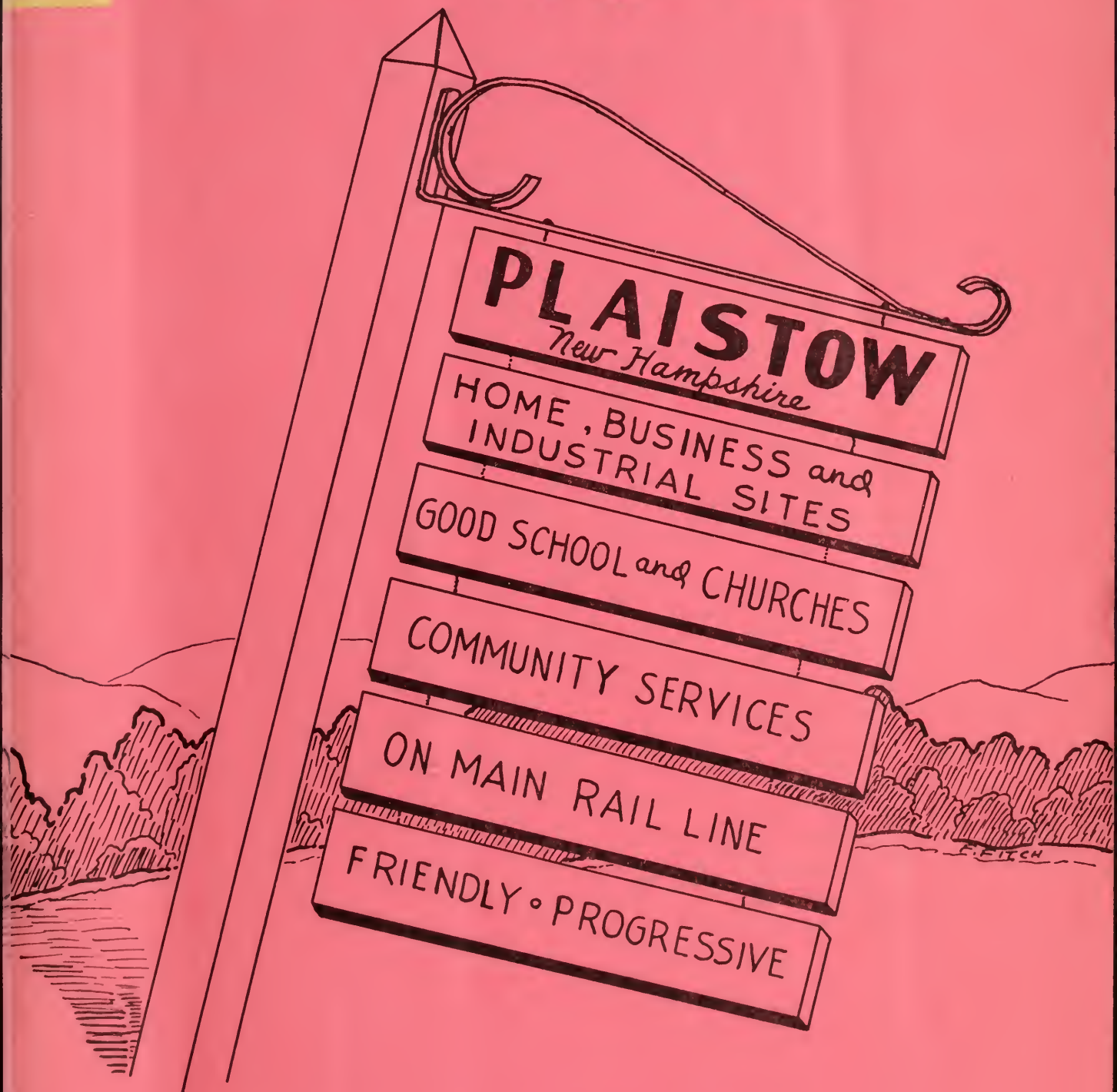

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Plaistow in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Plaistow on Tuesday, the ninth of March, next, at eight of the clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles:

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

Article 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to accept Trust Funds now held by the Cemetery Trustees.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow in anticipation of taxes.

Article 5. Shall the provision of Chapter 171-A of the revised laws relative to playing games of Beano be adopted in this Town.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 to repair sidewalks. (Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell tax dedeed property at public auction.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$3,000.00 to be set aside as a Capital Reserve Fund for the future purchase of a fire truck. (Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000. for an addition to the Fire House. (Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000. to buy land to expand the cemetery and improve said land. (Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,300. to replace gutters on the Town Hall, North and West side. (Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000. for painting the Town Hall. (Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000. to purchase Hale Spring land. (Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500. to reconstruct the road to Hale Spring. (Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Zoning Board of Adjustment for the Town of Plaistow to engage counsel for the purpose of answering, defending and doing all things necessary for the interest of the Board of Adjustment in connection with the certain appeal filed by the Selectmen of Plaistow from the findings and ruling made by the Board of Adjustment in the matter of a variance sought by one John Senter, and to appropriate \$200. to cover such expenses as may be thereby incurred. (By Petition) (Without recommendation of the Budget Committee)

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the construction of a Public Library building upon a portion of land owned by the Town of Plaistow, such building site to be located Westerly of Pollard Avenue, so-called and Northly of Elm Street, so-called, in said Plaistow; the construction of said Library building to be under the auspices of the Friends of the Plaistow Library, a non-profit organization. (By Petition)

Article 17. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to convey to the Timberlane School District the following described land, the land now used for a Dump on Greenough Road, acquired by the Town by eminent domain, and to set a price therefor; and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to use the proceeds thereof to acquire a new location for the Town Dump.

Article 18. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell land on Mt. Misery which was reserved for school purposes by a vote at the 1963 Town Meeting.

Article 19. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell an old Fire Truck no longer used by the Fire Department.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to accept as submitted the reports of Agents, Auditors and other officers and Committees heretofore appointed.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN

Your Town closed the year of 1964 with an unexpended balance of \$4,497.14 against the 1964 appropriations. The total surplus was \$34,784.49 a decrease of \$3,008.53.

In the year 1964, the Selectmen used \$8,500.00 of this surplus to keep the tax rate from increasing to a higher rate than the \$56.00 approved by the Tax Commission. There has been no changes in the valuation ratio.

The total Valuation of Plaistow increased by \$398,743.00. This was reported as \$458,830.00 increase but had to be reduced \$60,087.00 due to duplicate cards. Total valuation is \$6,281,744.00.

Veteran's exemptions are now \$339,050.00 an increase of \$4,900.00 over last year's exemptions.

This year a portion of Pollard Road was improved and the water hole on this road was made larger. A drainage problem at East Road, Sunrise Terrace, and Sweet Hill Road was corrected and arrangements were made to take care of a problem on the Kingston Road. The State did this work and will also correct the drainage problem on Kingston Road. Kelley Road bridge was repaired by the Town.

A survey was made by Clinton Goodwin in regards to purchase of cemetery land also plans for a layout of the cemetery was drawn up by Mr. Goodwin. We hope to procure the land in 1965.

The State cut down a large elm at the corner of Wentworth Ave. and Route 125 at the Town's request.

Our Town Counsel has brought about the correction of an unsafe condition on Sweet Hill Road. Removal of a building and filling of the foundation. We also are having Town Counsel take action in the illegal placing of trailers on land in Town.

The value of ordinances passed in the last two years can be seen in viewing the gravel pits in the area.

The Town Road Aid money was not used this year as the project on Crane's Crossing Road, widening and replacing bridge, will take two year's funds. This was engineered by the State Highway Department.

The Town also had the co-operation of the State Police, National Guard, Sheriff's Office and all Town Departments, plus the various organizations in the Town on the two nights that the Town was anticipating a "Rumble". There were no incidents reported these two nights.

We are faced with a problem of finding a new location for the dump. This land is desired by the Timberlane Regional School District for building a new school. We would welcome suggestions and offers for a new location.

Dogs continue to be a problem. Some dogs have not been licensed and are being allowed to run freely. They are a problem at the school and are causing damage to poultry and rabbits.

We regret that we have had to accept the resignation of Charles Goodwin as Welfare Agent. Mr. Goodwin has done a very fine job for a number of years and we will miss him.

Your Selectmen have enjoyed the co-operation of all the people and departments in town. We have not solved all problems as yet but with continued help from all, we know that we will be successful.

We again welcome all new residents of our Town and urge you to participate in the affairs of the Town. We welcome constructive criticism and hope that you will make it a point to register and vote at the Town and School District meetings. Our office is open every other Monday from 7:30 P. M. to usually mid-nite. Come in and make suggestions.

We feel that Plaistow is continuing its progress due to the co-operation of its citizens and that of the various Town Committees elected and appointed.

REPORT OF LIBRARIAN FOR 1964

Mrs. Herrick, your Assistant Librarian, and I attended a Library Technique Course for three weeks in July at the University of New Hampshire.

Major improvements consist of three new lights and of the lightening of walls and shelves with a coat of green paint applied by Mr. Dick, former Custodian.

Three hundred and fifteen Adult Non-Fiction books were loaned by the State Library at Concord and one thousand six hundred and seventy-six Adult and Children's books were delivered by the Bookmobile in its four visits.

I deeply appreciate the books and magazines donated by friends and organizations, and for the continued co-operation given me by the Principal and the teachers of the Pollard School. More and more the school children

are making use of the reference material in the Library. A party in May was given by the library for the Second Grade Reading Club when ribbon awards were presented by your librarian to children who had read and reported upon ten or more books during the school year.

A great deal of assistance has been given me by the Friends of the Library group by helping with the books delivered by the Bookmobile; by transporting books to and from shut-ins; by repairing of books; and by acting as Safety Patrol Leaders in bringing bus pupils from Grades I-III to and from the school to the library to take out books. Many projects have been conducted by the group during the year. During National Library Week in April, a story hour was held for the Sweet Hill Kindergarten; movies were shown at the school for Grades I - II with a display of books; a contest on "What the library means to me" was held for Grades III - VIII and three awards of Zim Nature Books were presented for those compositions judged the best.

In May a very successful Art Exhibit was held at the Pollard School, and in October an interesting illustrated lecture on the Quakers was presented by Mr. Charles Thompson. In celebration of Book Week in November, a Story Hour for Grades I and II was held; and open house for adults was observed at the library to hear Miss Shirley Barker, New Hampshire author, speak about her books. A Birthday Club was organized for donating books to the library or school by children or adults upon their birthdays.

A dictionary stand, bearing a plaque, in memory of Virginia Robinson, former Assistant Librarian, was presented by the group to the library.

Let your participation in the use of the library increase our 1965 circulation. Books not available in our library, I will gladly try to borrow for you.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH 1964

I hereby submit my report for the Board of Health for the year 1964.

The State Board of Health have been notified that the following cases of contagious reportable diseases have been reported to the Board of Health of this town, as follows.

I wish to thank the householders of this Town for their cooperation in notifying this office whenever there is present a case of contagious disease in their home, such a report is required by law.

Three Sabin Oral Vaccine clinics were held in April, May and June wherein all types of that Vaccine were used. In those same months were held three immunization clinics for the children of this locality and surrounding towns using vaccine of Tetanus, Whooping Cough and Diphtheria. All such clinics were under the supervision of the New Hampshire Department of Public Health and conducted by your Board of Health.

As required by our Sanitary Code and Health Ordinances all sewerage installations must be inspected as laid and before covering and must conform to our local requirements. This type of work covered nearly every section of our town and 84 such inspections were done including many older dwellings modernizing their sewerage systems as well as business establishments.

One complaint was inspected by the entire Board of Health wherein there was a faulty leeching field installation with a backup of contents of the septic tank into sink and bathtub. The owner was notified and such work as was necessary to restore proper drainage was installed.

Complaint relative to offensive odor at Hoyt City was inspected and repairs requested and completed.

Inspected site of proposed Gas Station at Hoyt City with Building Inspector and requested borings done by licensed Sanitary Engineer.

A public hearing was held at the Town Hall relative to this situation.

Homes for the Care of Welfare Children were inspected and 8 such homes licensed by the State Welfare Board.

Examined two food dispensing stands on Route 125 and passed same.

Inspected complaint against one food dispensing stand for unsanitary disposal of sewerage. No finding.

Inspected complaint relative to unsanitary disposal of sewerage, use of privy, no finding.

REPORT OF THE PLAISTOW FIRE DEPARTMENT

January 1, 1964 to December 31, 1964

In submitting my annual report of the Plaistow Fire Department, I would like to remind you that we went through one of the driest seasons that we have had in many years. During this dry season, we had one of the most expensive forest fires we have had in recent years. With help from three towns and seventy men, it took twelve hours to control it at a cost of over five hundred dollars.

Through the generosity of the State Forestry Department we have been loaned a five hundred gallon war surplus pumper which we have the use of as long as we want. This was very fortunate as our forest fire truck had to be replaced after January 1, because it was completely worn out.

Our most disastrous fire was in September when the Keezer Manufacturing Company building burned at a very large loss.

The total number of alarms answered this year was ninety. Woods and grass fires accounted for forty-seven of these; eight were in buildings and factories; four were emergency calls; six were car fires; and six were false alarms. We sent trucks to Haverhill, Amesbury, Atkinson, Newton, and Danville on seven calls. The remaining calls were for junk yard fires and the dump.

We called for assistance from Haverhill, Newton, Atkinson, and Hampstead in fighting several fires.

Our total fire loss was approximately eighty-six thousand dollars, based upon the amount of insurance paid.

I would like to thank the different organizations that served coffee and doughnuts to the firemen on several occasions.

REPORT OF THE RECREATION COMMISSION FOR 1964

The recreation area established in honor of Plaistow's war veterans was maintained in 1964 with a minimum of cost. A part of the appropriation was unexpended and a lesser amount is being asked for 1965.

We have a pretty nice picnic grove there. It gets moderate use by youth groups and other organizations, but it could stand more. Family groups are always welcome to use the picnic tables and relax in the grove.

The ball fields get good use by organized leagues and by informal gangs, in addition to the heavy use by school children. No organized play is allowed there on Sunday mornings, by law, as we occasionally have to remind.

The skating rink has hardly earned its name. When water is adequate to make good ice (as it hasn't been this season) then slush and snow make it unusable. The pond is shallow, less than a foot deep, and it might be that the vegetation or the clay bottom prevents freezing hard under the snow.

Men from the Fire Department came over one evening and strung a new nylon rope on the 60 foot flagpole. It was quite an experience, even from our vantage point on the ground.

Parking of cars has been a problem whenever there are activities in the area. Since school-time parking was also a problem, this Commission got together with your School Board and developed a part of the land recently bought on the south side of the school. There's a good parking area there now, and most of the swings, slides, etc. have been dug up and reinstalled out where there's more room, making a safer play space for the small children. During 1965 the basketball court should be moved over there, too.

By hiring an energetic bunch of teen-age boys for the pick and shovel work involved, we figure that the cost (about \$70) was a good three-way investment. They got some week-ends of rugged exercise, we got the work done, and their money went into the club treasury for civic improvement.

This will be your Chairman's final report concerning the Veterans' Memorial, to which we've been dedicated since its inception more years ago than we care to consider.

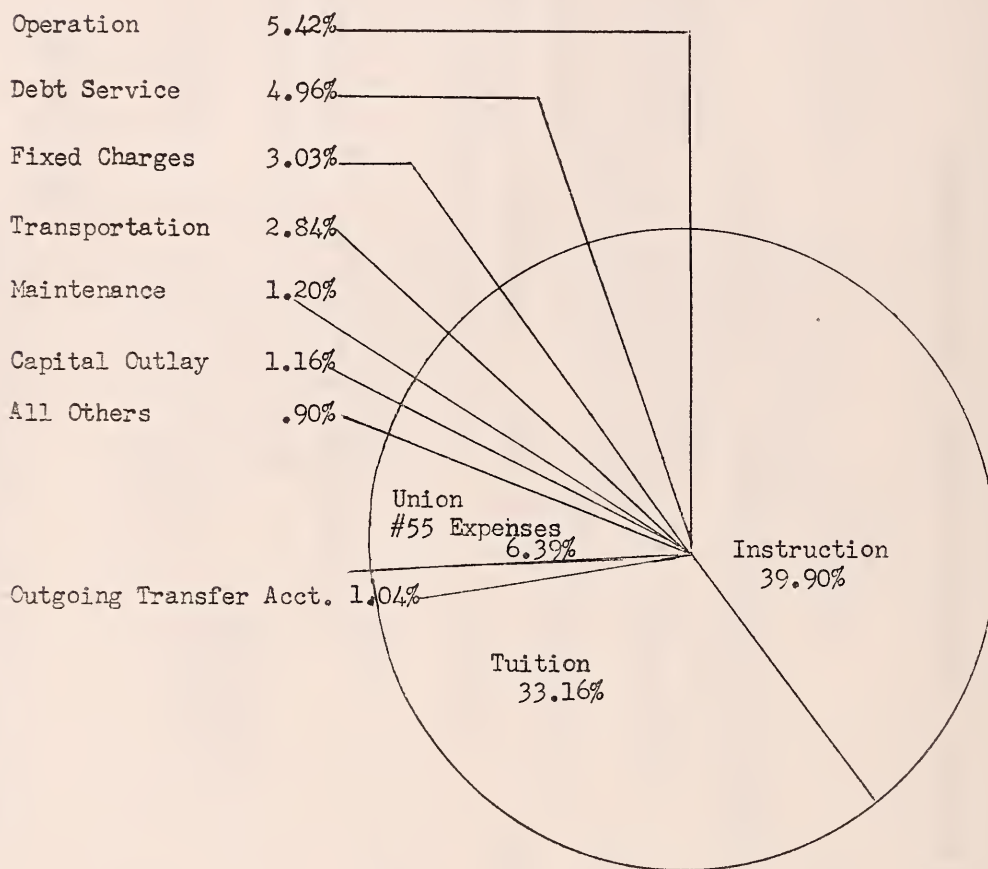

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE PLAISTOW SCHOOL BOARD

The final school board report of the Plaistow School District is not an easy one to write. We have been constantly aware during the past months that an enormous process of change is taking place within our district. Soon we shall join hands with our neighbors to better provide for the children of the area on all educational levels, and to enter the field of secondary education for the first time. We feel that Plaistow can be justly proud of the school and the school system that we will contribute to the Timberlane School District.

In the Spring of 1964, the eight room addition to Pollard School was officially opened at an Open House held in May. This additional space has since been used for our classes, and the activity room has been used by the school and community alike. We can adequately house our children until we can prepare our Junior-Senior high school facilities, if the recommendations of the Regional School Board are accepted this year. We are grateful to a far-sighted community and a fine school survey committee for preparing for that anticipated growth that always seems to be upon us sooner than we are ready for it.

In June, following months of preparation, an Articles of Agreement, proposed by the Timberlane Planning Board, was presented to the people at a special School District Meeting. Acceptance of these Articles and the election of a Regional School Board in September, made possible the joining of the four towns of Atkinson, Danville, Plaistow and Sandown as a regional school district effective as of July 1, 1965. The large voter acceptance of these Articles was most gratifying to those who had participated in the planning of the District. We wish to recognize, also, with appreciation, that this vote was accomplished with a large amount of support from those of our citizens who only stand to benefit indirectly from the results of it. It is these people who seem to have sensed the significance

of the educational changes that are occurring throughout our nation, and whose insight will allow them to see the keen relationship between education and national well-being.

Upon the opening of Pollard School in September 1964, it was apparent that our enrollment projections were to be exceeded. Our anticipated enrollment of 575 students had grown to 601 with 100 first grade students. It became necessary to add a first grade teacher immediately. During the months of September and October further registrations increased our enrollment to 618 students, and already crowded conditions in grades 4, 5 and 6 became acute. Consequently, two additional teachers were hired for these grades.

Through the many months of work and effort, your school board has considered it a privilege to serve the town of Plaistow and its people. In no other area of public service does one experience more fully the feeling that what is accomplished is reflected, for good or ill, in the lives of our children, and through them in the welfare of our state and nation.

As the days of the Plaistow School District draw to a close, may we urge each of you to take an active, interested, enthusiastic part in the Timberlane School District. As the largest town in the District, let us contribute more than just financial support. Let us show tomorrow, as we have shown in the past, that "good education" is not just a trite phrase, but rather, a meaningful goal toward which we must never cease to strive.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the school board and citizens of Plaistow:

I am presenting herewith my Ninth Annual Report as Superintendent of Schools in Plaistow. A report from the Principal will discuss more in detail the activities of the school. Statistical reports are listed separately.

PERSONNEL

Seven teachers have been added to the Pollard School staff this year: Vincent Francescone, grades 7 & 8, a graduate of Lowell State College; Mrs. Bernice McAskill and Mrs. Louise French, two former teachers, returned to teach in grades 4 and 5 after school opened when the enrollment in these grades increased more than it was expected; Mrs. Priscilla Currier, grade 3, a graduate of Colby College with teaching experience in Union No. 10; Mrs. Donna DiGennaro, grade 3, a graduate of Lowell State College with teaching experience in Hampstead and Atkinson, N. H.; Mrs. Susan Baker, grade 2, a graduate of Merrimack College; Mrs. Sanda McGonagle, grade 1, a graduate of Farmington State College with teaching experience in Old Town, Maine.

CURRICULUM

Most important in improving education is a good teacher in an uncrowded classroom. We need, also, a curriculum that will meet the needs of all children. We must provide modern and up-to-date textbooks. We need various audio-visual aids to supplement the program. We need extra services for the special students. We need supervisory and special help for teachers. We want to teach and work in an atmosphere of cleanliness that is safe for our children.

I am very happy to say that we have adopted and carried out the above program to a marked degree. For this coming year, we are continuing all of our programs and will continue our adoption changes in language arts,

modern math, reading and science in order to meet changing needs and use textbooks that will include the latest teaching techniques.

The achievement of our children continues to be above the national norm.

HOUSING

Our enrollment continues to increase. It appears that we will need three additional classrooms for next September. A partition will be erected to divide the all-purpose room in the latest addition to make two classrooms. One seventh or eighth-grade class plus remedial reading will need to go into the basement. The Rainbow Room will be used for music and television. Special Education will have to be housed elsewhere.

When Timberlane builds a new 7-12 high school, rooms will be available to absorb the projected increase in enrollment.

There has been some discussion that a school the size of Pollard, should have a combination gym, auditorium, and cafeteria with a kitchen to meet special needs that are not now fulfilled. I believe that such a room should be added.

You have united with three other school districts, namely Atkinson, Danville and Sandown, to form the Timberlane Regional School District. This decision was approved by 90 % of the townspeople from the four towns, present and voting.

You will be asked to vote a new 7—12 high school. The school will assure you a secondary education for your children. It will be your school. It will give you an opportunity to select the curriculum you wish. It will be a sound investment for the future. You should vote the new school and support the program that will be presented.

The Planning Board and the present Timberlane School Board have worked conscientiously and diligently to offer you a full and realistic educational program of which you can be justly proud. Both groups deserve the upmost praise for what they have done and the manner in which they have done it. It is unusual to find individuals who have cooperated so well together.

APPRECIATIONS

I wish to express my appreciation to the Plaistow School Board, Principal, and teachers for their help during the year. May I also thank all organizations, parents, and friends of the children for their support and interest in the activities of the Pollard School.

PRINCIPAL'S ANNUAL REPORT

I herewith submit my third annual report to the School Board, Superintendent of Schools, and Citizens of Plaistow:

Pollard School opened on September 9th with 613 students enrolled. This total includes pupils in grades 1 through 8 and the Special Education Class, which is housed at Pollard School this year. These enrollment figures are an increase of 84 students over last year. Every available room is being used as a classroom. A listing of this enrollment total is presented in the statistical section of your report.

Mrs. Gwendolyn A. Banks, R. N., Nurse-Teacher again directed the Health Program. Her office hours are from 9 to 1:20, five days a week. This program provided physical examinations for grades 1, 4, and 7. Under her direction, we were able to augment our strong health program with films and filmstrips.

The music program has been under the direction of Mrs. Rose Drohan and Mr. Joseph DeLuca. Christmas Pageants have been presented and there will be a Spring Festival of Music. With the additional teacher, our music program has been given more direction and meaning.

Our All-Purpose Room has served the School well in the music, audio-visual, and physical education areas. Because of the anticipated increase in enrollment for next year, this area will become 2 classrooms. Even though it was not large enough, this room has pointed up the pressing need for such a multi-purpose area, for the total education of the children in Pollard School.

The Union No. 55 Curriculum Evaluation Committee finished most of its work last year. Through the suggestions of this committee, the following curriculum changes have been carried out at Pollard School: the up-dating of our reading program has been completed through grade 2; revision of our science text has been accomplished in grades 3, 5, and 6; French, for high school credit, has been added to our 7th grade schedule; literature has been added to our Junior High program; Modern Mathematics, Greater Cleveland Mathematics Program, has been introduced at grades 1, 2, 3, and 4, it will be in all grades next year; our language program is being up-graded with changes at grades 3, 6, and a complete revision at the Junior High level. For economic reasons, it will take a 3 year period to complete all changes.

We added two special services to our Pollard School curriculum, namely, Speech and Remedial Reading. Under the direction of Mr. Vincent Raciti every student in Pollard School was given a speech test and he conducted classes 2 days a week for those students, who, most needed this service. Mr. Raciti served as a consultant to the teachers in the area of speech and speech problems. We can point with pride to the success of this program.

We are equally proud of the success of our Remedial Reading Program, under the guidance of Mrs. Ruth Cook. At the time of this writing, 73 students have participated in this program, 23 of whom have been returned to their normal classroom work. As proud as we are of the work in this area, the citizens of Plaistow, through their School Board should be commended for the policy of keeping classroom sizes to a figure at which a teacher can readily detect reading problems as they begin and can start immediate corrective teaching. This only reflects the forward-looking attitude of the people of Plaistow toward the education of their children.

Plans were made during the summer, with the help of the Friends of the Library, to begin a much needed school library at Pollard School. Because of our increase in enrollment, space for our library became a classroom. Apparently, until Timberlane becomes a reality, this area will continue to be a classroom. The Friends of the Library should be commended for the amount of work they did for the school.

The Plaistow Parent-Teachers' Association held their monthly meetings, directing their theme, toward the services of the school. The success of this organization can be seen in the number of parents that attended each meeting.

In closing, my third report, I would like to thank the following for their help, patience and understanding: the School Board, Superintendents and Union Staff, Pollard School Staff, Parent-Teachers' Association, Friends of the Library and other Civic organizations, and most certainly the people of Plaistow.

REPORT OF SPECIAL EDUCATION CLASS

To the Superintendent of Schools and the School Boards of Plaistow, Hampstead, Atkinson and Newton:

I hereby submit my fifth annual report as teacher of the PHAN Special Class.

This year the PHAN Special Class is located in the Pollard School. September found us in a large, cheerful room with vast window area and private toilet facilities and sink which proved very helpful. Because it was necessary to divide some large classes in Plaistow and add new teachers, our class was re-located to another classroom of approximately equal facilities.

Our class in September composed of 14 pupils, ages 8 to 16, had six girls and eight boys. There is a wide gap between the teenage and elementary groups, both physically and socially. There is a definite need for two separate classes. Two special education classes are being proposed for the school year 65-66. Anticipated enrollment will be approximately 18-20 students; therefore, two classes will be necessary to meet state requirements.

Miss Martha Smith of Salem, N. H., a senior at Keene State College, is completing nine weeks of practice teaching with the PHAN Special Class on January 22. She has conducted the reading and arithmetic groups at the lower levels besides assisting the teacher in numerous ways. This has made it possible for all reading and arithmetic groups to meet with a teacher every day.

Our television set has proved very helpful especially in our social studies and science fields. We regularly have T. V. classes in "The Story of the Granite State", "Exploring Nature", and "Land and Sea", as well as "Art at Your Fingertips". The older group also enjoys the "Careers" program and "Current Events". We are all taking five Field Trips in New England via television.

Health and cleanliness are stressed in the classroom. Mrs. Banks, our school nurse-teacher, has presented several films and filmstrips in Health Education.

Arts and crafts projects this year began with woven reed baskets made by each pupil. Following this 10,000 popsicle sticks were used in the production of oxcart planters, banks, jewelry boxes, bread baskets, and fruit baskets. Plaster of Paris was used for molding creche figures. Each pupil made a set of six creche figures which were then hand painted. A few were made as class gifts. Four older boys painted five of the large plywood figures used in the outdoor creche at the Pollard School. Styro-foam ornaments were molded and decorated for Christmas trees. Woven pot holders were also made.

We are always appreciative of the cooperation of different individuals and organizations who help us fulfill our needs. This year, I wish to mention in particular the Plaistow-Atkinson Lions Club which provided \$75.00 worth of craft materials chosen by the teacher and the Hampstead Parent Teacher Association for its generous gift of \$100.00 which made possible the purchase of a good record player and additional craft supplies.

I wish to convey my appreciation to Mr. Thomas Caron for his cooperation and continued thanks for the guidance and support of the Union staff.

REPORT OF THE TIMBERLANE REGIONAL SCHOOL BOARD

In the four months since the organization of the District on September 19, 1964, more board business has transpired than Board Members normally experience in a full three-year term. This activity is summarized here. The details of school and budget planning will be discussed at hearings and compiled in a special report prior to the first annual Regional School District meeting. The date of this meeting is still to be established. At this time, it appears that it will be held in late March, or early April.

As of February 3rd, nineteen regular weekly Board meetings, countless committee meetings, and five special Board meetings have been held. The heaviest work load has been on the Curriculum, and the Building and Site Committees with their associated staff members. A sequential listing of the Board discussions and decisions to date follows:

September 23, 1964, Regular Meeting

1. Administration of Oath of office to Board Members by Judge Andernacht.
2. Election of Board Officers.
3. Appointment of a School District Clerk and a School District Treasurer.
4. Established that all Board meetings would be open to the public.
5. Established an Architect Screening Committee.
6. Appointment of School District Attorney Soule, Salem, N. H.
7. Established the regular meeting day, time and place as each Thursday, 7:30 p. m., Office of Superintendent of Schools, Center Circle, Plaistow
8. Voted to petition the State Board of Education to be assigned to Supervisory Union No. 55.

October 1, 1964, Regular Meeting

1. Interview with educational consultants.

October 8, 1964, Regular Meeting

1. Interview with educational consultants, and the appointment of Engelhardt, Engelhardt and Leggett of Purdy Station, New York.
2. Appointment of permanent sub-committees for Curriculum, Finance and Enrollment, Transportation, Salaries, Publicity, and Building and Site.

October 13 and 14, Committee Meetings

1. Screening interviews with Architects by the Screening Committee.
2. Screening of building sites by the Building and Site Committee.

October 15, 1964, Regular Meeting

1. Interviews with four architects.
2. Dirsä and Lampron of Manchester, N. H., appointed by the Board as architects for the proposed new high school.
3. Review of current enrollment and census reports.

October 17, 1964, Special Meeting

1. Meeting with the Selectmen of Atkinson, Plaistow, Danville and Sandown.
2. Established a schedule of payments to the Timberlane Regional School District.
3. Visited all elementary schools with the Selectmen.

October 22, 1964, Regular Meeting

1. Reports and discussions on site selection.
2. Discussion on School Board By-Laws.

October 29, 1964, Regular Meeting

1. Voted to apply for Spaulding-Potter Trust monies to be used to investigate better ways to fit educational program to the individual student needs.
2. Discussion on site selection.
3. Board notified that the Timberlane Regional School District had been assigned to Supervisory Union No. 55.

November 5, 1964, Regular Meeting

1. Selected Oscar P. Little estate land on Greenough (Line Brook) Road for building site of the future Junior-Senior High School.
2. Discussion of teachers' salary schedule for 1965-1966 year.
3. Discussed an inquiry from Newton residents about annexation to the Timberlane Regional School District.

November 12, 1964, Regular Meeting

1. Interview with Newton residents about the question of annexation.
2. Adopted teachers' salary schedule for 1965-66 year.
3. Adopted a policy on sick-leave, vacations and personal absences for all employees of the Timberlane Regional School District.

Sunday — November 15, 1964, Special Meeting

1. Visit to the new 900-pupil Kingswood Regional High School, Wolfboro, N. H. This school was designed by the Timberlane High School project architect, Dirsa & Lampron, of Manchester, N. H. Dr. Engelhardt, the Timberlane Educational Consultant also was consultant on this project.

November 19, 1964, Regular Meeting

1. Finance Committee report on the effect of annexation of the Newton School District.
2. Adopted an entrance age policy. Children must be six years old by the following January first, in order to enter the first grade in September.

November 25, 1964, Regular Meeting

1. Discussed the Transportation Committee report, recommending rebidding of the present contracts for the 1965-66 year. Report included preliminary analysis of contract, rental and ownership methods.
2. Discussed the possible annexation of the Newton School District.
3. Adopted this policy: "The position of the Timberlane School Board regarding annexation of any School District to the Timberlane District, is as follows: Timberlane is willing to inform any interested group of facts and procedures of annexation as defined in the Cooperative School Law RSA195. Timberlane Regional School Board will maintain an impartial position in all such cases."
4. The housing, maintenance and repair needs for all of the Timberlane District elementary schools discussed and turned over to the Building and Site Committee for study and recommendations.

December 3, 1964, Regular Meeting

1. Board discussed "up-dated" enrollment projections which indicate that housing will be needed for 704 students in grades 7-12 by September 1966, 766 by 1967, 839 by September 1968, 910 by 1969 and 1004 by 1970. The number in grades 7-12 this year is 602, as of September.
2. Board presented by Dr. Englehardt with Provisional Space Requirements of 134,000 square feet for a 1000 pupil, grade 7-12 junior-senior high school.

3. The Board discussed transporting the Sandown Central 7th and 8th grade students to the Pollard School in 1965.

December 10, 1964, Regular Meeting

1. Discussed the annexation of the Newton School District to the Timberlane School District.
2. Discussed the N. H. School Building Authority Act.
3. Transportation Committee report adopted for budgeting purposes.
4. The Building and Site Committee reported:
 - a. That all signatures on the option-to-purchase agreement for the Little land on Greenough Road, have been secured.
 - b. Topographical survey has been completed on the building site (Little Land.)
5. The Board was presented by the Building and Site Committee with the provisional requirements for elementary housing for the 1965-66 and 1966-67 years. These requirements are for a four-room addition to the Academy School, a two-room addition to the Danville School, a general activity room addition to the Pollard School, and a one-room addition to the Sandown Central School, with a recommendation that the Rockwell School be used as a permanent home for the Special Education Program, starting in 1966.

December 17, 1964, Regular Meeting

1. Discussion with the Newton School Board on the subject of annexation to the Timberlane District
2. Salary schedules approved for secretaries and for custodians.
3. The Board is informed that its application of October 29th for funds to the Spaulding-Potter Educational Trust, has been approved in the amount of \$6,500 for the first stage of the studies

4. Report by Assistant Superintendent Clark on Educational Facilities Laboratory (Ford Foundation sponsored) Conference on the California project. This project concerns school building costs.
5. The Board adopted a policy on the daily opening exercises for school.
6. The Board asked that Superintendent Davis request the State Tax Commission to make a final appraisal as of June 1965, of all school land and buildings to be transferred to the Timberlane School District from the pre-existing districts of Atkinson, Danville, Plaistow and Sandown, as stipulated in the Articles of Agreement.

December 23, 1964, Regular Meeting

1. The Board discussed material concerning the formation of the Timberlane School District, which is requested of it by its financial agent. This material is necessary in order for any bank to authenticate a bond issue. The question of the non-contiguity of the Timberlane District was raised in this discussion.
2. The Building and Site Committee reported on the adequacy of all of the present elementary school sites within the District.
3. The Board discussed the provisional space requirements of 134,000 square feet for a 1,000 pupil building. Based on current enrollment projections, this would be adequate through the 1970-71 year, on an optimum capacity basis, and probably a year longer on a maximum capacity basis.
4. The Board discussed the adequacy of the statutory debt limit. It was conceded that this limit would not be adequate to cover the provisional space requirements of the proposed 1,000 pupil school. In addition the Board conceded it still was faced with another immediate problem of elementary facilities. Various alternative short-range and long-range solutions were discussed.

5. The problem of space requirements vs financial limitations was referred back to the educational consultant.
6. The Board was informed that the Newton School District had voted against having the Newton School Board petition the Timberlane School Board for annexation.

December 30, 1964, Regular Meeting

1. The Board discussed estimated space requirements of 115,000 square feet for an 800-pupil building. Based on current enrollment projections this would be adequate through the 1968-69 year on an optimum capacity basis and through the 1969-70 year on a maximum capacity basis. The educational consultant was directed to provide provisional space requirements for an 800-pupil building.
2. Upton, Sanders and Upton of Concord was appointed the Board Counsel on all matters pertaining to the formation of the District.

January 4, 1965, Special Meeting

1. The Superintendent was authorized to procure professional and clerical help needed to proceed with Spaulding-Potter Fund financed pupil-profile studies.
2. The Board discussed the provisional space requirements of 111,045 square feet for an 800-pupil building. These were approved by the Board after an amendment to 115,800 square feet. The amendment provided additional space in three areas where the building would become crowded first.

January 7, 1965, Regular Meeting

1. Assistant Superintendent O'Shea reported that the pupil-profile data part of the Spaulding-Potter Fund Project had been compiled and was being forwarded to the educational consultant's office. School administrative and clerical staff worked on this also.

2. A Finance Committee Report of a preliminary estimate of the amount of bond issue, was accepted by the Board. This estimate includes the provisional elementary housing needs program, as well as the High School needs, and is for \$2,300,000.
3. The Board approve a policy on entrance age for the Special Education Class.
4. The Board approved a policy on school accidents and accident reports.
5. The Board worked on the 1965-66 Budget.

January 14, 1965, Regular Meeting

1. The Board voted to authorize its legal counsel, Richard Upton to take the necessary steps to petition the N. H. General Court to validate the organization of the Timberlane Regional School District. (This is a precautionary action, recommended by the bonding authorities.)
2. The Board voted to authorize Mr. Upton to petition the New Hampshire General Court to permit the School District to exceed the statutory debt limit by 2%. (This is also a precautionary action, deemed necessary by the Board, in the event that the 1964 Assessed Valuations as equalized figures for the state are not validated by the legislature prior to District approval of a bond issue.)
3. The Board voted to request former members of the Timberlane Planning Board Publicity Committee to assist the School Board in a similar manner. These members are Elmer G. Kutzelman, Atkinson, Aram Melkonian, Danville and M. A. Plante, Plaistow.
4. The Board appointed an advisory committee for the Spaulding-Potter Fund financed planning project for the high school. These members are Mrs. Jane Ingalls, Timberlane School Board Curriculum Committee Chairman, Dr. Nicholas Engelhardt, Educational Consultant, New York, Dr.

Roland Kimball, University of New Hampshire, Mr. Jack Adkins, Philips Exeter Academy, Exeter, Mr. Damon Russell, State Department of Education and Seth O'Shea, Assistant Superintendent of Schools in Union No. 55 and Howard Kimball of the State Department of Education.

1. The Board worked on the 1965-66 Budget.

January 20, 1965, Special Meeting

2. The Board reviewed preliminary sketches of the proposed High School, with the architect and the consultant. A second draft will be presented to the Board at the February 4th meeting, following planning sessions between the architect and the consultant. A developed plot plan was requested for the same meeting.

January 21, 1965, Regular Meeting

1. The Board discussed reports from the Building and Site, Publicity, Curriculum and Finance Committees.
2. The Board worked on the 1965-66 Timberlane Budget.
3. The proposed 1965-66 School Calendar was approved.
4. The Board voted to set the time for 1965-66 Teachers' Contracts at 185 days.

January 28, 1965, Regular Meeting

1. The Board was informed of a new policy adopted by the State Board of Education on December 30, 1964, having to do with special approval of building plans before State Building Aid is granted on proposed buildings which fail to meet certain minimum housing needs.

2. The Board approved the provisional housing recommendations for elementary schools, and directed Dirsa and Lampron, Architects, to prepare preliminary sketches for this elementary housing. The estimated cost is \$259,750.00.
3. The Board discussed a Building and Site Committee report on a private appraisal of land and buildings included in the general high school building site.
4. The Board discussed a preliminary Curriculum Committee report of Pennsylvania and Florida high school visits. These visits are part of the Spaulding-Potter project.
5. The Board discussed a rough draft of this report.
6. The Board adopted a policy on the retention of non-tenure teachers.

February 3, 1965, Special Meeting

1. The Board worked on the 1965-66 School Budget.
2. The Board discussed a preliminary Curriculum Committee report on high school visits in the Connecticut, New York, New Jersey area. These visits are part of the Spaulding-Potter project.

The Timberlane Regional School Board sincerely hopes that this, its first progress report, answers many questions such as "What has the Board been doing?", or "What has the Board accomplished?". Hearing are planned on the proposed 1965-66 Budget, and on the preliminary plans for the proposed high school, and will be imminent by the time you receive this report. Board Members are also being scheduled to speak at other meetings.
